URUGUAY GOVT. IS ASKED TO MEDIATE

BUENOS AIRES, Jan. 12.—The Montevideo correspondent of La Nación says he is in a position to affirm that the Uruguayan government has been unofficially approached by the United States in order to obtain its friendly mediation in the Tacna-Arica dispute between Peru and Chile.

The correspondent understands that such mediation would not involve substitution of any part of President Coolidge's authority as arbitrator in the dispute, but that it would be undertaken jointly with other South American countries including Argentina and Brazil. It would serve to form a valuable consensus of opinion which would give added strength to any formulas which were discovered to solve the question other than by plebiscite if it were found that the latter was impossible to carry out. The Uruguayan foreign minister refused to comment on the subject.

Work Must Have Been Terror to Printers

It has always been a subject of impassioned debate among the unfortunate who have to deal with such things just how bad a manuscript can be.

We have Ben Johnson's word for it that Shakespeare never blotted a line—which must have endeared him to his copyists and printers, no matter what the critical Ben thought of it. We have also Arnold Bennett's assertion that he never touches pen to paper until he has his subject so well thought out that all he need worry about is calligraphy. We know that Anatole France shamelessly seized scissors, paste and pen and began the real revision when the proof sheets arrived, the Living Age says.

But the glory of writing very nearly the worst manuscript in literature must certainly go to Dostoevsky. The great Russian seems to have had nearly as hard a time keeping his pen steady at its proper employment as the ordinary run of mortals experience when they sit down to express what they believe to be thoughts.

One page, which has found its way from his family's possession into the Dostoevsky room in the Historical museum at Moscow, shows a portrait sketch, a deft bit of Gothic architecture, and the same Rachel scrawled over and over again in Roman letters of copious perfection, contrasting oddly with the incredible badness of the Russian writing.

With all this it is amazing that the novelist should find any room at all for his writing—but he did, and for innumerable corrections, interjections, and marginal corrections, also.

Said to Be No Spot Quite Free From Dust

When beams of sunlight shine into a partially darkened room you are able to realize how thick the air is with millions of tiny particles of dust. But it is only with the help of a strong microscope that you can appreciate the minute size of these particles. In the dust of one room you may find such various matters as the pollen grains of grasses, scales from our own skins, as well as fragments from our clothes.

You may also find atoms of salt. Salt dust is carried scores of miles inland from the sea, and there is no part of any land where it does not fall. Sand, too, floats in the air, both sea sand and desert sand. Always there is meteoric dust—ground-up morsels of some lost planet, floating in the air. This dust you find everywhere, on the tops of snow-capped mountains and in the deepest abysses of the ocean.

Everything provides dust, from the ash of your cigarette to the scales from the wings of a butterfly.

The Gleaning Bell

In many parts of rural England one may still hear the gleaning bell being sounded at morn and evening, to tell the country folk when they may begin gleaning and when they must cease.

The custom is of considerable antiquity, being mentioned by Tusser in the year 1537. As a rule, the bell is sounded from the belfry of the parish church, and the finger is entitled to a penny for the whole period from each family that goes gleaning.

In some parishes, however, a crier perambulates the district with a hand bell while in others a gong, suspended from a tripod on the village green, is utilized.

Cloud Turrets

A scientific explanation of the connection between the towering masses of cumulus clouds, piled up in inspiring white turrets, which are popularly called "thunder heads," and the approach of a thunderstorm is offered in a recent report on cloud studies made by one of the government scientists.

It appears that the form of cloud called turret cumulus is most common when there is a rapid vertical decrease of temperature in the upper air, combined with heating of the ground, which favors the ascent of columns of air to great heights, and that is, at the same time, a condition favorable to thunderstorms.

Smithy on Wheels

In olden times the blacksmith's craft was not merely the rough work and sheeling of horses that it is today. A fine work was done by the old smiths who were expert at the making of iron gates, ornamental fences, firetraps, and so on.

In the hope of reviving this almost forgotten craft a rural development committee in Yorkshire is sending out a blacksmith's demonstration van to tour the villages.

The van is fitted with a lathe, grinding and drilling machinery, a portable forge, an oil engine, and welding plant. The village blacksmith will thus have a chance of seeing modern tools and methods at work.—London Answers.

FIFTY-NINE GAMES IN WHICH LOSERS WERE GIVEN SHUTOUTS

CHICAGO, Jan. 11.—(A. P.)—There were fifty-nine games in the American league last year in which the losing team was set down without a score. Three of the season's shutouts went into extra innings and one was a six-inning contest halted because of darkness.

The White Sox pitching staff led in this respect, holding their opponents "scoreless" twelve times. Eddie Collins' crew was blanked only four times, not counting the game forfeited to Cleveland where the field could not be cleared of the crowd.

New York proved the easiest outfit to shut out. They were blanked an even dozen times. Yet it was a Yankee pitcher—Bob Pennington—who pitched the year's most notable shutout game, a fifteen inning battle in which he retired the Athletics, 1-0.

The Red Sox failed to score nine times and the champion Senators, the Tigers and the Indians fell victims on six occasions. The Athletics and the Browns kept off the score-board in eight games.

The White Sox chalked up the heaviest total against a shutout team. In a game on Sept. 19, the Chicago team scored seventeen times against the scoreless senators.

August was the shutout month, league records reveal. There were nineteen such games. August 7 was the banner day for shutout pitchers, when three games resulted in no scores for the losing teams.

SPEAKER SAYS CLEVELAND TO HAVE ABOUT SAME BALL CLUB

CLEVELAND, Jan. 11.—(A. P.)—The baseball team that will represent Cleveland this year will be little different from the 1925 squad because, says Manager Tris Speaker, "Cleveland had a far better ball club than it showed in 1924 and 1925."

Tris issues the warning that the Indians are likely to handle three or four teams in the 1926 finish. "We had a lot of tough luck and played considerable bad ball," said Speaker, "but we have had two seasons of it and I have every reason to believe we will get squared away in 1926."

"We need only one more big wallop at the bat to help out Joe Sewell, George Burns and myself. Between the three of us we accounted for 270 runs last year. If Charlie Jamieson does the things I expect of him, we'll make things hum this year."
