TO LIMIT DEBATE ON WORLD COURT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—A vote on the question of limiting debate on the world court was assured today when the court's supporters secured more than enough signatures to a petition asking for such a vote.

Only 16 signatures were required to force the senate to decide whether it will limit debate. That number was obtained on the Democratic side in less than five minutes after the petition was drawn up. A similar petition also was in circulation on the Republican side where many signed it.

When the question of limitation comes to a vote, a two-thirds majority will be necessary to carry it. The supporters of the court are confident they will have votes to spare.

porters of the world court again showed signs today of resorting to heroic measures to bring the issue to a vote in the senate.

While opponents kept the floor with an oratorical marathon covering a wide range of international problems, Senator Robinson, the Democratic leader, conferred with other friends of the court and announced that the rule limiting debate would be invoked tomorrow unless there was an agreement meantime fixing the time for a roll call. The burden of the fight against the court was taken up today by Chairman Borah of the foreign relations committee who held the floor for one of the longest speeches of his senate career while Senator Reed, Democrat of Missouri, Senator Nye, Republican of North Dakota, and others were marshalling data with which to continue the battle later.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—Unless an agreement is reached to vote on the world court by tomorrow, the rule for limiting debate will be invoked, Senator Robinson, the Democratic leader, said today after a conference with other Democrats.

MARKETS

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 22.—Shortage of high grade butter in the local market has resulted in an advance of 1 cent on extra and standard cubes on the dairy exchange. Prices are now quoted at 43¢ and 44¢ cents respectively. Ordinary butter remains steady and unchanged.

The local butter market is taking on a healthier tone and an advance in price may not be far distant. No change is in sight today, local butter makers assert, but the market is firm at the 48 cent level, creamery basis.

Butter receipts amounted to 19,212 pounds with 13,871 pounds manufactured yesterday. Storage holdings are down to 23,372 pounds.

Future trend of values locally will depend largely on the action of other coast markets. The eastern markets are higher for the day but continue a weather affair more or less.

No change is shown in fresh egg prices for the day. The market is steady.

Weakness in the local poultry market has given way to lower prices. Live hens are one and two cents lower with springs from 1 to 3 cents lower today. Light hens quoted at 19 to 20 cents but bulk moving at 19 or less. Heavy hens selling at 22 to 25 cents.

Spring range from 24 to 27c, according to size and quality.

Country dressed meats were nominally steady today with a 15-cent top on veal and 17¢ cents on hogs. Receipts were light but there is no demand. The few calves in today found a slow sale.
