Jay H. Upton, lawyer of Bend, Spanish war veteran and former speaker of the house of representatives in the Oregon legislature, today formally announced his candidacy for the republican nomination of governor.

Mr. Upton has written into his platform some of the features of which are as follows:
"I am forty-six years old. I am a republican. I expect to win, but if I should not, I will support the man who can defeat me at the republican primaries.

I will give the people a dignified, efficient and economical business administration. I will be governor of all the people of Oregon.

As president of the senate in 1925, I appointed a ways and means committee who cut appropriations below the demands of the budget makers and saved the taxpayers more than one million dollars. Expenses can be cut if those in authority have nerve enough to cut them. There has been too much slackness. I will put a stop

to junket trips by those who hold office under me and will endeavor to stop that practice in other departments. The way to economize is to stop spending.

Emergency Board.
While a special fund should be provided to meet actual emergency caused by the act of God, the so-called emergency board should be abolished. If the various departments knew that they would have to close up shop if they did not keep within the appropriations made for them, they would do so. The state needs a head with firmness and common sense.

Law Enforcement Urged.

All laws must be enforced and observed. Law observance is the duty of every citizen and is as important as law enforcement. The people must cooperate with the officers before laws can be successfully enforced. Respect of law should be taught in every school, church, lodge and civic organization. Criticism of citizens who violate the law will be more useful than criticism of officials who are finding their efforts impeded because of lack of civic conscience. Citizens will not respect the law unless officers themselves obey the law and constitution. Ex-jail birds, bootleggers and stool pigeons will not certainly not be appointed to enforce law. No officer will be retained who himself violates the law, but honest and efficient men will be appointed to cooperate with local authorities and to diligently enforce the law without favor or partiality.

Fewer Laws and Better Enforcement.

We have too much regulation and inspection. New criminal laws should be passed with the greatest caution. Let us get acquainted with the penalties already provided before harassing the people with new ones.

Harmony Between Executive and Legislative Departments.

The governor cannot pass laws, but he can cooperate with the legislature and bring about needed reforms by intelligent leadership. For years, there has been no harmony between the executive and legislative branches. I have always worked with and among the leaders of the legislature. The men who comprise the legislature are honest and earnest men who want to abolish needless bureaus and overlapping agencies that eat up the taxpayers' money, but with no intelligent leadership from the governor, it has been impossible to effect necessary relief. The first step is to secure such leadership and cooperation.

Reduce Auto License.

We are strangling the automobile owner with high license and burdensome regulations. The automobile has built our good roads. Each year we have added to its burden. There is a limit to the burden it can bear. We have passed that limit and are about to kill the goose that lays the golden egg. We can reduce license costs of least half a million dollars annually by now and more as the number of automobiles and tourist travel

increases.

Roads and Highways.
The design of highways, which still remain unimproved, should be graded and macadamized with all due speed. It is now of primary importance to build the road beds on these so-called highways. The major work in the past has been the building of paved roads. The major work in the future should be to build those roads that yet remain untouched. As fast as the principal of road bonds is paid, additional bonds to the same amount should be issued to improve the roads in the localities that have patiently waited until the more popular sections have secured their payments.

Re-Adjustment of Taxation and Assessment.

The present unintelligible method by which the tax commission attempts to equalize assessments by the so-called ratio system should be abolished and the tax commission given authority to supervise assessments of county assessors and to harmonize assessments in the entire state, a thing the law requires to be done but which is avoided by subterfuge. This would display to the world the true per capita wealth of the state, reduce the tax millage one-half and be a great advertisement of prosperity to encourage and development of Oregon, and furnish necessary funds for the University of Oregon, Agricultural College and Normal schools, but the millage for those institutions should be readjusted so that excess income would be returned to the general fund.

LONG LITIGATION TO TIE UP FORTUNE

CHICAGO, Jan. 14.—Ten years of litigation may be necessary before the \$1,000,000 estate of William Nelson McCintock, millionaire orphan, will be of actual benefit to William D. Shepherd, his foster father and principal heir, or the eight cousins seeking to break his will.

Shepherd's victory yesterday, when Judge Kichham Scanlon, in circuit court, ordered the will admitted to probate without passing on the issue of undue influence, was only the start of the court fighting.

The objecting cousins will appeal to the state supreme court. If the appeal is unsuccessful the relatives will file a bill in a court of chancery, charging Shepherd used undue influence to induce young McCintock to sign the will which he drew up.

Which ever side loses in the chancery suit is sure to appeal to the appellate court. And from there perhaps to the supreme court.

The estate already has resulted in a trial and acquittal of Shepherd on a charge of killing his ward with typhoid germs and a probate court action which the will was refused acceptance.
