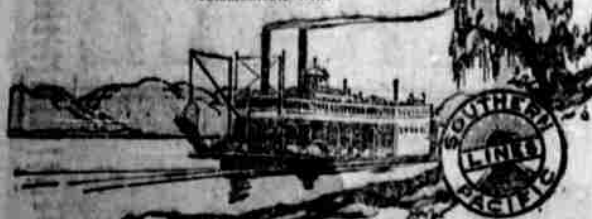

## FISHING TUGS ARE LOST ON LAKE DURING A BAD STORM

MUSKOGON, Mich., Jan. 28.—Two fishing tugs, Helen M. and Indian with eight men aboard caught in the terrific gale on Lake Michigan dropped out of sight at 2 a. m. today, coast guards reported. The tugs had been drifting to the south during the night and the blizzard made it impossible to locate them.

Shortly after daybreak the coast guard crew started out in a blizzard in search of the tugs. During the night the coast guard got within half a mile of the tugs but could not shoot a line to the helpless vessel.

The steamer Albatross, one of the most powerful ice cruisers on the lake attempted to reach the tugs last night, but after forcing her way through the harbor, and into the lake was compelled to return and seek shelter in the channel.

The tugs were out yesterday morning, spending the day at fishing grounds far off port, unaware of the approaching storm.

## SUB-ZERO TEMP- ERATURE ENGULFS GREAT LAKE AREA

CHICAGO, Jan. 28.—The second taste of sub-zero temperatures within a fortnight flaked with snow, wind and ice was on the weather menu of the northwest and Great Lakes today.

At Bemidji, Minn., the thermometer reached 24 below zero last night and three other points reported minus 16. Elsewhere in the state wind and snow hampered traffic. One bus bound from Albert Lea, Minn., to Mason City, Iowa, was nearly buried in a huge drift.

One man was found frozen on a prairie on Chicago's far south side. Force of the wind broke windows as the mercury dipped. No snow but continued cold was forecast for today.

At Welles, N. D., twelve cars of a Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railway freight train were derailed when a rail split under the force of the frigidity.

## ROLLING ROCK WAS CAUSE OF R. R. WRECK

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—A rock rolling down the hillside above a railroad track, was the cause of a wreck October 10, 1925, at Blalock, Oregon, in which one man was killed and 24 persons injured, safety inspectors who investigated reported today to the Interstate Commerce Commission.

A heavy rain loosened the boulder from its position several hundred yards away from the track, the report asserted. Bounding down, the stone struck the rail with such force as to bend the steel sharply out of line and was itself smashed into three pieces which rolled on downward.

A few minutes later the passenger train hit the spot at full speed and immediately left the rails. The trail of the traveling rock was easily discernible after the wreck, the inspectors declared.

## LUMBERMEN MEETING.

SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 28.—To consider extension problems of the lumber industry, four hundred men gathered here today for a mass meeting called by the West Coast Lumbermen's association.

Tentative plans call for expenditure of \$475,000 a year for three years to advertise products of the west coast association mills, and a nation-wide campaign is to be launched at once. The mills of western Washington and Oregon sell 26 per cent of the lumber of the nation consumed annually, but have capacity to produce forty per cent.

Farrar sing "Madame Butterfly" at the Metropolitan. It was the first opera Miss Lewis had ever heard and she vowed that she would some day appear there.

At that time she was singing and dancing in a Greenwich Village cabaret. Three years later she scored her first operatic success, as Marguerite in "Faust" at the Vienna opera house.
