SCHOOL DIRECTORS RENEW CONTRACT WITH M. S. HAMM

M. S. Hamm, city school superintendent, was re-employed last night for a period of two years. The school board, which met in its regular session, expressed itself as being well pleased with the service which Mr. Hamm has given in the past, and offered him a contract for the ensuing two years. Mr. Hamm is busily engaged in working on the plans for the reorganization of the city schools on the plan that will be necessary when the new high school is occupied. He presented to the board last night a long list of the problems which must be taken up during the spring months in order to complete the reorganization of the schools. The school board will immediately start work on the matters brought before them by the city superintendent and hope soon to have the new system completely developed. Mr. Hamm also presented the matter of a new course in industrial education, which at first glance appears to the board to be a great forward step in educational lines in Roseburg. This proposal is to be considered quite thoroughly by the board and if funds can be made available will be added.

TRANSIENT HELD FOR ISSUING BAD CHECKS AT DRAIN

S. E. Holgate, a transient, was arrested last night at Yoncalla by Deputy Sheriff C. H. Daugherty and was brought to this city today to be held for the grand jury on a charge of issuing worthless checks. Holgate, who is said to travel under numerous aliases, is alleged to have issued \$3 checks to Watson Whitman and Harry Cool, Drain merchants. A complaint was issued before Judge Burns and Holgate was arrested when he reached Yoncalla on the stage. He was taken back to Drain and arraigned before the justice of the peace, where he waived examination. Bonds were fixed in the sum of \$500.

RANGERS PASS EXAMS

Mr. Thurston, who took the examinations a year ago as well as in the fall, has been appointed as district ranger.

REBELS ATTACK VILLAGE.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) DAMASCUS, Syria, Jan. 20.—A force of rebels, numbering more than 300, attacked the village of Hamara, north of Rachehya, today. Simultaneously the village of Carakolchek, near Rachehya, was attacked, but the attempt was repulsed. During the last few nights there have been no raids by the Druses around Damascus but the French troops have erected more barricades within the city. It is reported that Marshal Franchet D'Esperey intends to launch a new offensive against the Druses.

PRESENT TAX BILL.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.—The tax reduction bill was formally presented to the senate today by its finance committee. Chairman Smoot, however, had not completed the report on the compromise measure worked out by the committee when he said he would not ask the senate to take up the bill before that day. If a definite agreement has been reached by then for a vote on the world court, the chairman has said he would hold up the bill until that time.
