DEATH AUTO DRIVER FACES A CHARGE OF MANSLAUGHTER—(Associated Press Leased Wire.) DALLAS, Ore., Jan. 7.—Indicted by the Polk grand jury on a charge of manslaughter, Raymond Miller of Dallas, whose automobile ran down and inflicted fatal injuries on J. C. Hayter, pioneer editor and merchant of Dallas, this morning entered a plea of not guilty.

Arraigned for a preliminary hearing, Miller asked that an attorney be appointed to defend him, and the court named J. O. Holman. His trial has been set to open next Monday.

WITNESS IN MURDER TRIAL IN OKLAHOMA BRANDED EX-BANDIT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) GUTHRIE, Okla., Jan. 7.—Federal grand jury investigation of the Osage murder mystery opened today.

The identity of the opening witness was not revealed but he was said to have been "important."

Oliver Pagan and O. H. Loring, department of justice executives, from Washington, arrived today and it is understood that they will play a native part in the probe.

There were reports today that could not be confirmed of gun play yesterday at a hotel where a number of men are under guard as witnesses. Street reports connected a woman with the affair, and said that serious trouble was narrowly averted.

A dramatic incident occurred in the room of W. L. Clingham, a witness brought from Oswego, Kansas, when Mary Starr, a relative of Henry Starr, former notorious Oklahoma outlaw, accused the man of being a member of Starr's old gang.

Entering the room where Clingham was kept, she pointed at him and said: "I know you. You went under the name of W. E. Kirby, but your real name is Clingham, and you used to be a member of the old Starr gang."

Clingham made no response.

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MACCABEES VOTE TO MERGE TWO BRANCHES

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) DETROIT, Mich., Jan. 7.—Merger of the Maccabees with the "Ladies of the Maccabees," was voted unanimously at a special convention of the first named organization. Approval of the merger was voted by the L. O. T. M., several weeks ago.

The Women's Benefit Association, often called the Lady Maccabees, is not affected by this merger.

STUDENTS GET REALISTIC PEEP INTO THEIR FUTURE PROFESSION.

PULLMAN, Wash., Jan. 7.—That the members of the department of architecture of Washington State College might have an insight into the conditions which await them when they leave school to practice their chosen profession, the class was held in session nine continuous hours.

There was no interruption even for meals, coffee and sandwiches being served the classmen at their desks.

From 1 p. m. to 10 p. m. the students, without recourse to text books and with only their acquired knowledge to depend upon, were required to work out a plan of architecture for each room of the department. The stress and urgency of a "hurry-up-time-is-precious" contingency were imposed on the student architects and they met the situation successfully.

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SECRECY SURROUNDS FILMING OF MYSTERY MOVIE FEATURE

HOLLYWOOD, Cal., Jan. 7.—For the first time in the history of moving pictures a feature film is being made here without announcing the name of any of the players appearing in it or any of the production details.

The feature is a mystery play, and its future success on the screen, producers believe, demands absolute secrecy as to its making.

Rigid rules were issued barring visitors, including those of other studios, from the sets, and requiring that all actors and actresses refrain from revealing their characters.

Only the producers and directors know the identity of the cast or where the sequences are being filmed.

OFFER REWARD TO FILIPINO WHO DOUBLES RETAIL TRADE

MANILA, Jan. 7.—To encourage Filipinos to engage in the retail business in Manila, the Philippine Chamber of Commerce has authorized payment of a reward of \$250 to any Filipino retail merchant who may double an original capital of \$2,500 within a period of five years.

According to the plan, preference will be given those Filipinos who can thrive in the face of competition of foreign retail dealers in the districts where the city's retail business is virtually all in the hands of the Chinese and Japanese.

MEDFORD AUTO SALESMAN DRAWS YEAR IN PRISON

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) MEDFORD, Ore., Jan. 7.—Chas. Lloyd, Ashland automobile salesman, this afternoon, entered a plea of guilty to obtaining money under false pretenses and was given a sentence of one year in the county jail by Judge C. M. Thomas, who then granted a parole. Lloyd was indicted for cashing two checks totalling \$7, without funds in the bank.

OREGON ASKS BIDS ON WAR VETERANS AID FUND BONDS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) SALEM, Ore., Jan. 7.—Bids are asked today by the World war veterans state aid commission on a \$2,000,000 issue of Oregon veterans state aid gold bonds. The bids will be opened at the office of the commission here February 3.

The bonds are not to exceed 6 per cent interest and are a short term issue, maturing as follows: \$500,000 on January 1, 1928; \$250,000 on January 1, 1930; \$500,000 on January 1, 1931; \$500,000 on January 1, 1932; and \$250,000 on January 1, 1933.
