ROOSEVELTS IN ASIANIC HUNT BAG MUCH GAME

Eight Fine Specimens of the Rare Ovis Poli to Be Brought Back.

GREAT ADVENTURES

Strike Blizzards and Bitter Cold—Forced to Ride Over Mountain Tops Astride Yak.

CHICAGO, Jan. 14.—Theodore and Kermit Roosevelt, leading the James Simpson-Roosevelt expedition into Asia for the Field Museum, have not only bagged eight of the rare ovis poli (Marco Polo) sheep but have obtained the finest representative collection of big game ever taken in the western Himalayas, the Pamirs and Chinese Turkestan.

This announcement was made by D. C. Davies, director of the museum, following the receipt of letters from Colonel Theodore Roosevelt to James Simpson, who is financing the natural history hunt to "the top of the world" and to Stanley Field, president of the institution.

"We got four male poli, two young males, a female and a young animal," Colonel Roosevelt wrote. "Out of this assortment the museum can get the finest and as far as I know, the only group of poli in the world."

Forty-four large animals were bagged during the big trek through Turkestan, the Tien Shan and the Himalayas. Among them are eleven tigers, three leopards and three ovis karakul, or tian shan sheep.

"We have for the museum two record heads, an ibex and a karakul, both of which fell to Kermit's rifle. I was fortunate enough to get the largest ovis poli." The dash into the Russian Pamirs after the ovis poli is described as "a real adventure."

"The Pamirs hunting was real work—bitterly cold. We had blizzards and the water in our tent froze solid. Most of the riding we did was on Yaks. The great woolly animals go over the most impossible places. Once we were caught in a blizzard on the top of a mountain. The black Yaks were caled white and our beards were frozen solid."

After leaving the Pamirs, the Roosevelts went to Springhar, Kashmir, where they were met by their wives, who will remain in India while the second leg of the expedition into central provinces of India and into Nepal are carried out.

The hunters are now on the trail of the famous armored rhinoceros and royal bengal tiger.

LEADER OF FREE LOVE COLONY GIVES AWAY 2 FORTUNES

ALLENTOWN, Pa., Jan. 14.—The eccentricities of Charles Garland, promoter of April Farm, an alleged free love colony, were further revealed today with the information that he had inherited and given away a second fortune within recent years.

A member of the colony, who requested that his name be not used, told about it.

Garland started the colony in 1920, when he refused to accept \$1,000,000 legacy left by his father. Later however, he accepted the inheritance and gave it to the American Fund for Public Service.

the April Farm member said, came to Garland through his grandfather's estate. Garland at once placed this in the trusteeship of the American Fund for Public Service, which concerns itself with individuals who have proven their qualifications for a career, but who lack funds.

Already, the April Farm spokesman said, this fund has assisted many struggling young artists, sculptors and authors in the furtherance of their studies. Included among them is a promising young negro poet now completing his education in Europe.

Reporters were unable to reach Garland for confirmation of the story.

JARDINE PLEDGES TO SUPPORT BILL

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—Full support of the Hangea bill providing for a division of cooperative marketing in the department of agriculture was pledged by Secretary Jardine in a speech today before the fourth national cooperative marketing conference.

A tendency to disagree among farm leaders was held by the secretary to be one of the chief factors in holding agriculture in a backward position.

"We must have cooperation not only among the farmers," he asserted, "but cooperation among the farm leaders. It will be very fine when we can come to Washington or go before the individual states with a united program based on facts and indications are we are coming to that."

Yokels planned Karasick for the first fall with a step-over toe-hold in 25 minutes and the third in 25 minutes with a head chancery. Karasick took the second fall in 14 minutes with a reverse headlock.

OVERPRODUCTION OF GARDEN TRUCK

According to A. wire received from Foster Butler, who is in New Orleans attending the Western Fruit Jobbers' convention, there is, owing to open winter in most sections, an overproduction of garden stuff, and agricultural conditions are alleged to be somewhat discouraging in every state visited by Mr. Butler since leaving for the southern city. The telegram says: "On the better worn by all delegates to the Western Fruit Jobbers convention there appears this greeting: 'America's most interesting city extends you a hearty and sincere welcome. Martin Behrman, mayor.'" Although Mayor Behrman was scheduled for a speech on yesterday's program, death claimed him three hours before the convention opened. A feature of the meeting is the unusual number of growers seeking outlets for fruits and vegetables. The weather is delightful and all garden truck from southern sections is abundant.

The agricultural conditions in all the states I have visited are discouraging, yet railroad and express company officials make addresses claiming wonderful prosperity is indicated by the large volume of traffic over rail lines, entirely ignoring the fact that carriers' prosperity is not shared by producers. The published report that railway interests have won the top icing case, brings severe criticism from western shippers. The railroad officials are always very subjective. I have been unable to learn when the court ruling is to take effect."

TIDAL WAVE DID GREAT DEAL DAMAGE

BANGOR, Maine, Jan. 14.—Fresh reports of a freak tidal wave which first raised considerable scientific interest through its action at Bane Harbor indicate that damage may be more widespread than originally thought.

From the remote fishing village of Corea, on the Maine northeast coast comes the news that at about one o'clock this Saturday that a phenomenon was observed at Bane Harbor, a monster wave smashed lobster cars, tore boats adrift and washed thousands of boarders from their beds in harbor bottom mud. These fish were gathered up in barrels by the natives.

The tidal wave came at 11 a. m. and was preceded by a rushing flood tide several hours earlier. The water rushed out, taking with it big ice cakes. A few minutes after the tidal wave swept up from the ocean.

Beat flour and milk until smooth; add 1 egg unbeaten and beat mixture one minute; add other egg and beat again; then add melted butter. Meanwhile have custard cups or iron muffin pans heating. They should be hot. Grease well just before adding batter. 2/3 full. Bake in hot oven (400° F.) 15 minutes, then reduce heat and bake 30 minutes longer. Bake thoroughly, or Popovers may fall.

Pineapple Fritters
