Gov. Pierce Still Undecided Which Office To Seek
SALEM, Ore., Jan. 25.—Governor Walter M. Pierce is still undecided as to whether he will seek reelection or become a candidate for United States senator. He said so last night upon his return to Salem after addressing a law enforcement meeting at Dallas.

Ten days ago the governor authorized the statement that, at the instigation of tried and true friends he was seriously considering a campaign to succeed Senator Robert N. Stanford. If the statement was issued as a feeler the governor admits that it has done little to secure for him any indicative expression of the political field in which his greatest strength lies.

"That statement has brought a surprising response in the form of letters and messages from my friends throughout the state," Governor Pierce said last night. "Some urge me to run for the senate and perhaps more of them advise me to seek reelection as governor. But the weight of the latter is largely offset by the pledge of support for whichever office I decide to seek."

The governor admitted that he sees a fertile field in the senate for one of his economic beliefs, declaring himself to be of the opinion that the line of cleavage between the agricultural and industrial interests is rapidly becoming crystallized into a clear-cut issue that congress must grapple with in the not far distant future. The apparent influence of such a claim is one of the factors inspiring him to consider seeking a seat in the senate.
