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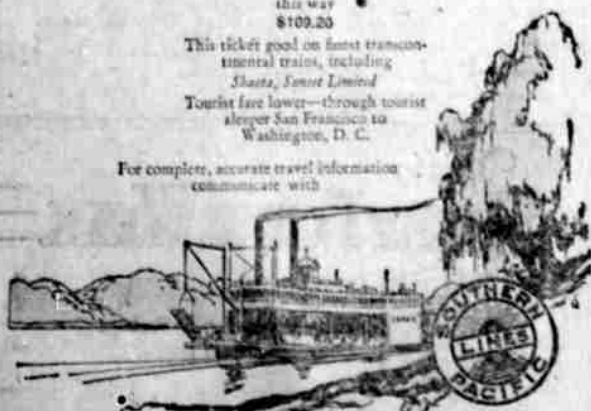
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CLAIM OF POLE DISCOVERY IS VOICED BY COOK

Explorer Still Maintains He
Was First to Reach
North Pole.

DENIAL IS ISSUED

Amundsen Claims He Was
Misquoted and That He
Cast No Reflection
on Peary's Work.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Jan. 25.—Thrust again into the limelight through claims and counter claims as to whether or not he discovered the North Pole, Dr. Frederick A. Cook, now a prisoner at the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth, remains unwavering in his claim to the discovery.

The renewed controversy, precipitated by the reported statement of Captain Roald Amundsen that Cook's claims are as well founded as Admiral R. E. Peary's, was belated last night, when Amundsen denied the statement and declared he had been misunderstood.

"What I said was," Captain Amundsen said, in denying the first statement attributed to him, "that I could not form an opinion, that one similarly situated cannot form an opinion—without first having the opinion of both Cook and Peary before me for study. I was misquoted."

Amundsen said he meant to cast no reflection on the work of Admiral Peary.

In a letter to the Kansas City Journal-Post, Dr. Cook declared that the recent aerial dash to the North Pole by Captain Amundsen and other explorers were bearing out his contentions and that further work in the Arctic will prove his claim.

"It is by his prediction that a pioneer must stand or fall," the letter said, "and I am willing to rest my case with future generations by my published records."

Dr. Cook wrote that many other polar dashes would be undertaken soon, and when this latter work of exploration is completed, the world will be in a position to pass final judgment upon my work and that of Peary.

Commander Donald MacMillan declared that he stood on the spot "where Cook raised his flag and called it the North Pole," and it was 590 miles from the North Pole. Commander MacMillan was one of the three white survivors of Peary's expedition.

"There is no doubt at all," said Commander MacMillan, "in the mind of every man who went with the North Pole. There is no doubt in the mind of virtually every body that Dr. Cook came within 590 miles of it."

MacMillan also states that Peary's claim to having reached the North Pole is fully as good as Amundsen's to having reached the South Pole.

Dr. Cook, in his letter, says he was "the first to report the physical conditions at the pole and that all work since has tended to confirm my reports. Rear Admiral Schley was the first to point out this phase of the rival claims and the spirit of his letter is as true today as it was the day it was written."

"In substance," he said, "the reports of Cook and Peary are the same. Either or both have been to the same place and described the same conditions—or he who came second copied the first. No one has ever accused me of coming second."

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—Brigadier General Adolph W. Greely, American meteorologist and Arctic explorer, entered the revived North Pole discovery controversy with a statement that he was convinced that neither Dr. Frederick A. Cook nor Admiral Robert E. Peary actually reached the pole.

Greely commanded in 1881 the American Arctic expedition, which formed a circum-polar chain of scientific stations for meteorological and other observations. He said neither Cook nor Peary was able to give "unquestionable" proof that they had reached the goal; neither had testimony of scientific witnesses to substantiate their claims as had Amundsen when he announced he had reached the South Pole.

SUPREME COURT REJECTS APPEAL OF CONVICTED SLAYER

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—Isaac Wolfgang, convicted in Los Angeles, Cal., of the murder of a policeman, who was attempting to arrest him for stealing a bottle of milk today lost his appeal in the supreme court.

The supreme court merely announced that the decision of the court below was affirmed. Wolfgang contended that he had been illegally sentenced to death during his absence from court. Although he was present when the death sentence was imposed in the trial court, he was not present when it was reimposed, after the state supreme court had affirmed the conviction. While the case was pending the laws of the state were amended so as to permit a death sentence to be reimposed after appeal in the absence of the convicted person. Wolfgang challenged the validity of the new law.

RADIO TESTS ARE INTERRUPTED BY S. O. S. SIGNALS

NEW YORK, Jan. 25.—A week of international broadcasting commencing last night was interrupted by SOS signals.

The program was interrupted by SOS signals at various points in the United States last night.

For 45 minutes between 10 and 11 p. m. stations along the Atlantic coast were shut down after the Norwegian freighter Solvang and the tanker Vacuum were in collision off Delaware breaker.

As messages telling of the sinking of the Solvang and the rescue of all of her crew but one man went through the air, the chances of reception of American stations abroad, which had been interrupted by SOS signals, were further hampered.

At 11 o'clock, coincident with the lifting of the order of silence, America's turn ended and stations in London, Portsmouth and Liverpool, England; Barcelona, Spain; Lima, Peru; and Buenos Aires took the air.

Almost at once reception of music from LO, London; LOW, Buenos Aires and MSHM, Portsmouth, was reported from London Island and New York.

Later reports reached headquarters for the test at Garden City, N. Y., by radio broadcast magazine of reception of OAX Lima, the British station at CFE, Mexico City and the British stations elsewhere through the United States.

NEWS GLEANINGS FROM ALL PARTS OF THE WORLD

The Earl of Birkenhead, secretary of state for India started out early in life to be a stenographer, but he did not get very far.

He made this revelation in an address to the graduating class of a commercial college. "I thought I would rather be a shorthand reporter than anything else in the world and I worked like a beaver," he said. "I was a wonder. I broke all speed records. My teachers had never seen anyone who developed such speed. But there was a rude awakening. Nobody else could read my notes and I couldn't read them myself. So my shorthand ambitions came to a sudden end."

Miss Gertrude Rickards, 70 years old, is challenging the pedestrian record of Edward Payson Weston, the veteran American walker. She recently completed a walking tour of 1,644 miles through Scotland and England.

Had weather has checked Miss Rickards' tour, but she will resume it next spring. When she sold her country home in 1923, she took up walking to amuse herself.

Miss Rickards always lunched on cheese and biscuits while on her tour and had her other meals in inns. She says she never experienced the slightest loneliness and always knitted or embroidered while she was resting by the roadside at lunch time.

PARIS, Jan. 25.—President Doumergue—"the prisoner of the Elisee," as the chief magistrate of France is known—has at last broken through the barriers of his rigid social calendar and obtained two private luncheon dates a week for himself, with no questions to be asked or admissions given by his official social advisers.

The French smoker, as represented by "the National League for the Defense of Smokers," began the new year with a resolution, a determination not to submit mildly to the designs of each successive finance minister to make him the gold mine for replenishing the treasury's empty coffers.

The council of the league had a meeting to consider the government's proposal to raise tobacco prices to five times the present level. A resolution was voted, warning the government that "these prohibitive rates" would defeat their own ends and pointing out that the last increase in the price of tobacco supplied by the state monopoly, which was made in May, 1925, had resulted in diminishing receipts to 25,000,000 francs below the budget estimates.

King Carnival, the 48th of his line, makes state entry into Nice on February 4. His majesty's tastes are so exacting that workmen have been kept busy for weeks preparing for the event. The decorations this year are so elaborate that the three weeks allotted for the work will hardly be sufficient to complete them and erect the grandstands along the line of march.

"Battles of Flowers" take place on February 11 and 12 and on March 11. The biggest night of the fête will be Roman in character and will be called an evening with "Petronius." Only costumes of the Roman era will be worn.

All night sittings of the chamber of deputies, which have been quite usual in recent months are "ham and cheese" nights to the chamber attendants. As soon as it is known that a session is to go on, the refreshment manager sends out for extra provisions and between 8 and 9 in the evening great baskets of bread, butter, red and white wine, and above all, ham and cheese make their appearance.

There used to be a restaurant in the chamber, but the proprietor lost so much money that he finally gave it up.

The Paris press has been generous with tributes to the memory of Sergei Yesenin, the young Russian poet, who was the husband of Isadora Duncan and who committed suicide in Moscow recently. He was long one of the most familiar figures in Paris, where his death is regarded as the tragic ending of a career which, but for the ruin wrought by drink and drugs might have been a brilliant one. He is characterized as one who might have been the Russian Virgil and written Stav "Georgia" had his life been turned into different channels.

One of his last poems has just been published here showing how bitterly he was disillusioned when he returned to his native land.

"I no longer understand the language of my own people; I have become a stranger in my own country—I, who once was ever bawling out what friends were, I and the people. No one here has any farther need of my poetry and in truth no one here has any further need for me."

Having achieved what they consider something near perfection in the art of bobbing and shingling women's hair, mainly through technical classes in most of the large centers, Lansdowne hair dressers are turning their attention to more man. BERLIN, Jan. 25.—Appealing to the German passion for official titles, the Bavarian government frequently referred to as the "royal bavaria republic," has manufactured a number of titles, 150 of which have been bestowed upon men of various callings, including veterinarians, labor union secretaries, master plumbers, furnace tenders and teamsters.

Each of the titles contains the coveted suffix "Rat" which means "Councillor." An "arbeitsrat"—privy councillor of labor—can be a plumber, carpenter or anyone who has distinguished himself by working. The title "veternar-rat" has been bestowed on several horse doctors. Dispensers of pills have dispensed with the suffix "Herr Pharmacist."

Heated controversy has been aroused by the titular awards. The radical trade union leaders charge the aldermanic government with attempting to bribe socialists and communists into submission. Others assert the awards violate the republican constitution of the reich, which prohibits the awarding of titles. Herr Roterland, Herr Grier, two Christian trade union secretaries were among those who have returned their patents of "arbeitsrat" to the government.

Blood tests to identify descendants of those who crossed the Atlantic on the Mayflower or to expose fake survivors of the Light Brigade will soon be possible if experiments of Dr. E. O. Manoff, Russian blood specialist, are extended, this scientist claims.

The legend "blood will tell" is literally true, Dr. Manoff says. Though his experiments have been limited to Europeans, he asserts that by blood analysis he can tell a Chinese from a Japanese, a German from a Pole. Out of 1,302 Russians and Jews whose ancestry has been traced, Dr. Manoff said that his tests enabled him to distinguish between the two races with 88 per cent accuracy.

At a clinic attended by five distinguished savants who took samples of blood from 292 persons of various races and nationalities, Dr. Manoff, without seeing the persons, diagnosed correctly the nationalities and race of 187, a error of only 1.5 per cent. His analysis was based upon color solutions, crossy violet, he says, disappears entirely in a few drops of Jewish blood. It retains its color, however, in Russian blood.
