HOPE OF LIMITING DEBATE COLLAPSES

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—Hope of limiting senate debate on the world court without resort to the drastic closure rule collapsed today when opponents of the court refused to assent to an unanimous consent limitations agreement.

The leaders of the anti-court forces said they would accept no peace offer under the threat of the petition for cloture which was filed last night.

Unless the situation changes the senate will vote Monday on cloture and the pro-court forces are confident they have the necessary two-thirds majority to adopt it.

Although the senate met an hour earlier than usual today, debate on the court was not immediately resumed.

Senator Leavort, Republican, Wisconsin, leader of the pro-court forces, visited the White House, where he acquainted President Coolidge with the situation. He said afterwards that the President offered no advice.

A proposal that American adhesion to the court be submitted to a referendum of the voters of the states was the maiden contribution of Senator Nye, Republican, North Dakota. He declared that if a vote were taken now he would vote against the court. "That decision does not necessarily mean that I am unqualifiedly opposed to the plan in its entirety, or to the idea involved in it," he said. "Would it not be better that we move a bit more slowly. I grow more firm daily in my conviction that the great majority of the American people have not gained an understanding of the first fundamentals involved in this proposal."

Demanding to know where is the mandate from the people for immediate action, the North Dakota senator declared it might easily "be far more dangerous to step into this world court than it will be to stay out."

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"Why the big rush about getting into this? Why must we go into the world court before we do anything else in this chamber? Why must we enter this court today, tomorrow, next week or next month? We've moved along quite nicely for 140 years without this court. We have the Hague court available and functioning in the meantime. Why must we rush into the world court now?"

FRENCH TALKS OF DEBT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—Henry Berenger, the new French ambassador, informed Secretary Mellon today that he was prepared to meet with the American debt commission at its convenience to discuss French debt funding.

CONDITION OF BANKS.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) NEW YORK, Jan. 23.—The actual condition of the clearing house banks and trust companies for the week shows excess reserve of \$26,121,930. This is an increase in reserve of \$911,370, compared with last week, when excess reserve totaled \$25,210,560.

NEWS GLEANINGS FROM ALL PARTS OF THE WORLD

LONDON, Jan. 23.—(A. P.)—Irving Berlin's next song hit should have a chorus refrain: "Please say we are supremely happy," for that seems all the jazz composer and his bride are able to say when they arrived here for their honeymoon.

Like the haunting sentiment of the Berlin ballads of the last year or so, this thought runs through everything the world's most talked of newsweds told the French, British and American reporters who flocked to meet them at Cherbourg and Southampton. Even the big Cockney lackey who guarded their rooms in a London hotel caught the spirit of the Berlin-Mackay romance. For the first few days, he was besieged by callers of all kinds—reporters, song writers, theatrical agents and movie men—but whenever proposals were made about interviewing the tuneless Irving and his bride, the gold-braided dignitary was sure it would be "impossible, sir."

"It can assure you, sir," he always ended, "that they're supremely happy."

The radio has brought the British public closer to the royal family. For the first time in history a lady-in-waiting to Queen Mary has appeared before the microphone and been heard by millions of listeners.

The speaker was Lady Bertha Adkins, an active charity worker who issued an appeal in behalf of home for pensioners. The king, the Prince of Wales and the Duke of York have been broadcast from time to time, but Queen Mary's voice has never yet been heard on the radio. Both the king and queen are radio enthusiasts and have their own wireless sets at Buckingham Palace and their castles in the country.

London's first banjolele band, composed of society leaders has made their appearance. The leader is Lady Churston, whose husband was formerly an aide de camp to the viceroy of India, other members being her daughter, Joan Yards-Buller, Lady Diana King and Lady Clifton.

The banjolele, a combination of banjo and ukulele was popularized here by the Prince of Wales.

18-YEAR-OLD BOY KILLS STEP-MOTHER

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) ST. CLAIRSVILLE, Ohio, Jan. 23.—Kenneth Hoge, aged 18 years, was in jail here today charged with killing his step-mother.

The body, with a bullet hole in the head, was found in the kitchen of the home yesterday by the husband, a prosperous farmer. Officers walked for ten hours through snow drifts to reach the house near Jewellsville, where they arrested the youth.

Prosecuting Attorney Herbert Mitchell said young Hoge signed a confession. According to this prosecutor, Kenneth said that as he was preparing for bed Thursday he recalled that three years ago his step-mother had accused him of stealing money from her purse and that he obtained his rifle, went to the kitchen and fired a bullet into the back of her head. The prosecutor said the boy told of going to bed after the shooting and sleeping all night.

MASKED WOMEN GIVE GIRLS HORSEWHIPPING

OCOLA, Fla., Jan. 23.—A band of 15 masked women drove up to a house here today in automobiles and nine members of the band forcibly removed a woman from the home, tied her hands and rushed her to a lonely spot 3 miles north of this city, where they whipped her with switches from nearby trees. The woman was left there, she reported to the police. She was picked up by a passing motorist and brought back to the city where she was given medical attention. She was unconscious when picked up. No arrests have been made.

HANDIT GIVEN TEN MONTHS IN THE PEN.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 23.—Myrtle Vance, who with a toy pistol held up two department store employees in front of the United States National Bank, some time ago and obtained \$4,900, was today sentenced to ten months in the penitentiary. The light sentence was given because her health is impaired. The money was recovered shortly after the holdup.

Ennis Pritchard, an employee of the store and his wife, Helen, were also indicted. Pritchard was said by police to have confessed that he and Mrs. Vance "framed" the robbery and that Mrs. Pritchard had consented to his part in it. Pritchard and his wife have pleaded not guilty.
