MOORE AND SACKS TO BE HELD FOR THE GRAND JURY

Jerome Sachs and Frank Moore, held on a charge of larceny, waited examination late Saturday evening, when they were arraigned before Justice of the Peace Geo. Jones, and were ordered held for the grand jury. Sachs was fined the sum of \$1,000 in each case. The two are alleged to be guilty of a large number of robberies in all parts of the county and are said to have confessed their crimes. Cook stoves, cooking utensils, dishes, guns, clocks, tables and many other articles are said to have been taken in the string of housebreakings of which the men are said to be guilty. Robbery of two homes near Melrose, where carpenter tools were obtained, and the robbery of a summer home on the North Umpqua from which a cook stove was taken, are said to be the latest developments. John Burke, who was arraigned at the same time Sachs and Moore appeared, also entered a plea of guilty to a larceny charge. Burke is accused of having attempted to rob the Legna store.

ROBERTS CREEK RESIDENT
DIES THIS MORNING

Albert McGinnis, of Roberts creek, passed away at Mercy hospital, Saturday morning at about 5 a. m. at the age of 65 years, following a long illness. Mr. McGinnis was brought to Roseburg Sunday afternoon suffering with tuberculosis but survived only 12 hours. He has been a resident of Roberts creek for some time. He is survived by a wife and three children, one daughter and two sons. The funeral will be held on Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Roseburg Undertaking chapel, and services will be conducted by Rev. H. E. Mow.

OLD NEBASKAN DIES

ALBION, Neb., Jan. 18.—Mrs. Rosa Garvey, aged 112, Nebraska's oldest inhabitant, died at her home near here Sunday. She was born in Ireland in 1812 and with her husband came to America 63 years ago. For many years she has been living with her three bachelor sons, Paddy, 81 and Mike 74 and Tony 70, who tended to all farm and household duties and who said they never married because they did not wish to leave their mother alone after the death of their father.

Mrs. Garvey would have been 114 years old March 29. She was married 52 years ago. Her husband had been dead 25 years.

Mrs. Garvey's sons had vowed never to wed so long as she lived. They ran the farm, one, Tony, whom she called her "baby," took the house work.

A fourth son, John, 77, had married and lived a few miles away. However, the aged woman was surrounded by her four boys when she died.

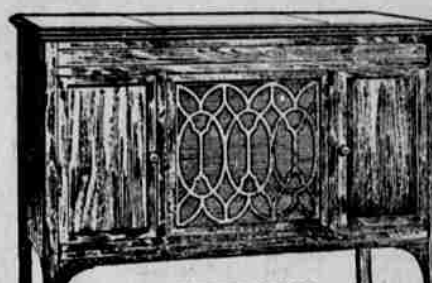
