

READJUSTMENT CITY SCHOOLS TO BE STUDIED

Many Problems to Be Considered Before the New Building Is Occupied.

LIST IS PRESENTED

City Superintendent Calls Attention of Board to Necessity of Reorganization.

The Roseburg school board is facing a most important task during the coming spring and early summer. The entire school system of the city must be completely reorganized in every department and placed on an entirely new basis, which means that before June, when teachers are employed, the board must have worked out in detail its plans for the following year.

At the present time the Roseburg schools are conducted on what is known as the 8-4 plan. That means that a student spends 8 years in grade school and 4 in high school. The new plan, which will be adopted for the coming school year is known as the 6-3-3 plan; 6 years in grade school, 3 in junior high school and 3 in senior high school. The new building to be used for the senior high school is now being constructed in West Roseburg and will be ready for occupancy next fall.

To the average person the change in the school system perhaps does not call to mind the necessity for any great amount of study or thought. To those, however, who are concerned with school work the reorganization entails a vast amount of detail which must be given consideration. City Superintendent M. S. Hamm has been giving the reorganization a great deal of study for more than a year, and has carefully worked out the various matters which must be considered. A list of these problems, carefully compiled, has been presented by him to the school board, and the directors are now studying the matters which he has called to their attention, and from the outline which his problems create will endeavor to arrange for the readjustment of the school system.

The problems which Mr. Hamm presents to the school board are as follows:

Three Elementary Schools Grades One to Six:

1. Selection of teaching staff and principals. Latter's teaching load.
2. Arrangement of classes and rooms per teacher.
3. Consider change of three school boundaries.
4. Repair of buildings and furniture.
5. Consider employment of art, music, and penmanship supervisors.
6. Consider organization of opportunity room for subnormal and retarded children—central location junior high.
7. Replacement of worn out equipment.

Junior High School Grades Seven to Nine:

1. Selection of principal and teaching staff.
2. Choose subjects to be taught, when taught and to whom—Fundamentals plus art, home economics, manual training, music, vocational guidance, physical education, etc.
3. Outline course of study.
4. Repair of present high school building and furniture.
5. Organization of school:
 - a. Length of day.
 - b. Length of class periods.
 - c. Operation of study hall and library.
 - d. Supervised study.
 - e. Recognizing individual abilities.
 - f. Rules and regulations.
 - g. Extra-curricular activities.
 - h. Text books.
 - i. School forms.
 - j. Operation of cafeteria.
6. Replacement of worn out equipment.

Senior High School Grades Ten to Twelve:

1. Selection of teaching staff and principal.
2. Purchasing and installing equipment.
3. Choosing subjects to be taught. Consideration of physical education, chemistry, trigonometry, public speaking, music, art, industrial arts, etc.

LEVY ADDITIONAL TAX
SALEM, Ore., Jan. 22. — The board of directors of the Ochoco Irrigation district is ordered by the state supreme court to levy an additional tax of \$85,000 to meet delinquent taxes, interest on bonds and project expenses. Barnard and other members of the board of directors and of the board of commissioners of Crook county, an original proceeding in mandamus. The court overrules a demurrer and grants a peremptory writ.

PLOT IS DISCOVERED
(Associated Press Local Wire.)
BELGRADE, Yugoslavia, Jan. 22.—Discovery of a plot against the lives of King Alexander and his cabinet ministers is believed to be behind the sudden decision of Premier Pachitch to return from the Riviera, where he went on January 19 for his health.
The police are continuing their widespread raid upon the homes of known communists and the number of persons arrested has reached 500.
The plot against the king and members of the government is said to have been revealed by the arrest of a workman in Zagreb. The man was spending money lavishly, boasting he had received 250,000 dinars from Moscow as part pay-

ment for the work to be executed. He declared, according to the police, that he received the funds through M. Philipovich, a leading Jugo Slav communist, who for the last year has been a resident of Moscow.
This is the first intimation that the alleged communist plot in Jugo Slavia was directed against the lives of the ruler and his ministers. Belgrade dispatches last night said more than 200 suspects had been taken into custody in connection with a movement to overthrow the government.
Syndicalist workmen attempted to hold demonstrations in front of the national assembly building in Belgrade and the use of mounted

troops was required to disperse them.
