MINING COMPANY PROBED

MEDFORD, Ore., Jan. 15.—Testimony yesterday by C. T. Knight, of Denver, Colo., president of the Millionaire Mining Company, for whose affairs a receiver and an accounting of stock is sought in an equity hearing in circuit court, showed that extensive sales had been made throughout the middle west and east, by Knight and his salesmen since 1923. The number of shares sold and the commissions paid the salesmen and the reading of the stock books occupied the attention of the court all day Thursday. It developed that 64,000 shares were sold by Knight, which the plaintiff alleges were not accounted for in any report. Knight contended that the sales were consummated after the last directors meeting, since when the affairs of the mine have become entangled. F. C. Robinson, superintendent

of the Blue Ledge Mine, and E. E. Carter, of Quartzville, Idaho, mining engineer, testified that in their opinion the mine could not be operated on a paying basis. The suit is brought by S. J. Heberling, as secretary and lessee of the property. Heberling asserts that the company is indebted to him in the sum of over \$18,000.
