The Winter Season, Which Favors Velvets for Smart Occasions, Lavishly Employs Fur

The daytime mode which favors velvets in creating a smart appearance, features a black and white combination that is exceedingly becoming to all ages.

The lines of the coat or suit which bring into being the black and white ensemble are important in the mode. The flare which is so popular along the hem lines is showing a tendency to creep higher and establish a complicated silhouette.

The princess silhouette, which is smartly used both in gowns and coats, is being supplanted to some models which feature a fullness at the waist in a blouse effect. The cape back is also prominent in the mode and uses, frequently, a two-piece skirt in circular lines for accompanying effect.

Firmly entrenched in the winter mode, however, is the princess silhouette which features a waistline at the hem, in velvet which is so graceful a fabric for this type of costume, the princess mode is secure in its smartness.

The marked waistline is emphasized in the one-piece frock or coat which displays a modified flare. It is very effective for the afternoon and evening.

or evening gown in crepe or velvet as its simplicity of line is in complete harmony with the clinging qualities of the fabric.

Furs are used lavishly as a trimming in the daytime and evening mode. The fur banding along the hem of the coat has left a broken line in the newest models, and is found either on both sides of a flare, or in the front or back. In general, furs have left the hem for higher places and smartly finish a musketeer cuff or collar in unapologetic lines. The stole effect is favored in the longer haired pelts and is very smart when the material is of velvet trimmed in straight lines down the front in fox.

Blanche Sweet, who wears an exceedingly chic ensemble in black and white, has selected a coat of princess lines, smartly marking a fitted waistline with four buttons, and fur at the hem. The outstanding feature of the ensemble is the introduction of white ermine in an unusual collar and musketeer cuffs. Barker was enroute to Portland for that purpose, but upon reaching Roseburg Thursday at midnight was met by Captain Byron Humphrey, commander of the local corps who had received a wire to the effect that the Colonel's little daughter had been taken suddenly and critically ill, which necessitated his returning by the first train.

Colonel Barker, who is chief secretary of the Salvation Army in the western territory, was in charge of all Salvation Army forces overseas during the world war and is nationally known among corps officials. The council will probably take place at a later date in Portland.
