WORD RECEIVED OF

DEATH WINCHESTER MAN IN HOSPITAL

Word was received here this morning of the death of Herman C. Bentow, of Winchester. Mr. Bentow, an S. P. employee, was taken to the Southern Pacific hospital at San Francisco about a week ago. His condition became worse and on last Friday his wife was summoned to his bedside. He died yesterday. Mr. and Mrs. Bentow came to this county only a few weeks ago, making their home at Winchester where he was employed by the railroad company. The body is to be brought to Roseburg tonight and funeral arrangements will then be made.

DISTRICT BOUNDARY CHANGES ARE BEING CONSIDERED TODAY

The county court today has been holding a busy session behind closed doors, in order to prevent interference. With the month nearly half gone the court has hardly started on the vast amount of routine business which must be considered during January.

Since the January term started the court has been trying to find time to consider the proposed changes in road district boundaries. Changes in boundaries are made only at the first meeting of the year. This term there are about sixteen petitions to be acted upon, and it is probable that the court will initiate other alterations.

In order to prevent further interruptions until the work is finished, the court this morning closed the doors against all delegations and proceeded to make their investigations and determine what changes are to be made.

The election officials and jury-men have been chosen, but there still remains considerable work to be done.

Carpenter was never blamed for the wreck.

ICE CREAM WILL RECEIVE A BOOST

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 11.—How shall people of the Pacific coast be lured to consume more ice cream? How shall they be initiated into all the charms and mysteries, to say nothing of the therapeutic and esthetic values of ice cream eating?

RUBBER PRICE INCREASE IS FOUGHT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—A world wide protest against restrictions on crude rubber shipments from British colonies, is to be made by organizations in 23 countries, including Great Britain, Ernest Smith, general manager of the American Automobile association told the house commerce committee today when it resumed hearings on the subject.

British manufacturers and automobile organizations have insistently requested relief from increased prices. American consumers will pay \$215,000,000 more for tires in 1926, Smith said, at the present rate of increase. This, he based on a probable average increase in the price of from 35 to 65 cents for the crude rubber used in a tire. He estimated 27,000,000 more large tires and 25,000,000 more small tires would be used by 1926 than are used now, as an increase.
