PARTNERSHIP TAX BLANKS ARE MAILED

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 21.—Clyde G. Huntley, collector of internal revenue, has mailed partnership and fiduciary blanks to all taxpayers who filed such returns during 1925. Forms for the use of employers of individuals in reporting payment of salary, wages, rent or interest of \$1000, or more, to an unmarried person, or \$2500, or more, to a married person, are now available and may be obtained upon request at Collector Huntley's office. All reports covering payment of such amounts must be forwarded by the employer or individual direct to the Commissioner of Internal Revenue, Washington, D. C., so as to reach that office not later than March 15. The blanks herein enumerated are the only income tax forms being distributed at this time.
"Although partnership and fiduciary returns may be filed at any time on or before March 15," explains Collector Huntley, "it is suggested that taxpayers required to file these reports, do so now and avoid the rush that certainly will prevail during the closing days of the filing period. Taxpayers desiring assistance in preparing partnership and fiduciary returns may have the help of competent deputy collectors, if they will call at my office in the custom house, but they should come early.
"Individual income tax returns cannot be furnished taxpayers at this time for the reason that the new revenue bill now before Congress, and assured of passage, undoubtedly will provide for reduced tax rates, as well as increased exemptions. Pending final enactment of the new revenue bill by Congress, this office has been instructed to withhold the distribution of all individual income tax blanks.
"Just as soon as authority has been received from Washington, the necessary individual blank forms will be mailed without delay to every taxpayer who filed a return of income for 1925 during the year 1925, and to all others who have made requests for these blanks."

SCIENTIST FINDS A NEW UNIVERSE.

CHICAGO, Jan. 21.—For years astronomers have speculated whether various nebulous formations in the heavens belonged to this universe or were "island" universes of their own, inalterable distances away.

Some of the white patches were known to be true nebulae, composed of luminous gases, or star clusters that dissolved before the telescope. But others puzzled, no telescope being strong enough to separate them into their component parts, some astronomers suggesting that they were universes of such so far away that they appeared as one mass.

Evidence that another universe really exists is offered by Dr. Edwin Hubble, in a study published today by the University of Chicago in the astro-physical journal.
Dr. Hubble describes this universe as containing bright and dim stars and nebulae in a heaven like our own and offers photographs and definite measurements of the mass of celestial bodies that compose it.
He found that this external galaxy, similar in many ways to our own, although entirely outside of the earth's galactic system, is 700,000 light years away, an astronomical measurement which carries a seven figure when reduced to miles. According to his computation it is 4,000 light years across.

The galaxy's general appearance was described as like that of the magellanic clouds, a mass of nebulae like the milky way in the skies of the southern hemisphere.

BOOTLEGGERS COULD BE VICTIMS OF STRIKE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 21.—Anthracite bootlegging, a new industry which sprung up as a result of the hard coal strike, is growing rapidly.
Starting in a small way the practice has spread, until hundreds are engaged in it.

Some of the bootleggers' supplies are picked from the culm banks. This is permitted by nearly all the coal companies, the only restriction being against the use of trucks and the sale of recovered coal. These restrictions, however, are ignored by the bootleggers, who deliver most of their coal at night and collect from \$10 to \$20 for a short top of inferior grade.
The greater part of the supply is taken from outcrops and old workings in isolated places. Fleets of trucks are busy nightly in the vicinity of Wilkes-Barre and Hazleton.

Scores of arrests have been made had officers of the United Mine Workers have endeavored to stop the practice without success.

BODY OF MISSING S. F. GIRL FOUND

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
LONDON, Jan. 21.—The body of a woman with clothing and jewelry corresponding to that worn by Miss Victoria May Edwards, missing San Francisco girl, was found today in the woods near Farnborough. Nearby was an empty bottle supposed to have contained poison.

Miss Edwards disappeared on December 19 from her aunt's home in Beckenham, a London suburb, leaving supposedly to call on friends nearby.
She came to England last June to recover from an illness and at times seemed depressed. She had planned to return to California in February and shortly before the disappearance arranged passport matters so that she should be able to depart at that time.

Mrs. F. K. B. Edwards, her mother, who makes her home in London, said her daughter had never threatened suicide. Scotland Yard detectives had been working on the case. All the hospitals in and near London were searched, and Kewey Park Lake, in the Beckenham district, was dragged.
Miss Edwards was 33 years of age.

Vigorous swimming is probably one of the best of the exercises, because it calls into play practically every muscle in the body, and the contact with the cold water speeds up all the bodily activities in order to counteract the cold.

If you are going to do any vigorous exercise, it must not be after a hearty meal—remember that. Probably the majority of those who die on the golf links—and there seems to be a lot of prominent people using that method of exit—have done so because of eating heartily right before playing. These people, too, no doubt had weakened hearts or hardened arteries from long years of unhealthy living. No strenuous exercise, especially after 40, should be undertaken without a physical examination to be sure there is no organic trouble which might be augmented. In any case, strenuous exercise should be begun with a few movements and gradually increased.
