COLONY SCANDAL IS BEING BARED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

ALLENSTOWN, Pa., Jan. 13.—With the issuance of an order for the disinterment of the body of the baby born to Charles Garland and Bettina Hovey, this community looked forward today to the baring of more details of the life of the colony founded by the wealthy socialist under the name of April Farms.

The order was issued by District Attorney Boyle shortly before Miss Hovey appeared in the district attorney's office and explained the baby's death. Garland, arrested last Monday charged with adultery, is at liberty on \$1,000 bond, awaiting hearing. Both the death and birth certificates named Garland as the father. The farm is regarded by the authorities as a free love colony.

Miss Hovey said the baby had been suffering from colic. Fearing that its cries would awaken her two-year-old child, Mowgli, she wrapped it in a blanket and placed it in its crib just outside the room in which she said she, Garland and Mowgli slept. In the morning the baby was dead. A physician summoned from Quakertown pronounced death due to suffocation.

Miss Hovey said Garland's wife had visited her husband several times at April Farms during the past year.

SHENANDOAH TO BE REPLACED BY BIGGER AIRSHIP

With metal dirigibles.

The secretary told the navy committee that the navy general board regarded lighter than air craft as still in the experimental stage, doubted their military value and opposed any experiments which would curtail "needed" types of war craft, such as scout cruisers, or fleet submarines.

The board agreed, however, that for experimental purposes the Shenandoah should be replaced.

Regarding the much discussed question of the efficiency of the naval air service, the appropriations committee, in reporting the naval appropriation bill declared a "very gratifying situation" had been found in this service, although officers should have more instruction in aviation, and provision should be made to supply a greater number of trained pilots in emergencies.

The appropriations committee left it to the navy to decide which warships should be retired. It pointed out that Great Britain now maintains on active duty only a part of her potential fleet.

The \$33,250,000 carried in the bill for construction is to be allotted as follows:

For completion of the aircraft carrier \$5,000,000; for planes for the carriers \$3,320,000; for beginning work on three new cruisers (previously authorized), \$1,200,000; for light cruisers and gunboats under construction \$13,000,000 and for continuing submarine construction \$7,775,000.

Secretary Wilbur today told the house naval committee he favored construction of an airship to replace the Shenandoah.

The secretary explained, however, that the new airship should have a greater capacity than the Shenandoah or the Los Angeles. The cost of the craft, he estimated, at about \$2,000,000 and he suggested a capacity of 6,000,000 cubic feet, compared to the Shenandoah's 2,100,000.

Mr. Wilbur outlined his views before the committee at a hearing on Chairman Butler's bill for a new dirigible to cost \$5,000,000.

Timothy D. Ridenour, pioneer of Douglas county, passed away last night at 10:30 o'clock at the home of his daughter, Mrs. George Rainey on Houek street, following an illness of about a week.

Mr. Ridenour suffered a stroke of paralysis last week but was unimproved throughout the week until illness culminated in death last night. He was born in Indiana in 1843, and crossed the plains with his parents in 1853, to the west. The family settled in Douglas county, Mr. Ridenour went to eastern Oregon, where he stayed with a brother for a time, the two later going to Nevada and residing there for a few years. He returned to Douglas county, since that time residing at Melrose, where his father had an old donation land claim, and in Roseburg with his brother, Henry Ridenour, who passed away a year so ago. He is survived by his daughter and one son, Eldon, of Oakland, California, who will arrive here tomorrow morning.

The funeral services will be Thursday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock at the Roseburg Undertaking Chapel. Rev. Joseph Knotts will officiate and interment will be at the Masonic cemetery.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 13.—While Portlanders are reveling in clear, sunny weather, that same weather is causing water bureau officials to scan the skies with troubled looks.

HANEY IS DEFENDED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 13.—A defense of Commissioner Haney, whose resignation from the shipping board has been requested by President Coolidge, was made in the senate today by Senator Dill, democrat of Washington.

Dill asserted that the president's request for Haney's resignation is not in accord with the spirit of the law giving minority representation on independent commissions.

The action of the president in the Haney case, Dill said, was an attempt to supplant the shipping administration as provided by congress in the shipping board, with a one-man administration which centered for the time being in President Palmer of the fleet corporation.

The president's request for Haney's resignation because of alleged violation of understanding had with him by the president regarding President Palmer of the fleet corporation when Haney was appointed was cited by Senator Norris, republican, Nebraska, as an attempt by the chief executive to control the policies of the board by secret understanding.
