plunged out a little and show an improvement. So do not allow the thought of wrinkling and looking older stand in your way. And don't allow the adverse comments of your friends to affect you. There are some precautions that you should take, and they are: don't reduce too rapidly—no over one and one-half to two pounds a week, after the first week's loss, when—if you want on the shrink-stomach period—you may have lost five to ten pounds. Give some special thought to your face, in the form of facial massages. If you can, take them at a beauty parlor, if not, you can yourself give your face a tonic treatment, three

times each day, of some smart slapping over cold cream, with light patting around the eyes. The smart slapping and patting are now used at most of the beauty parlors instead of the stroking movements. Then follows the application of some ice-cold water or some ice. The neck seems to be the part which bothers the most. I have given you exercises for this in a previous article.

If your skin has lost its elasticity and if your face has been very much puffed out with fat, a skillful plastic surgeon (not a beauty specialist) easily can remedy the loose folds. I believe, however, that if you will reduce very gradually and keep your skin toned up, you won't have to resort to this.
