Low, well known as a scientist. The professor prophesied that in 1976 present day types of ships will be replaced by giant hydroplanes which will skim along the surface of the water at tremendous speed. Professor Low also envisaged an era of ugly factories built underground. There will be no more chimneys belching forth smoke, and factory hands will be more polished and better educated as all the rough work of them will be done by machinery.

POLLUTION OF THE
MISSISSIPPI RIVER AFFECTS WATER SOURCE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

ST. PAUL, Jan. 15.—Bacteriologists are now diagnosing the serious illness of "The Father of Waters," who is suffering from a severe attack of "pollution," contracted from "Twin Cities" sewers.

In its incipency the trouble could have been remedied by a comparatively small sum, but now engineers estimate it will cost the Twin Cities approximately \$25,000,000 for a cure.

Back in 1914 the Minneapolis city council discussed the pollution of the Upper-Mississippi river, but no action was taken until the Minnesota State Board of Health recently warned the Twin Cities that something must be done. The sister cities voted \$5,000 jointly to test the Upper Mississippi at regular intervals to determine the extent and seriousness of the pollution.

Engineers have advised the construction of intercepting sewers flowing into a single huge dis-

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posals or setting tank for both sides. A plant of sufficient size would cost approximately \$25,000,000 they estimate.

Municipalities along the Mississippi as far south as La Crosse, Wisconsin, have complained of the river.

PART OF QUEBEC
HOTEL IS BURNED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

QUEBEC, Jan. 15.—The old eastern wing of the picturesque hotel Chateau Frontenac, overlooking the St. Lawrence River is in ruins today, destroyed by fire. Smoke and water did considerable damage to other parts of the building.

Five firemen were injured by falling walls and one guest suffered partial amputation. The fire started at 5:30 p. m. None of the 300 guests of the hotel was injured, having been warned in time to seek places of safety.

A large number of the guests, however, were made homeless because of the damage to their quarters by water or smoke and the Canadian Pacific railway, which owns the hotel, rushed 25 sleeping cars to Quebec to accommodate them last night. The loss to the building is estimated at \$2,000,000.

The blaze started in one of the towers of the eastern wing of the Chateau, which for more than 20 years has the reputation as being one of the most handsome and luxurious hostels in the world.

JAZZ SYMPHONY
IS FEATURED BY
CHICAGO ORCHESTRA

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

CHICAGO, Jan. 15.—A symphony of purely American tunes which its composer calls a collection of features from the jazz world, from Kentucky folk melodies and from the faded popular ballads of nearly a generation ago, is featured on today's program of the Chicago symphony orchestra. Eric de Lamarter, widely known as an organist and conductor, composed the work, which is entitled "After Walt Whitman."

"Whitman was the first American poet to get the raw material of our distinctive culture," said the composer, in explaining the name of his symphony, the three movements of which carry quotations from Whitman's poems as captions.

"I found my Barbary Yawp," Mr. de Lamarter felt pertinent to a "sonata form" movement, which has for its chief tune the venerable "Grizzly Bear," a melody which came from "the Barbary coast" some years ago in a musical show, "A Modern Eve." Its complement is a class from the horsehair furniture era, "The Honeyuckle and the Bee."

The "slow" movement of the symphony is based upon four Kentucky folk tunes, "John Reiley," from McCracken county; "The Hangman's Song," from Harlan county; "Little Sparrow," from Knott county; and "Frog Went A-Courtin'," from Estill county. The last movement has a fox trot rhythm and tune for its basis, and quotes a few bars each from Jerome Kern's "Raggety Ann," Walter Donaldson's "Swanee Buttery" and from another popular ballad, "By the Light of the Stars."

Although the composition has plenty of rhythm, the composer objects to its designation as a "jazz" symphony.

Mr. de Lamarter, who also is known for other forms of musical composition was born in Lansing, Michigan, in 1889.

WORLD COURT TO
COME UP FOR VOTE
