It is believed that the investigation which is now under way is aimed to the recovery of a amount of household goods which has been missed from various homes about the county during the past six months. Thefts of sewing machines, bedding, dishes and other household articles have been reported frequently, and from the great mass of such articles found at Moore's home, officers expect to obtain definite evidence on a number of robberies.

Although both men are said to have admitted thefts wherever the officers have shown evidence against them, they will volunteer no information and deny all crimes until a case is made out against them.

ASK COOLIDGE TO TAKE MINES DURING STRIKE

Senator Copeland Introduces Resolution to That Effect.

DEBATE WAS LONG

Resolution Is Referred to Committee Which Will Delay It for a Few Days.

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—A resolution proposing that President Coolidge seize and control the anthracite mines for the duration of the strike was introduced today by Senator Copeland, Democrat, New York, after action on his proposal that the president merely be requested to act, had been blocked by opposition from both sides of the chamber.

At the request of its author the new resolution was referred to committee, which probably will delay action on it for several days.

The proposal for government operation was presented by the New York senator after a long debate during which President Coolidge's failure to act in the anthracite crisis was attacked by some senators and defended by others as the only course he could follow under the law.

Chairman Oddie of the mines committee disclosed that his committee was resuming work on a long pending measure which would carry out the recommendations of the president's coal commission by giving the federal government a greater measure of authority to deal with emergencies in both the anthracite and soft coal industries.

Under the Copeland government operation resolution, the president would have authority to "seize and take possession and assume control and operation of any anthracite coal mine or equipment."

While operating any such mine the president would be authorized to fix the price of anthracite at the mines and to fix the compensation of the miners and other employees in such mines.

The resolution would make an appropriation of \$10,000,000.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—President Coolidge was assailed and defended today in the senate because of his attitude toward the anthracite suspension.

Recalling that Theodore Roosevelt had prevented a tieup of the mines during his administration, Senator Copeland, Democrat, New York, said he felt confident that President Coolidge could bring relief in the present situation by taking a similar course.

"But doesn't the senator know, the 'big stick' has dwindled considerably since those days," asked Senator Reed, Democrat, Missouri.

"Yes, it's becoming a wand now," returned Senator Copeland. Senator Reed commended the president for the position he has taken, saying that he was inclined to the belief that if there never had been a 'big stick' the country probably would be better off.

The President of the United States has no more right to go outside of the law than any other citizen," he said.

Senate discussion was on a resolution by Senator Copeland requesting the president to take the necessary steps to bring about an immediate resumption of anthracite mining.
