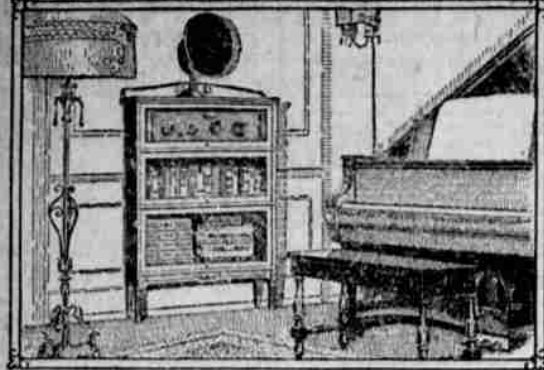

RIDDLE GARAGE DESTROYED BY FIRE; CARS BURN

Loss of \$12,000 Estimated in Early Morning Blaze Today.

TWO AUTOS SAVED

Fire Apparently Started in Battery Charging Room and Obtained Start Before Discovery.

A garage fire, which resulted in a loss of approximately \$12,000 occurred at Riddle Garage, owned and operated by E. E. Hart, six touring cars, a truck and a tractor were completely destroyed. The contents of the garage, including the complete line of accessories and all the garage tools were lost.

The fire apparently started in the battery charging department about 5 a. m. today. It was discovered about half an hour later when the entire interior was ablaze.

The garage building was practically a new structure and was one of the most attractive in the city of Riddle. It was owned and operated by Mr. Ed Hart, who had a complete repair and service department and a line of accessories. At the time of the fire there were 10 cars in the garage.

The fire was discovered by E. S. Seifert, who resides about a block from the garage, and who went out early to milk his cows. At that time the fire had apparently been burning for several minutes and was spreading rapidly. Mr. Seifert sounded the alarm and the fire department responded quickly and did excellent work in gaining control of the fire.

Two cars were brought out only slightly damaged, but all the rest were almost completely destroyed. Touring cars belonging to Pete Garrett, Mr. Yarborough, Ed Hart, Harvey Smith and A. W. Anderson were burned. There was also a storage car, whose owner is unknown, that was destroyed. A truck belonging to George McClane and a tractor owned by Pete Bidtel, were included in the loss. Although desperate efforts were made to save these machines, the heat made it impossible to reach them.

Only a small portion of the loss is covered by insurance. The garage was insured for \$2,000, while Mr. Anderson carried \$700 on his touring car. The rest of the machines were not insured.

AIR SERVICE IS AGAIN REVIEWED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—For the fourth time within a year the virtues and shortcomings of the Army Air Service came under review here today at a public hearing.

With a view to corrective legislation, the house military committee began an inquiry covering ground similar to that traversed by the house aircraft committee, the President's air board and the Mitchell court martial.

To aid in drafting an air service bill, the War Department made public an outline of the congressional action it considers necessary to carry out the recommendations of the air board. This outline proposed the following amendments:

Changing the name Army Air Service to "Air Corps."

Appointment of a second assistant secretary of war to supervise aviation.

Appointment of three assistant army air chiefs with the rank of brigadier general.

Temporary increase in rank for certain air officers.

M'CAMANT READY TO ANSWER HIRAM

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 19.—Prepared to answer all charges brought against him by Senator Johnson of California, United States Circuit Judge Wallace McCamant plans to leave here Wednesday afternoon for Washington, where he is to appear before the senate judiciary committee, which is considering McCamant's recess appointment to the federal bench. Senator Johnson is opposing confirmation of his appointment by the senate.

McCamant appeared before the meeting of the Central Labor council last night and announced that he had learned that the body was to pass on certain transactions he is said to have been interested in some 25 years ago.

"I am prepared to answer any questions that may be asked about that matter," said the jurist.

"There have been no such charges brought against you, Judge McCamant, and no charges are coming up tonight about any matter that transpired 25 years ago," replied G. A. Von Shultz, president of the council.

Last week the council adopted a resolution protesting against McCamant's appointment to the circuit bench on account of his connection with the Republic corporation in 1920 in not voting for Johnson for president.

LEAD IN GASOLINE IS NOT A HAZARD

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—Commercial gasoline containing tetraethyl lead is not a hazard to the public health and there is no reason why its sale should be prohibited, under proper regulation, Surgeon General Culling of the public health service was informed today by a committee appointed to study the subject.

The investigation was ordered by the surgeon general last May as a result of the death of five workers at the Bay Way, N. J., plant of the Standard Oil company of New Jersey. The report of the committee was based upon a study of 252 individuals exposed in various degrees to the exhaust fumes of the gas and who had handled and distributed tetraethyl lead gasoline.

No cases were discovered of lead poisoning or other disease resulting from the use of ethyl gasoline, the report said. The investigation gave special attention to automobile drivers who were exposed to exhaust gases in a much higher degree than the average automobile owner. It was pointed out, however, that the health hazard in the manufacture and blending of tetraethyl lead is serious and must be the subject of regulation and care. The committee

REIMBURSEMENT TAX MONEY URGED

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 19.—County judges of counties affected by the Oregon and California land grant cases, meeting here today launched a movement for reimbursement by congress of loss of taxes because of the land withdrawals.

Preliminary plans were outlined to send a commission to Washington to back the bill when it comes before congress. It was also decided to prepare statements for presentation to all senators and congressmen when the bill is considered in the two houses so that the nation's law makers will be acquainted with the conditions prevailing.

The amount sought by the 18 Oregon counties affected is \$465,000. It is also desired by the county judges that arrangements be made for continuing the appropriation, based on the 1915 assessed valuation of the counties affected.

The meeting was preliminary to the annual session of the county judges and commissioners of Oregon, which opens here tomorrow.

W. H. Gore of Medford, who is not a county judge, Judge C. P. Barnard of Lane county, who presided, and Guy Cordon, district attorney of Douglas county, secretary, were the principal speakers today.

DISCUSS VICE CONDITIONS

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 19.—M. O. Wilkins, Portland attorney who, as special agent of Governor Pierce, obtained information that led to the arrest of Frank Pacer and Phillip R. Johnson, city police officers on charges of malfeasance in office, discussed vice conditions in Portland with the Rev. Clement G. Clarke, pastor of the First Congregational church, he addressed his message to all of the clubs of the country.

Wilkins was star witness for the state in prosecution of the two officers. He admitted that he "discussed" Chinese lotteries with the Rev. Mr. Clarke, who has delivered three Sunday night sermons criticizing Mayor Baker and the police department for alleged lawlessness in the city.

Wilkins admitted on cross examination yesterday that he was acting as a special agent for the governor when he trailed the officers last November.

He received \$100 from the governor for his work.
