ANTI-ALIEN LAND LAW OF MEXICO IS CAUSE OF PROTEST

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 11.—It is reported unofficially that Foreign Minister Saenz will send a note on Wednesday to United States Ambassador Sheffield in reply to the ambassador's formal protest against the retroactive features of the new Mexican anti-alien land law. This law and the new petroleum act are held to violate pledges given the United States at the time that country accorded recognition to Mexico.

It is said here, however, that it is the purpose of the Mexican government to maintain its sovereign right under the Mexican constitution to enact without foreign interference any legislation it may desire.

Senator Saenz says that there is no intention to injure foreign rights in the enforcement of new laws and that if any American interest or individual complaints of injury the Mexican courts and the Mexican government will adjust them properly.

The protest of the ambassador created much interest in the capital. The newspapers made a feature of the dispatch from Washington announcing the American government's action in ordering Mr. Sheffield to lay before the Mexican government its representations against the retroactive features of the anti-alien law. The belief prevails in well informed circles here that there will be no early clarification of the situation, but that ultimately there will be an amicable adjustment. The conversations of Mr. Sheffield and Minister Saenz are said to have been pleasant thus far.

USE ULTRA-VIOLET RAY TO GET MORE AND BETTER EGGS

MADISON, Wis., Jan. 7.—The ultra-violet ray, already employed profitably by medical men to treat human ills, is being used at the University of Wisconsin to produce "more and better" eggs and chickens.

Nearly three times as many eggs can be produced by action of the ray, the department of agricultural chemistry and poultry have found.

Heavier shells in irradiated pens also increased marketability of eggs and greater hatchability resulted. The ultra-violet light was found to cure fowls suffering from rickets.

On January first 1925, four groups of pedigreed leghorns were put on similar rationing. In the ultra-violet lighted pens, without natural light, the pens were artificially lighted during daylight hours.

Two groups were subjected to ultra-violet radiation. When the eggs were collected two to three times as many eggs were found in the irradiated pens as in the

ordinarily lighted houses. Egg production began to increase markedly within eight days after ultra-violet light was applied.

AMERICAN TRAINED PROTEGE SOUGHT BY ROSA PONSSELLE

NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—(A. P.)—Rosa Ponselle, prima donna of the Metropolitan Opera company, is conducting a quiet search for an American protege to succeed her. The dramatic soprano has no intention of an early retirement—she is yet to reach thirty years of age and the full height of her career. The protege is being sought because Miss Ponselle desires to show that others may succeed in opera and concert work with training in America.

Far too occupied to consider letters or interviews, she is making the search personally as time permits. Miss Ponselle has been interested in music all her life, but her jump from vaudeville to grand opera occurred in only a few months. It was in March, 1918, that her vaudeville contract expired and she went before Gatti Casazza, Metropolitan manager, for an audition. She was engaged immediately after only seven months of previous intensive study and training, she made her debut in the revival of Verdi's "Forza del Destino." A month later she sang the leading role on Rezia in the revival of Weber's "Oberon." Within a space of six weeks she established herself as one of the country's foremost.

Miss Ponselle first sang opposite Caruso in a leading role in "La Juive." Only recently she sang the opera for the first time since his death. To the famous tenor, the star gives much credit for her success.

While a singular opportunity was largely responsible for her immediate triumph, hard work and conscientious study have been factors in her success. The period between May and October has been devoted to training. In addition to regular appearances, the singer averages two and sometimes four rehearsals a week. At least two lessons are taken from her teacher, Romano Romani.

"I have not been to a single performance of opera this season other than my own," Miss Ponselle said. "Neither have I been to a Broadway show. My only party was one for Gloria Swanson."

The prima donna will leave the Metropolitan during January and will not rejoin the company until April for engagements in Atlanta and Cleveland. The intervening time will be given to concert work, as will the latter part of May.

FARM RELIEF IS ASKED BY CORN BELT RESIDENTS

Coolidge Administration and Congress Leaders to Provide Method.

LOWDEN IS PRESENT

Cooperative Marketing Is Sound, Says Jardine, but Cooperatives Not Cooperating.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—The corn belt farmers brought their grievances to Washington today, and both the Coolidge administration and the leaders in congress bestirred themselves to provide some method of farm relief.

Secretary Jardine of the agriculture department, who recently endorsed in principle a surplus marketing bill drafted by western members of congress called into conference a group of agricultural editors and others prominent in farm organizations and sought their advice as to details of the troublesome surplus crop problem.

The house agriculture committee was called together to hear the opinions of other westerners, and the senate agriculture committee, at its first meeting since congress convened, began to piece out the beginnings of a relief program of its own.

Frank O. Lowden of Illinois, in 1920 a formidable candidate for the Republican presidential nomination and four years later the party's first choice for the vice presidency, was a central figure in today's succession of conferences and an influence of recognized potentiality in all of the relief preparations.

Lowden came to Washington to attend a meeting of the national council of cooperative associations, beginning tomorrow. Before this conference with the farm editors got under way, Secretary Jardine went to the capitol to appear as the first witness before the house agriculture committee. He gave his approval to the Haugen bill, to establish a division of cooperative marketing in the department of agriculture.

Cooperative marketing, he said, was "fundamentally sound," but he added: "Cooperatives have not been cooperating. They have been fighting among themselves more than the farmers have. There must be cooperation among farmers and their organizations and the department stands ready to help."

Mr. Jardine declared some way must be found to stop "agricultural mortality."

The secretary said there was no discrimination in the present bill against any agency of agriculture.

COOK WITH GAS.

TODAY'S PARIS SILK SOLD IN CALIFORNIA TOMORROW

ESCONDIDO, Cal., Jan. 11.—Twenty-four hours after a new model of silk has made its appearance in Paris, Los Angeles femininity can purchase the same design woven from a fabric grown and manufactured in California.

The pattern of the Parisian cloth that Milady can obtain locally over the counter of her favorite department store will have been transmitted by cable. The mulberry tree-to-fabric operation, of course, takes weeks, but after the raw silk has been manufactured, it is ready here to be woven into the latest Parisian design on short notice.

Since 1915 when the first mulberry trees were planted in southern California and a silk worm placed on its branches, a total of 220,000 trees have been put out and millions of silk worms set to work building cocoons.

Many discouragements attended the establishment of the industry in the United States, but these were overcome and the output has increased until this year it was found necessary to construct a new \$300,000 raw silk manufacturing plant to care for the Escondido Valley's output the coming season.

With a growing period for mulberry leaves two months longer here than in the Far East, a greater amount of silk per tree is gotten. In China and Japan 400 and 600 yards of recoverable filament are obtained from a single cocoon, while in California from 1,000 to 1,900 yards are unwound.

NATIONAL PARKS TO BE SHOWN THE PUBLIC BY MOVIES

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—(A. P.)—Secretary Work and Stephen T. Mather, director of the National Park Service, have completed arrangements for bringing the nineteen national parks of the United States to those who have neither the time, the automobiles nor the money necessary to view them. Through cooperation with the Motion Picture Producers and Dis-

tributors of America, Inc., of which Will H. Hays is president, and the Association of Motion Picture Producers of California, Inc., the 11,372 square miles of national parks have been made available, under proper restrictions, for motion picture locations.

Secretary Work believes that the parks should not be limited only to those persons who are able to visit them and his new plan, he asserts, will give the public an opportunity to see the natural beauties of America as background for appropriate motion picture stories. These will not be limited to historical stories. Motion picture scenario writers will now be able to take the characters in their plots to Crater Lake, or to the Lassen volcano or to Yellowstone or Yosemite for photographing.

In no way will any of the natural beauty be changed. The "atmosphere" of the park will be retained in every instance. The wild animals that inhabit the parks will be fair targets for the motion picture cameras, as they now are for the cameras of visitors. If the motion picture camera man can photograph them without annoying them in any way, the animals can be enlisted as actors in the pictures.

The parks now open to motion picture companies are, Hot Springs, Ark.; Yellowstone, Sequoia, Yosemite, General Grant, Mt. Rushmore, Crater Lake, Wind Cave, Platt, Sully's Hill, Mead's Verde, Glacier, Rocky Mountain, Hawaii, Lassen, Volcano, Mt. McKinley, Grand Canyon, Lafayette and ion.

"The motion picture is the greatest present day teacher," said Secretary Work, "and has become an educator and source of amusement of millions. The number of visitors to the national parks and monuments during the travel year ended September 30 reached a total of 2,073,694. Hot Springs headed the list with 265,500 visitors and Rocky Mountain had 233,912. Through the motion pictures we shall be able to show all the parks to all the people as they are. Appearing, as they will, as backgrounds for stories, they will be presented in the most attractive form and will do their part to help entertain and instruct the people of the world."

REP. LANGLEY IS DENIED AN APPEAL

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—Representative Langley, Republican of Kentucky, resigned his seat in the house today after the supreme court refused to review his conviction for violation of the prohibition law.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—Representative John W. Langley, of Kentucky, convicted of participating in a conspiracy to violate the federal prohibition law, was denied an appeal today by the supreme court.

Unless he can obtain a rehearing from the court, he must begin serving his two years sentence in the Atlanta federal penitentiary.

The refusal of the supreme court to review the case will be followed within a day or two by a formal order under which the circuit court of appeals at Cincinnati may order the commitment of Langley to the Atlanta prison. It will not be necessary for the circuit court of appeals to defer action pending development of Langley's next move.

The Kentucky representative was convicted of having been a party to a conspiracy to unlawfully remove whiskey from the Belle of Anderson distillery located near Lawrenceburg in Anderson county, Kentucky.

He contended that the proceedings were defective in that the means to be used in carrying out the alleged conspiracy, as stated in the indictments, had not been proved by the evidence and that the offense was different in essential details from the conspiracy which had been charged.

After his conviction he was re-elected to the house, but he has abstained from attendance at the present session of congress. A house committee which investigated the charge against him decided to take no action so long as the case remained in the court.

JAPANESE DAILY IN CHICAGO SHOWS PROGRESS IN PRINTING

CHICAGO, Jan. 11.—(A. P.)—The evolution of the art of printing is oddly and graphically shown in each issue of the Dai-Nippon, Japanese daily newspaper published here. Printed by hand, it has a circulation of five hundred.

There are 50,000 characters in the old Japanese alphabet and some 20,000 in the simplified writing vocabulary. That is why three-fourths of the Dai-Nippon's news is in the complicated characters of the two alphabets. Laboriously drawn by stylus on a stencil, the remainder of the news is half in English and half in the new roman-letter Japanese, both transcribed on the typewriter. Current advertisements are sketched by hand, but forty per cent of the four pages is advertised matter printed weeks in advance, with the aid of metal, hand-set characters.

The news is run off by mimeograph and the composing and printing of the newspaper requires from eight to twelve hours daily.
