BORAH RESUMES FIGHT.

(Associated Press Local Wire.) WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—Chairman Borah of the senate foreign relations committee resumed today in the senate his campaign against the Harding-Coolidge proposal for American adherence to the world court protocol.

Declaring that much has been said about the responsibility of individual senators to their party, Senator Borah said he wanted to call attention to "the responsibility of the party to the people who have sustained it and made it what it is."

"Is the policy we are about to adopt," he said, "we are overturning a policy of the Republican party that has existed for the past forty years. If we are right now, then we have been wrong for forty years."

After reviewing Republican declarations against foreign entanglements, the Idaho senator told the senate he was convinced that the world court through its "advisory powers, its counseling powers and its consulting powers" would take this country into the political affairs of Europe if the protocol were ratified.

BIG AIR LINERS
TO BE TRIED OUT

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—Continuing its inquiry into the advisability of replacing the wrecked Shenandoah with a dirigible three times as large, the house naval committee was informed today that the military practicability of big air liners could only be demonstrated or disproved by building such a craft.

Rear Admiral Hilary P. Jones, head of the navy general board, said the navy had not other means of ascertaining the facts.

Questioned as to the big dirigible under construction by the British, he said this aircraft was decided upon for "propaganda" purposes because of unrest in India.

The committee was told by Captain George W. Steele, commandant of the Lakehurst naval air station, that the dirigible had not reached complete development, and that if the Lakehurst station were closed, experimentation and development would stop.

Abandonment of the station has been proposed by the house appropriations committee.

Captain Steele said it was estimated a dirigible of 6,000,000 cubic foot capacity could be struck 200 times by machine guns and continue to operate.

Captain Steele said he feared the British would beat the United States in establishing trans-oceanic air liners. He favored turning the Los Angeles over for commercial use if the navy was given another dirigible.

MEN ARE CAUGHT
STEALING WOOD

A warrant was issued this morning for the arrest of Jerry Sacks and John D. Moore, who are charged with the theft of stove-wood belonging to Alva Hunter, a South Deer creek farmer.

Hunter caught the two men loading a quantity of wood in the rear of their car last night and was able to place the blame for a great loss of wood which he has sustained of late. He saw a car pass his home last night and thinking perhaps they were the parties who had been securing his wood, he left his home and secluded himself near the barn. The car returned shortly and the men started to load the wood. After they had filled the rear end of the car, he walked out upon them and made them unload it. He secured the car number and notified the authorities at once.

There has been many complaints from farmers of late regarding the loss of wood and the officers are hot on the trail of the guilty parties.

The two men charged with the theft of the Hunter wood will be arraigned late today.

HEAVY STORMS ARE
HEADED THIS WAY

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 14.—A big storm, flanked by high winds is booming in from the Gulf of Alaska region with the very definite threat that it will shatter the frozen high pressure situation that has kept the whole coast blowing into its hands and dancing on its toes for weeks past. Gale warnings were posted by the United States Weather Bureau today from Marshfield north to the Canadian line and eastern Washington, eastern Oregon and Idaho have been told that they are going to have a generous snowfall.

Soaking rains are expected along the coast from Eureka north, with the possibility that they may reach as far south as the San Francisco bay region. While freezing temperatures and the strange frost-fog conditions continued in the great valleys last night, the weather bureau said that the damp visitor from the Alaskan Gulf will drive out all of that sort of freak weather before tomorrow.

The cold snap made a last stand last night in crossing the Tehachapi mountains and bringing a temperature of 27 or five below freezing to the Bakerfield region. Continued cold weather in the Porter-ville region, which recorded a temperature of 22 in the last two days, necessitated much smudging to save the citrus crops.
