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TO ASK JAPANESE STUDENTS TO STUDY IN THE UNITED STATES

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 28.—(A. P.)—Under plans launched by the American Friends Service Committee a selected group of Japanese students will be invited to come to the United States next autumn to study in colleges and universities as the guests of Americans.

The Friends Service committee said that a nationwide appeal would be made for cooperation in carrying out their plans. A number of colleges already have volunteered.

"This is the first concrete proposal," said a statement, "to give general expression to the widespread desire to improve our relations with the people of Japan. If the quota law were applied to Japanese as it is to Europeans the approximate number of Japanese immigrants admitted yearly would be only 150. We hope to be able to extend an invitation to at least 150 students."

VALIDITY OF QUARANTINE ON ALFALFA IS BEING QUESTIONED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—The validity of a quarantine order of the director of agriculture of the state of Washington, regulating the entering into the state and transporting through it by railroads, alfalfa hay, coming from Utah and certain portions of Idaho, Wyoming, Colorado, Oregon and Nevada, was argued today before the supreme court in the case appealed by the Oregon-Washington Railway & Navigation Company. The state contended that the order was based upon a state law and was issued on the theory that alfalfa hay originating in the banned districts was presumptively infested or infected with weevil, their eggs, larvae, etc., and that the state law prohibiting railroads from shipping such hay through the state otherwise than in sealed containers was a valid exercise of state authority.

The order was attacked on the ground that congress alone had power to regulate commerce among states. It was insisted that the secretary of agriculture had authority to prevent the spread of plant diseases and that the matter was exclusively in the control of the federal government. The order was also assailed as arbitrary and embracing extensive territory free from alfalfa weevils.

"That's the last straw," Marshall told the detective. "What's the use? I'll be frank enough to tell you that I will end my life at the first opportunity."

Orders were sent to the prison at once to place a special guard over the prisoner.

Described by the police as the most amazing criminal in the history of Pennsylvania, Marshall today was a mental and physical wreck, guards said.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 28.—Formal recommendations for greater activity throughout the diocese in the direction of week-day religious education on school time, in accordance with the new state laws, was made by the 38th convention of the Episcopal diocese of Oregon today.

This followed recommendations by Bishop Walter Taylor Sumner in his charge yesterday afternoon. The bishop's charge and the report of the council offered the greater part of the session yesterday afternoon. Nominations were made, for confirmation today, of delegates to the provincial synod, the standing committee and the bishop's council.

R. W. Hastings was elected treasurer of the diocese; Judge W. T. Slater of Portland, chancellor; Dean Vincent, treasurer for the missionary funds. Rev. Mr. Lockwood and Dr. F. F. F. were re-elected trustees of the diocese.

The budget recommended for 1926 includes \$7,640 for diocesan expenses and \$21,643.26 for missions, of which \$7200 will go for missions outside the diocese. Bishop Sumner reported that a new cathedral is to be built in Portland and a \$100,000 wing is planned for St. Helens Hall. Episcopal school for girls in Portland.

BUSINESS IS GOOD.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 28.—Activity in general business and trade in the 12th federal reserve district was at high levels during 1925. John Porrin, chairman of the board and federal reserve agent, related in a report to the board.

"The increases in trade volume in general were larger than could be accounted for by normal increases in population and anticipated development of natural resource of the district," the report states.

A new annual record in value of building permits issued in 20 cities was established. There were 133,702 certificates for new construction issued at a value of \$421,594,906, exceeding 1913, the former record year, when the total was \$419,726,721. By geographical groups, the totals were southern California \$199,525,000; northern California \$123,305,000; Pacific northwest \$84,387,000; intermountain states \$14,368,000.

Winter wheat and other growing crops are in good condition except in parts of the Pacific northwest where cold weather has damaged grain.

MARKETS

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 28.—Potato buying in the country has eased up considerably during the past few days although there are still a few lots being picked up here and there. One reason for the lull at this time is the inability of buyers to get supplies at a price they can turn at a profit. Most of the growers are still bullish and in no hurry to sell.

Shipping outlets are limited and buyers are loath to go over \$2.50 for U. S. No. 1 Burbanks. Some purchases are still being made at \$2.75 but it is generally fancy stuff and allows the jobber a very narrow working margin.

Los Angeles is about the best outlet at this time. The south is still quoting \$3.75 on No. 1 Burbanks but they must be real fancy, in new sacks and accompanied by government inspection. It costs approximately 60 cents to lay them down in the southern city.

Eastern markets remain slow and weak with hardly enough trading to establish definite levels. Recent gains in the fresh egg market are well maintained. On the dairy exchange fresh standard firsts are a cent higher at 32c, now being the same price as fresh medium. Undersized also advanced a cent to 26 cents. Other grades held firm.

Fractional losses are shown in the cube butter market with both extras and standards a half cent lower. The make continues good but there is little action here and the market as a whole remains in good shape.

Approximately 400,000 pounds of wool have been sold to meet manufacturing requirements by the Pacific Cooperative Wool Growers association during the past week. This is in line with their orderly marketing policy of disposing of their accumulations of wool from time to time as supplies are needed.

The wools sold consisted of fine grade original bag and scoured holdings at Portland and in the Boston and Philadelphia headquarters of the association.

The association reports that it has handled approximately 6,000,000 pounds of wool for the year 1925.

That there is some activity in the local wool market is partially confirmed through the contracting of space for nearly 250,000 pounds on boats to leave this port in the near future.

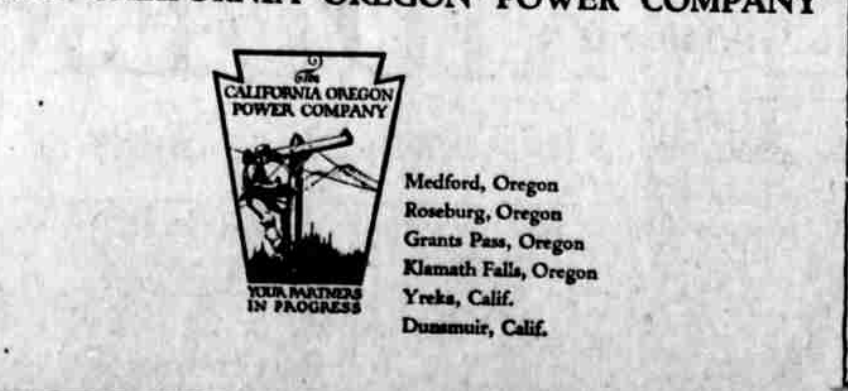
