PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 19.—Fresh egg values are rising off again in the local market. Increased production with a lower trend in outside markets are the principal factors in the decrease. On the dairy exchange extras and firsts are down a cent at 32 and 29 cents respectively. Fresh mediums or pullets are two cents lower at 28 cents. Underlined grades and current receipts remain steady and unchanged at 25 and 27 cents respectively. Current receipt quotations are not on the local dairy board while all other grades are subject to a seven per cent discount. The local butter market continues to mark time. Trading is generally steady with a fair movement of high score stock and a more or less sluggish tone on underground stock. Demand for country dressed veal is entirely lacking. A limited movement of real fancy calves bring 15c to 16c but the bulk of the offerings will not bring over 15 cents. Receipts are plentiful. Country dressed hogs are firm at 17 cents. Occasional sales of real fancy pork are made at 17c. Live poultry is slow with the market showing a weak undertone.

COURT OPPONENTS FIGHT FOR TIME

(Associated Press Local Wire.) WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—Fighting for time, opponents of American membership in the world court continued at length today their arguments in the senate against the resolution proposing adherence to the court protocol.

The battle against the court was taken up by Senator Johnson, Republican, California, who declared membership in the court inevitably would lead the United States into European political entanglements. "Joining the court would avoid every question of consequence," Senator Johnson said, "will make us the coward among nations of the world."

(Associated Press Local Wire.) WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—The Pacific-Australia-Brazil line was sold by the Shipping Board today to the McCormick Steamship Company of San Francisco.

The vote on the board was unanimous and upon recommendation of President Crowley of the Fleet Corporation. The company agreed to maintain the service for five years.

The offer compares with approximately \$46,000 a ship made by Swayne and Host, also of San Francisco, present operators of the line for the Fleet Corporation and

the only other bidder. The line operates six freighters of about 800 dead weight tons each from west coast ports to the east coast of South America.
