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HINDENBURG IS THREATENING A DICTATORSHIP

In Effort to Avert it Party Leaders Have Formed a Cabinet.

LUTHER HEADS IT

Hindenburg Says He Is Tired of Crises and Political Chicanery Must End.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
BERLIN, Jan. 20.—In preference to a dictatorship threatened by President Hindenburg, the leaders of the parties in the reichstag have formed a cabinet. Dr. Hans Luther again will head the new government as chancellor with Gustav Stresemann holding his old portfolio of foreign minister. The former reuter minister resigned early last month after the signing of the Locarno pacts in London, and efforts to form a new cabinet had been under way since then. Von Hindenburg summoned a dozen reichstag leaders to the executive mansion yesterday and told them that partisan chicanery and political barter must cease. He intimated plainly that the situation required either the setting up of a dictatorship or the formation of a parliamentary government.

"The sorry exhibitions of perennial government crisis must cease, as the condition of the fatherland more than ever demands constructive work," he told them.

Leaders of the middle parties are alleged to have been looking after party fences for the last six weeks instead of facilitating Von Hindenburg's attempt to construct a government which would be prepared to meet with numerous internal and foreign problems with which Germany is confronted.

Three hours after the political leaders had retired from the presence of the president, Dr. Luther made public the personnel of a cabinet which would be put before the reichstag tomorrow. It includes three former premiers, Luther, Stresemann and Dr. Wilhelm Marx, who holds the justice portfolio.

In President Von Hindenburg's first encounter with practical politics, he is declared by one of the parliamentarians present at the conference in the German white house, to have "talked to us like a Dutch uncle."

JUDGE HAMILTON REGENT PRESIDENT

The scarf, which is worn with careless grace about the shoulders, must be selected with an eye both to beauty of pelt and becomingness. The long haired scarf is more suitable for one type of frock than is the short haired skins and should be chosen for just the right ensemble.

Scarves of silk—for daytime—woolens for sport—embroidered shawls—all selected with care—go towards perfection.

Jewelry requires the height of refinement in its selection. There should be a harmony in the choice of all the pieces worn, but they need not match in design or color. Earrings, which are new, are being worn with very smart results when they are selected to perfect the dressing of the head—or accentuate the smartness of the hat.

Pearls, which have been overdone in single or triple strands, have gone the way of other "fads"

and are now succeeded by necklaces of true worth and are exquisitely carved and set.

Pocketbooks, which are always important in the smart ensemble, have taken on a new air of importance. They are being selected in various designs, either the very smart pouch bag of rather large dimensions, or the envelope type, built along longer lines. Painted bags, hand painted on velvets and brocades, vie in favor with the beaded purse of enduring popularity.

Pocketbooks set with rare gems are much carried, and all the intimate parts which go to make the purse a necessity are fitted in like manner. Jade and marcasite are used for fastenings on the newest bags and are most effective.

Shoes with buckles of bronze and steel in unique patterns are much worn. Buckles of pearls of quaintly headed patterns of rhinestones and other brilliants are used with effectiveness for the evening.

Gloves, which go smartly with the daytime frock or suit, are worn a size too large and taboo the gamut of last winter. They are very smart in chamols, but also are seen in colors which harmonize with the costume.

Stockings are gradually leaving behind the blonde tones and are matching in feeling the ensemble. Sheer silks for formal times and smart woolens for sport are the choice of the elect.

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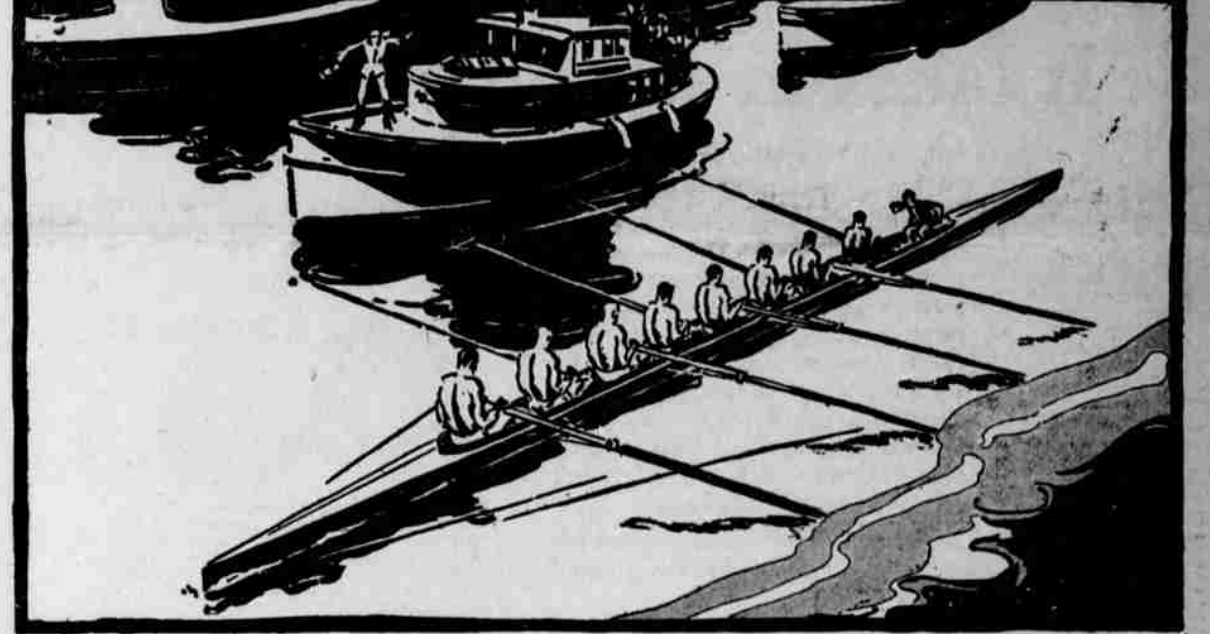
