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WILL USE SNOW MOTORS.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
DETROIT, Mich., Jan. 18.—The expedition to be led into the Polar regions by Captain George H. Wilkins is not dependent upon snow motors for its success, officials of the expedition said here today in discussing the pessimistic prediction of Captain E. T. McIntyre, veteran Alaska trader, musher and adventurer.

"If the snow motors fail to make the long haul from Fairbanks to Point Barrow, then the original plans will be carried out and the two Fokkers will fly the distance," E. S. Evans, manager of the expedition said.

"The veteran musher predicted the failure of the expedition due to the failure of the snow motors to make the haul through the ice-locked trails of the north with the supplies."

"Furthermore," Mr. Evans said, "We rely on the opinion of 'Sandy' Smith, who is in charge of the snow motors and who believes he can break a trail with them. 'Sandy' has been on the ground since 1898. He knew every dog trail in Alaska. In fact, two rivers are named after him. We believe he is a better judge of conditions than McIntyre."

WILL REVIEW CASE.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18.—The supreme court today agreed to review the Skinner and Eddy ship building case growing out of cancellation of war time ship building contracts on the Pacific coast.

The case involves the right of Skinner and Eddy, contractors, to compel Comptroller McCarl to pass upon their claims against the emergency fleet corporation, which grew out of the cancellations. The comptroller general has insisted the shipping board should adjust the dispute.

MUCH INTEREST BEING SHOWN IN BOXING MATCH

Walker-Lillard Bout Friday
to Be a Great Drawing
Card.

HEAVIES TO BATTLE

Preliminary Between 185-
Pound Fighters to Be
Feature of Card on
Friday Night.

Great interest is being shown among boxing fans regarding the card to be presented under the auspices of the Roseburg boxing commission at the armory on Friday night, January 22. Although the main event is naturally the greatest source of attraction, yet the other bouts are also being freely commented upon by those who have seen the respective principles in action.

The main bout between Archie Walker of Roseburg and Mack Lillard of Eugene is beyond question going to be one of the fastest matches Roseburg has ever seen.

Walker fought at the last card with Bobbie Clark of Portland, the bout being a whitewash. Many fans who witnessed that encounter are convinced that Walker was not extending himself to the limit as he will be forced to do in Friday's battle. Lillard is a fighter with no poor reputation. He packs a wicked sleep producer in either hand and is likewise fast and shifty. Walker has shown an ability to stand up under much punishment and at the same time deliver plenty of wallops on his own account. There is little doubt but that the main event on Friday's card will be one of the best the local fans have ever witnessed.

The semi-final between Kenneth Padelford of Sutherlin and Tony Williams of North Bend is also a match in which fans are showing a great deal of interest.

Padelford has fought a number of fights in Sutherlin and Roseburg and is quite well known. He is a clever boxer, although as yet he has not shown a knockout wallop. Williams is a knockout fighter and in his last appearance floored his man in the first round. It is believed that Padelford has the greater science but Williams the better wallop and this combination should make an interesting battle.

Promoter Clough today announced a preliminary between 155-pound boxers. He will match Vern Zachary of Lillard and E. F. Stratten of Roseburg in the second preliminary, both men weighing 155 pounds and being clever and experienced boxers.

There will also be a curtain raiser between local battlers, making 22 rounds of boxing. The commission is quite well pleased with the reaction given the Roseburg fans have given the several cards that have been presented. The commission has endeavored to give fans good entertainment and have succeeded remarkably well. With but one exception every card has been a "bummer" full of action and speed and clever boxing. Promoter Clough has selected boxers with great care and as a result has produced battlers who have become popular with the fans of the city.

LOUD COMMENT CAUSES BOBBY TO LOSE TITLE

Heckling of Fellow Professional
Caused Cruickshank
to Make Poor Putt.

MEHLHORN REBUKED

"Whispering Scot" Denies
He Lost Title Because
of Loud Talking
on Green.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Jan. 18.—Bobby Cruickshank, diminutive Chicago professional, says that the loud comments of "Wild Bill" Mehlhorn, also a Chicago professional, did not cause his defeat in the Texas open golf tournament yesterday, but he was greatly disturbed in his putting.

MacDonald Smith of New York, one behind Cruickshank as they approached the final hole with Jack Burke of Houston, forged ahead on the home green when the little pro, nettled by a fellow professional's chatter, missed three putts and lost his grasp on the championship and the \$1500 first share of the \$5,000 prize money. Finishing with 287, one stroke behind the "Whispering Scot," Cruickshank took the \$800 prize and Burke with a score of 292, divided \$1200 with Harry Cooper of Dallas, and Abe Espinosa of San Francisco.

No formal complaint was made to tournament officials of the shouting of Mehlhorn, pro of the Westmoreland club, near Chicago, at the time Cruickshank was putting. Perched in a tree beside the green, Mehlhorn, who in 1913 lost the Texas open to Walter Hagen, shouted comments on the diminutive Scot's play and made retorts to an official who rebuked him.

Al Espinosa, Chicago, pro, told the Associated Press that "Mehlhorn does that sort of thing frequently. He called me names before all the gallery at the P. G. A. tournament, when I had him five up. He also caused trouble at the Los Angeles open because he didn't want to play on both courses."

"A lot of us have spoken to him and even my wife went to him and asked him if he couldn't behave himself. But it hasn't done any good. His noise cost Bobby the championship and \$1500. The money didn't mean so much but the title did."

Cruickshank greatly resented Mehlhorn's talking, but he did not attribute his defeat to that. He admitted, however, that he was disturbed by the pro's comments as he was making decisive putts.

Mehlhorn finished well in the tournament with a score of 304, winning a \$50 prize.

Mehlhorn Apologizes.
SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Jan. 18.—Bill Mehlhorn is sorry he yelled while Bobby Cruickshank was putting on the last green trying to win the Texas open championship yesterday.

Mehlhorn, professional at the West Moreland club, Chicago, met Cruickshank late last night and mumbled apologetic words. Cruickshank gave him a quick glance and then, frowning, refused to look at him again or speak to him. Mehlhorn, after a moment, shrugged and turned away.

"Sorry I yelled," Bill said. "But I don't think it as serious as its being made to seem. Bobby wasn't in the act of putting when I shouted at him."

L. B. Clegg, president of the San Antonio Golf association, in charge of the tournament, was

standing near Mehlhorn when he yelled to the players from a vantage point in a tree crotch. Clegg after the tournament sought out Mehlhorn and censured him. He said he told the professional, formerly a great gallery favorite here, that the golf association did not care whether he ever came back to San Antonio. Tournament Manager Jack O'Brien, when asked for his opinion by Mr. Clegg, said:

"That goes for me, too." After Mehlhorn's first shout Sunday, W. H. Furlong, head of the gallery police, stopped the match and called through a megaphone:

"Quiet, please."

Mehlhorn sputtered back: "What do you know about machinery?"

LIFE HISTORY OF
G. O. MCGILVRAY
GIVEN BY FRIEND

Gilbert O. McGilvray, fifty years a telegraph operator and lineman, was born at Trempealeau, Trempealeau Co., Wisconsin, Nov. 10, 1853, being the first white child born in Trempealeau county and was probably one of the smallest children that ever lived to robust health, having weighed but 13 pounds at birth. He was the youngest child of Alexander and Catherine McGilvray, and grew to sturdy manhood.

Gilbert took an active part in the Good Templar lodge for many years and later was a worker in the W. C. T. U.

At the age of 18 he took up the study of the Morse telegraphy, and his first position was with the Mutual Union in 1871.

He was married to Miss Olivia Lydia Camp Feb. 28, 1877, at Trempealeau, Wisconsin, who was the 3rd daughter of George and Lydia W. Camp. To this union four sons and three daughters were born.

In December 1898, he with his family moved to Shaw, Oregon; in 1903, to Cottage Grove, Oregon, and in 1906 to Canyonville, Oregon, where he accepted a position as operator and lineman with the Postal Telegraph and Cable Co., which he held for 18 years with credit to himself and the company.

Retiring from active life in the spring of 1924 he with his wife and daughter moved to Walla Walla, Wash.

Mr. McGilvray joined the Masonic lodge at Trempealeau, Wisconsin, nearly fifty years ago, and was a member of the Masonic lodge at Canyonville, Oregon, at the time of his death which occurred Jan. 7, 1926. The wife and seven children survive him.

Mr. McGilvray had accepted Christ as his personal Savior. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. E. T. Allen Jan. 9th at the Presbyterian church at College Place, Wash.

Burial services were conducted by the Walla Walla Masonic lodge with interment in the Masonic cemetery at Walla Walla.

TRAGIC AFTERMATH OF MOONSHINE RAID.

ILWACO, Wash., Jan. 17.—Tragic aftermath of a moonshine raid on Long Island, in Shoal Water Bay, Willapa Harbor, Tuesday night of last week, was revealed today, when Fred Wilson, 45, of Nahcotta, Wash., who was left in charge of some of the evidence, seized in the raid was reported missing.
