SERVICE STATION INDEPENDENTS IN SESSION AT EUGENE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 9.—More than 50 delegates were here yesterday to attend the first convention of the Independent Service Station Owners' association of Oregon. The session was unannounced except through letters to the service station men, and nothing was known here of the convention until it was in session.

Ed Falla of Portland was elected president of the state group. Otto K. Poulos of Salem was named first vice president; Ernest Williams of Ashland, second vice president; J. A. Whitaker of Marshfield, third vice president; and J. T. Conwell of Portland, secretary-treasurer. The board of directors, chosen at the close of the session, is composed of L. D. Jones of Salem, H. W. Shaw of Marshfield, C. L. Wolfe of Medford, Joseph Shockley of Roseburg, Thomas L. Ohlson of Eugene, C. V. Radford of Albany and W. C. Page of Eugene.

The next annual meeting will be held in Medford in January, 1927, it was decided. Twelve counties of the state were represented at the session. Multnomah, Washington, Marion, Polk, Lane, Jackson, Josephine, Coos, Curry, Douglas, Linn and Benton.

Secret resolutions, to be read at a Pacific coast convention, in Oakland, Cal., January 13, were adopted at the session. A banquet at a local hotel ended the session last night.

PIERCE OUTLINES VIEWS ON WHICH HE SEEKS 2ND TERM

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 9.—Walter M. Pierce, in an address last night at the annual Jackson day banquet, outlined that he had laid his plans for seeking reelection, and reviewed his three years in the governor's chair.

Judge E. E. Kelly of Medford, spoke on "Andrew Jackson." The League of Nations was discussed. Governor Pierce in his address urged a new income tax law, a tax on cut timber, an increase of factories within the state penitentiary walls, more money for schools and a greater assessment levied against the Portland Electric Power company.

Speaking "for tax reduction and redistribution of the burdens of government," the governor declared:

"I believe it to be the vital and paramount issue before the people of the state of Oregon."

He said that "a continued effort must be made to redistribute the cost of government."

SOUTHERN PACIFIC MAKES GREAT RECORD FOR SAFETY

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 9.—The Southern Pacific company is putting forth the claim that it is safer to travel than to stay at home. The company is entering its seventh consecutive year without a fatality to a passenger in a steam train accident. Since November 30, 1919, more than two hundred million passengers have been carried by the company over nearly nine billion passenger miles. This is equivalent to carrying twice the population of the United States a distance of 40 miles. It is also the equivalent of 30,000 times around the world in mileage.

FRANCE'S LOSS IN FLOODS PLACED AT OVER 17 MILLIONS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

PARIS, Jan. 9.—The river Seine, ahead of all expectations, suddenly began to recede during the night. The mark at the Tournelle bridge this morning was 19.25 feet, as against 19.52 feet last evening. The Marne is receding and the drop is expected to continue until tonight when the increased flood waters of the tributaries of the two rivers are due to reach them. This influx is causing no alarm. Observers say it will probably result in a stationary situation for 48 hours after which the Seine should begin to fall.

The property damage throughout France is estimated at \$17,500,000, but the authorities believe Paris has been saved from a catastrophe by protective measures such as dikes. In the suburbs of Paris, the streams are receding.

In the valley of the Meuse, the Marne and the Oise there has been much devastation. Bridges have been wrecked, railway roadbeds washed out and factories destroyed. At Dercy, inside the wall of Paris, several wine cellars have been flooded. Paris of the Latin quarter have been invaded by rats and students have had a busy time with sticks. In Belgium the floods gradually are subsiding.

In Holland the police have been told to fire on looters, who have been using boats and rafts after dark to ransack flooded property.

FLOODS IN MEXICO TAKES LIVES AND SEVEN VILLAGES

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 9.—The town of San Blas, in the state of Nayarit, is threatened with destruction from the flood waters of the river Lerma, and the inhabitants are fleeing into the hills for safety, say dispatches from that region.

The damage already done is estimated at 4,000,000 pesos. None of the newspaper dispatches from the flooded area received today state specifically the number of dead due to floods in the state of Nayarit. Other advices, however, are to the effect that several towns have been destroyed and that there has been heavy loss of life.

According to dispatches received here, the port of San Blas was damaged by the rains. The Santiago River, along which the greatest destruction occurred, is reported to have overflowed its banks for the entire 375 miles of its length. The entire Santiago River Valley, rich and fertile agricultural district, was inundated and valuable crops, buildings and farm improvements destroyed.

NOGALES, Ariz., Jan. 9.—The loss of life in the flood-devastated district of the state of Nayarit, Mexico, is fixed at between 200 and 300, in special dispatches received today by the Nogales Herald.
