MEMBERS OF BOAT CREW KILLED IN BRAWL WITH JAP

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 26.—John R. Vernon, a member of the engine room gang of the steamer West O'Rowa died at Hakodate, Japan, yesterday, in the custody of the Japanese police from injuries received in a brawl with Japanese Sunday. This was reported in a cablegram received today by the Columbia Pacific Shipping Company, operator of the West O'Rowa.

Associated Press dispatches reported that the fight started as a result of a quarrel between Vernon and an interpreter.

Vernon signed on the West O'Rowa here November 11.

The cablegram received by the Columbia Pacific Shipping Company requested that B. L. Friend, of Wenatchee, Wash., be notified.

The Associated Press dispatches via Tokyo reported that Captain Robert Wilson of the West O'Rowa absolved the Japanese of the blame. The official report asserted that Vernon had been drinking.

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 26.—Frank Boutin of Portland was high bidder today for 30,000,000 feet of yellow pine in Klamath county that is being sold by the state land board. His bid was \$162,752 or \$5.42 per thousand. The minimum appraised was \$3,550.

G. C. Lorenz of Klamath Falls bid \$121,000 and Richard H. Hovey of San Francisco \$121,000.

Lorenz and Hovey each made proposals as to deferred payments while Boutin made no mention of deferred payments. The terms will be fixed by the land board today. Each bidder accompanied his bid with a check for 25 per cent of the amount bid. All payments must be made prior to cutting.

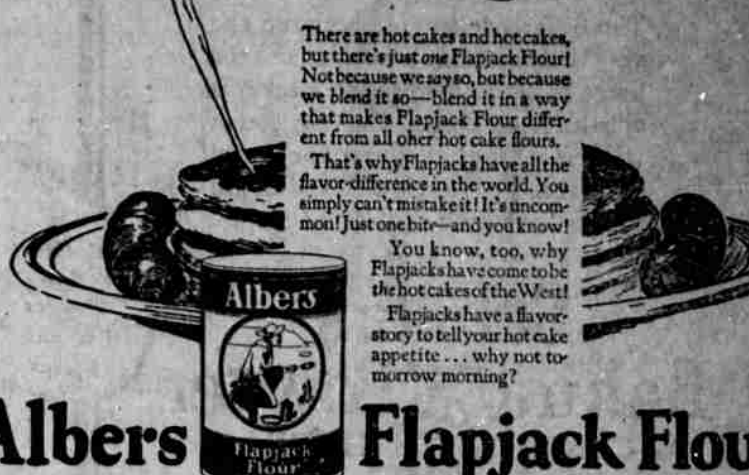

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 26.—The famous old Turk, Zaro Agha, who claims that he is one hundred and fifty years makes him the oldest man in the world, is to be honored, and saved from starvation, by the city of Constantinople.

The aged man has been unable for the past year or two to carry on his lifelong trade as hama. The hama are the delivery wagons of Turkey and it is a common thing to see one of these porters, bent nearly double, plodding along the street with a piano on his back.

As Zaro Agha has grown somewhat too old for this Herculean occupation he has found it difficult to supply himself with the bread and cheese of existence.

Now the prefect of Constantinople has appointed Zaro as door-keeper for the municipal council. Therefore, he will now have not only bread and cheese aplenty, a uniform and a warm place to sit in, but a feeling of importance befitting the dignity of his years.

HAUGEN BILL PASSED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26.—The Haugen bill to establish a cooperative marketing division in the Department of Agriculture was passed today by the house.

The measure now goes to the senate. It carries an appropriation of \$25,000, to accomplish the work of the new division the first of the year. It is designed to aid cooperative marketing organizations in disposing of their crops.
