SHIPMENTS FROM OREGON OVERSEAS SHOW INCREASE

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18.—Shipments from the state of Oregon overseas during the third quarter year ended September 30, 1925, amounted to \$1,558,121, as compared with \$7,233,368 for the preceding three month period, according to statistics released today by the Department of Commerce.

Missouri, which in the second quarter of the year led Oregon in exports by approximately \$2,000,000, was second in the three months period under discussion by the latter state which won twenty-third place in the race of all of the states to supply foreign markets.

The increase over the preceding quarter in exports accounted for by the fact that grain and preparations of grain, which predominated among the exports of the state during both quarters, rose in the value of their foreign shipments from \$1,052,545 in the second three month period, to \$6,337,368 in the third quarter. Wood and manufactures of wood ranked next to grain in importance, with exports totaling \$2,638,611, while canned fruits maintained its important position with exports amounting to \$1,058,773. Fish and milk and cream followed along with valuations of \$90,897 and \$172,508, respectively.

Total exports from the United States for the third quarter of 1925 amounted to \$1,116,917,162. This is contrasted with \$1,014,575,532 for the corresponding three month period of 1924, an increase in the 1925 term of over \$102,000,000, and with \$1,069,512,075 for the second three months of 1925, reflecting an increase of more than \$47,000,000, this latter difference representing somewhat seasonal fluctuations.

highway to a point about three blocks east.

This tract adjoins the Parrott property and it is understood that an effort was made by Mr. Cobb to join with the owners of the Parrott property to have a street dedicated through from the highway to Main street, paralleling Rice street. Failing in this, Mr. Cobb provided in his plat that the end of each street should be blocked by a small lot, so that no further extensions could be made except with his sanction.

The council, however, has had a great deal of trouble in the past with such cases, a 5-foot strip in Laurewood having been in controversy for some time, while another like strip is still holding up paving and improvement operations on McClellan street. It was decided by the council not to accept the plat until the streets have been dedicated through to the addition line.

It was also shown that there are several small triangular shaped lots near the end of the streets which would probably not be worth the paving, should the street be improved, and the city would be required to take them over. It was decided to advise the owner to include the small lots in the adjoining large ones, which will result in the tract being approved.

PRICE OF LAMBS IS NOT REGULATED

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

BOISE, Idaho, Jan. 19.—Little or no regulation of receipts of the native lamb is possible, Hugh Spratt, of this city told the delegates to the sixty-first annual convention of the National Wool Growers' association here this morning.

A day or two of higher prices than average usually disclosed as unusual supply of this class with resulting breaks in prices. Mr. Spratt has been making a careful study of the shipping problems as it affects market prices of lambs.

Quoting figures to show that Idaho annually ships approximately 1,500,000 lambs to market, the speaker declared that the item demands the most consideration, it market stabilization is attempted. In 1924 the speakers said the June shipments, the first of the year, totaled 255,553, and in October of the same year the shipments were 124,605.

"No other state markets through the various stockyards much in excess of half a million lambs in the same period of time, so that stabilization of Idaho's shipments would mean a considerable advance in ordinary markets, the speaker said.

"The following means of equalizing market receipts were recommended by the speaker:

1.—Shipping lambs as soon as they reach marketable condition.

2.—Regulation of dates of leading at points of origin through organization of the shippers.

3.—Diversion of shipments to prevent congestion at any one market.

4.—Equalization of receipts through cooperation of commission houses.

5.—Consignment of fat lambs to slaughter points rather than to markets, from which they must be re-shipped.

6.—Removal of part of the feed of supply from the markets at the principal slaughtering points.
