ALUMINUM CONCERN FACES OLD CHARGE

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
 WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—The complaint upon which the Aluminum Company of America is to be brought to trial next month before the federal trade commission is the same on which the department of justice refused to act several years ago, the senate judiciary committee was told today by Trade Commissioner Thompson.

Thompson, one of the minority on the commission, said a competitor of the Aluminum company presented its case to the justice department in 1922, charging monopoly in sand castings. After an investigation under the direction of Herman J. Galloway, an assistant attorney general, he said the department held there was no case. The company then appealed to the federal trade commission and the complaint was issued against the Aluminum company, in which Secretary Mellon is interested, and a trial was ordered.

Mr. Thompson said he could not disclose the name of the complainant under a rule of the commission.

Asked about a charge that the trade commission's aluminum company report was made public during the 1924 campaign for political purposes, Mr. Thompson declared the decision to publish the report was unanimous and involved no thought of possible political effect.

JOE COFFMAN ARRESTED

 KIAMATH FALLS, Ore., Jan. 22.—Joe Coffman, former well known Pacific coast lightweight boxer, is under arrest at Jackson, Tenn., on an indictment returned in Siskiyou county, California, last August charging him with first degree murder. This information was received here today by local authorities.

Coffman is wanted on a charge of murdering an unidentified stranger at Weed, Cal., last August. Oscar Schuler, a disabled war veteran, made a partial confession to participation in the man's murder, and named Coffman as the actual player. Schuler is now reported to be in a precarious condition in a government hospital at San Francisco. It was on Schuler's testimony that a grand jury returned a first degree murder indictment against the boxer.

Coffman was here for several months last summer and engaged in several boxing bouts. He left here for Weed in August and it was shortly after that he is alleged to have committed the crime which started a nation-wide search for him.

The youthful suspect was arrested at the home of his parents in Tennessee when he returned there to visit with them, according to special advisers received today from Yreka.

Coffman has agreed to waive extradition, and Deputy Sheriff Willis of Siskiyou county is now en route to Tennessee to return the prisoner to Yreka for trial.
