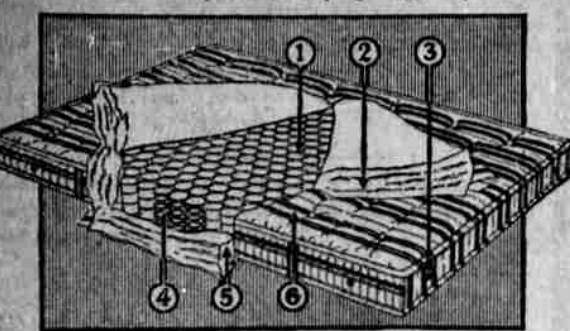

COOLIDGE AND OTHERS CHARGED USING INFLUENCE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—President Coolidge, Senator Smoot, Republican, Utah, and others were charged in the senate today by Senator Norris, Republican, Nebraska with attempting to influence William S. Culbertson, as a member of the tariff commission to delay the commission's report on the sugar tariff.

Senator Norris declared that the president wanted to hold back the report until after the 1924 election and had requested the commission to drop the sugar investigation and start a butter inquiry. When this failed, the Nebraska senator said, charges were brought against Commissioner Culbertson and former Attorney General Stone submitted a report on the charges adverse to Culbertson.

"President Coolidge sent for Culbertson," Senator Norris said, "and talked with him about the charges and as Culbertson was about to leave the office and with the adverse report lying on his desk, the President again asked Culbertson if he could not delay the sugar report."

Senator Smoot said the Nebraska senator called Culbertson into a conference with representatives of the sugar interests, who were fighting against any tariff reduction. Senator Phipps, Republican, Colorado and about 15 members of the house were present, he said.

Replying, Senator Smoot declared that nothing was said or done that I would not have the whole world know. He had called Culbertson in, Senator Smoot said, because the sugar men thought they should have a further hearing before the commission and he knew Culbertson would do what he thought right and proper.

Senator Norris also declared that while the commission was deadlocked, 2 to 3 on the sugar case, Culbertson was offered a transfer to the trade commission

MINE EXPLOSION IS FATAL TO 2; ONE ENTOMBED

RIFLE, Colo., Jan. 23.—A man and a six-year old boy are known to have been killed today and another man is entombed as the result of an explosion in the Harvey Gap mine, 20 miles north-east of here. Another man is perhaps fatally injured.

The mine is a small coal working. The dead boy is William Cook, son of Frank Cook, the miner, who was injured. Dean Bracken, the lease holder and operator, is the other dead person. Ernest Otten, a miner, is trapped in the workings.

The explosion, of undetermined cause, occurred as Bracken was pushing a loaded coal car toward the mine entry. He was about one hundred feet from the entrance and the blast hurled pieces of the car several hundred feet outside the opening. His body was badly mangled.

The Cook boy was in the office, 300 feet from the shaft and was killed when fragments of the coal car were hurled through the walls of the building.

The elder Cook was 400 feet back in the mine and was knocked down. He suffered a broken nose, other broken bones and internal injuries.

Otten's position in the mine is believed to be still further back but it is not believed that the shaft is blocked between him and the rescuers.
