

Congress to Be Asked to Erect Monument to Memory of Brave Revolutionary Preacher-Colonel

WOODSTOCK, Va., Jan. 12.—The 150th Anniversary celebration of Rev. Peter Muhlenberg's action in donning the cassock to step from the altar in a military uniform started here today. The celebration, attended by prominent ministers and laymen, will continue through Thursday.

Arranged at the 1923 meetings of the Winchester Conference of the Lutheran Synod of Virginia, the program is one of religious and historic interest. Tonight's service will be led by the Rev. R. H. Cline, pastor of Emanuel Lutheran Church, the same church in which Peter Muhlenberg officiated.

To the many visitors here, the exhibition of the robe Peter Muhlenberg cast aside after his fiery speech, other Muhlenberg antiques on display, as well as the celebration itself, recalled vividly the story of Revolutionary days.

Gathered in the little log church on a Sunday in January, 1776, were sturdy yeomen who had come by foot, on horseback, or in vehicles, with their wives and children. Garbed in cassock, Muhlenberg, then only 29 years of age, stood before his congregation, recounted to them the wrongs which the colonists were called upon to endure, and reminded them that "a struggle for justice and for freedom was one of sacred character."

"There is a time for all things, a time to preach and a time to pray, but there is also a time to fight, and that time has now come," Muhlenberg said in closing his speech. The minister pronounced the benediction, threw off his clerical robe, and disclosed his military uniform as a colonel in the Continental Army.

Ordering the drums to be beaten and the fife to play lively tunes, Muhlenberg enrolled under him a command known as the Eighth Virginia Regiment.

After the war General Muhlenberg became politically active and never returned to the ministry, although he was a devoted member of Zion's and St. Michael's Lutheran Church. He was one of the founders of St. John's Lutheran Church of Philadelphia. With the election of Benjamin Franklin as president of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, Muhlenberg was made vice-president.

As a member of the Philadelphia convention which formulated the federal constitution on September 17, 1787, and on March 4, 1789, when the first Congress assembled in New York City, Muhlenberg took a leading part in the proceedings. He also was a member of the Third Congress and was elected again to the 6th. In 1801 he was chosen United States senator, but resigned to become Supervisor of Internal Revenue in Pennsylvania. President Jefferson appointed him collector of the port of Philadelphia in 1802, a position he held until his death, October 1, 1807.

KITCHEN CUPBOARD

More Christmas Bon-Bons

FOR the foundation of many different kinds of candies the fondant is the base.
Fondant—Take four cups of sugar, one cup of water and stir until dissolved over heat, cover and cook about five minutes; now add one-half teaspoonful of cream of tartar and if the thermometer is used, cook to 238 degrees Fahr. If no thermometer, drop a little into cold water and when a soft waxy ball can be rolled with the fingers, remove at once and pour out on a lightly greased platter to cool. When cool enough to handle the fondant, begin to stir with a wooden spoon, then knead into a ball, pack in a bowl, cover with waxed paper and let stand for a day or two to ripen.
Stuffed Raisins.—Mix equal parts of fondant and almond paste with a little color of green. Wash and wipe the raisins and cut nearly into halves. Remove the seeds and place a small ball of almond fondant in the raisins so that a wide band shows. Let dry over night, then dip in glaze.
Agar Paste.—Soak four tablespoonfuls of granulated agar in one cupful of cold water. Put three-fourths of a cupful of sugar and one-half cupful of white sirup in a saucepan. Dissolve the agar by stirring constantly placed over heat, then strain over the sugar and cook to 222 degrees Fahr. Flavor, color and pour into a pan lined with heavy paper and wet with cold water. Pour into the depth of half an inch and set away to harden for two days. Cut into squares, dip in fondant, melted, sprinkle with chopped nuts. A teaspoonful of glycerin added to a recipe for fondant will, when melting, give a gloss to the candies.
