NYE IS SEATED AS N. D. SENATOR

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—The senate voted today to seat Gerald P. Nye as a senator from North Dakota.

Nye's right to a seat in the senate had been challenged on the ground that the governor of North Dakota did not have a right to fill senate vacancies by appointment. This challenge the senate upset by a vote of 41 to 39.

The vote came after five days discussion, in which it was charged that Nye had been appointed to the senate by appointment.

A majority of the senate election committee held that Nye was not entitled to a seat but three members of the committee filed a minority report, taking an opposite view.

The result of the vote today brought scattering applause from the gallery.

Twenty-six Democrats joined with 14 Republicans and one Farmer-Labor senator in voting to give Governor Nye's appointment his seat. Eight Democrats and 21 Republicans voted against it.
