PRICE AFTERMATH NOW IN COURTS

MEDFORD, Ore., Jan. 18.—Opening statements were made this morning in the circuit court at Jacksonville in the equity hearing between the Ashland Baptist Church and the First Baptist Church, Inc., for possession of the church property. The first witness will be called this afternoon. The suit is the result of a "divine healing" revival meeting, held in Ashland in 1922, which resulted in a church schism, that has been pending in the courts for 16 months.

Attorneys for both sides contended in the opening statements that each was following the Bible in their teachings.

The plaintiffs are followers of the established Baptist church; the defendants adherents of the "Aimee McPherson Four-Square Gospel," called holy rollerism, in legal documents filed in the suit.

COOK WITH CARE LUMBER MILL TO IMPROVE HOLDINGS

MEDFORD, Ore., Jan. 19.—A budget calling for the expenditure of approximately \$500,000 for improvements on their local plant has been approved by the executive committee of the Oregon Lumber Company, according to an announcement made this morning by General Manager James H. Owen of this city.

Of the amount, \$300,000 is for the building of a modern, electrically equipped mill here, with a daily capacity, double shift, of 320,000 feet. This improvement is still in abeyance, and a final decision will be made within the next two weeks. Plans for the new mill have been drawn.

"There are several problems connected with the new mill," said Mr. Owen, "that require more time. In all events the capacity of the present plant will be increased, if a decision is reached to build the big mill this year. In case the new mill is not constructed, the present mill capacity will be increased, or a new small mill erected in this city, or in the timber. If the new mill is built, it will be ready for operation for January 1, 1927."

The expanding of the remaining \$200,000 in the budget, is certain and work on the improvements, it includes, was started Monday and will be rushed to completion.

ROUTINE MATTERS OCCUPY ATTENTION OF CITY COUNCIL

A busy meeting of the city council was held last night, there being a number of important business matters up for consideration. In the absence of Mayor Houck and Councilman Iles, the latter being president of the council, G. W. Young, councilman from the fourth ward, was elected chairman and presided over the meeting.

J. V. Casey appeared and asked for a reappointment of the 2nd Laurelwood sewer assessment. At the time the sewer was put in the assessment was made against the unplatted property. The electric light committee reported that the light in front of the library building had been satisfactorily installed and payment for the same was ordered.

Assessment ordinances, levying the assessments for street paving improvements were adopted affecting the following streets: Bowen avenue, Casey avenue, Styles street, Short street, Sprague street, 2nd avenue north, First avenue north, A street, East 6th street, East 2nd street.

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
