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## AGRICULTURE NOT DISABLED JARDINE SAYS

May Be Distressed, Speaker Asserts, but Will Have Its Prosperity

### NEED EFFICIENCY

Good Management of Farm Is Essential If Owner Expects Any Degree of Success.

(Associated Press Special Wire.)

URBANA, Ill., Jan. 21.—Agriculture may be distressed, but it is far from disabled, and in the long run will have its measure of prosperity, said W. M. Jardine, secretary of agriculture, addressing the annual meeting of the Illinois Agricultural Association here today.

"When the tide turns badly against us, it but sets in motion those forces which ultimately will swing it in favor again," he said. "If the experiences of previous generations teach us anything, it is one of the best times to buy a farm when farming seems in poorest repute."

"It is essential to have the best possible readjustment of production and disseminating the Rapid progress has been made in recent years by public agencies in collecting and disseminating the necessary information which helps farmers to adjust their production programs to the consuming demands—to give him great advantage in his planning."

"It is essential to have the utmost efficiency in farm operation. Every farm management study that has been made, reveals a wide range in farm business organization and methods. On one side of a line fence is a man who organizes his business expertly, who plans ahead, who uses his labor to advantage, who gets high yields from his fields and his animals. On the other side of the fence his neighbor may worry along on a haphazard basis, his crop yields below par, his livestock more of a liability than an asset. There is no formula under the sun that can guarantee producers."

The second angle of approach to the problem he termed the public angle, which must function when the individual farmer has put his house in order. The case of agriculture must be understood in terms of national welfare rather than merely partisan gain.

Secretary Jardine said he favored a farmer-controlled agency to handle agricultural merchandising in relation to the farm surplus problem.

In such a rightly constituted agency, board or commission, he said he saw the possibility of attacking the surplus problem in a constructive and scientific way along broad lines. In the long run, he said, agriculture will have its measure of prosperity, and is at bottom a sound, going business. He wanted to make clear, he explained, that "for the long pull, I am an optimist on farming conditions."

The surplus, he declared, "is a problem underlying the whole agricultural situation," and it is a matter of national concern. He is opposed to price fixing and against government handling of farm products.

"It has seemed to me, however, that something constructive could be done toward reducing the handicaps which surround certain phases of agricultural merchandising—the term merchandising being here used in its broadest sense. It has seemed to me that this could and should be done by some farmer-controlled agency. When Mr. Dickinson came forward with his new bill, introduced in the house on January 4, it appeared that we had approached some common ground on the points just now referred to, and I frankly and openly said so. I tried to make it plain that I wanted to give full consideration to constructive proposals directed to the surplus problem, even though I did not favor all the provisions of the Dickinson bill. There has been general discussion of late as to the formation of a federal farm board or commission as embodied in the Dickinson bill and other proposals. I see in a rightly constituted agency of this nature the possibility of attacking the surplus problem in a constructive and scientific way."

## SOVIET RUSSIA IS HONORING DEATH OF LENINE TODAY

MOSCOW, Jan. 21.—Soviet Russia today commemorated the second anniversary of the death of Nikolai Lenine, "the father of Bolshevism."

For two days all the government departments, factories, stores, offices and restaurants will be closed. The cities and towns throughout Russia are draped in red and black, amusements have ceased, and the sale of alcohol is forbidden. Any person found giving a party or entertainment will be fined \$50. Films depicting scenes in Lenine's life and the ceremonies at the time of his death, are being shown throughout the union. Lectures and addresses of eulogy will be made by Bolshevik orators in theaters, clubs and public squares, the populace listening in by radio.

The newspaper today devoted whole pages and even their entire issues to articles extolling Lenine's virtues and achievements. Several thousand people, mostly workers and peasants, shivered in the snow-covered Red Square in Moscow, awaiting a chance to enter the wooden mausoleum and view the embalm features of the Bolshevik idol.

Between 5:20 and 6:30 o'clock tonight all flags will be drawn to half mast and all activities will cease to mark the hour of the premier's death two years ago.

The registers at the tomb show that 1,200,000 persons have viewed the body since it was deposited there.

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## R. R. TURNER TO RUN FOR OFFICE OF STATE SUPT.

SALEM, Or., Jan. 21.—R. R. Turner, city superintendent of schools at Dallas, Polk county, today announced his candidacy for the office of state superintendent of public instruction at the primary election next May. Mr. Turner is a democrat.

"In entering the democratic primary election next May, 22, I am running for the office of state superintendent of public instruction," said Mr. Turner in his statement in part. "It is with the feeling that I could give efficient and acceptable service."

"My experience in school work covers 23 years, of which one year was in Virginia, one year in Tennessee, six years as high school principal in Ohio, ten years as city superintendent of schools at Grants Pass and five years at Dallas."

After resigning as superintendent of schools at Grants Pass and prior to accepting the superintendency of the Dallas schools Mr. Turner served for seven years as receiver of the United States land office at Roseburg. In this capacity Mr. Turner formed a wide acquaintance and was prominent in the civic and social affairs in southern Oregon.

Mr. Turner was born and reared at Staunton, Va. He attended the public schools there and later attended the Washington and Lee university at Lexington, Va. Since coming to Oregon Mr. Turner has taken a keen interest in politics, and upon two occasions represented his party at the national democratic conventions.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—Vice President Dawes and his campaign revision of senate rules again were put on the gridiron today on the senate floor.

Within a few minutes after the vice president had taken his place in the chair of the presiding officer, Senator Reed, Democrat, of Missouri, punctuated with this obnoxious discussion of "propaganda" in Washington:
