The biggest mortgage ever recorded in Douglas county, was presented to County Clerk I. B. Riddle today, the mortgage being given by the Crown Willamette Paper Company to the Continental and Commercial Trust and Savings Bank to secure an issue of \$25,000,000 six per cent bonds, which are to be sold and the money used for development purposes. The mortgage contained 314 printed pages with 135 pages of description covering timber lands in Nevada, California, Oregon and Washington. The recording fee was \$251.20.

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NEW CASES TO BE SUBMITTED TO GRAND JURY

Five Arrests Over Week End With Investigations to Be Made.

MOONSHINE IS FOUND

Booze Cases, Sheep Stealing and Worthless Check Passing to Be Probed During Term.

The Douglas county grand jury met this morning to start its work for the February term. With 21 prisoners in the county jail and with five fugitives from justice after breaking from the jail, the grand jury has a great amount of work ahead of it. The turkey lift cases were taken up today, the first witnesses being called this afternoon.

Five cases were added over the week end, Floyd Finley of Elkton, being arrested on a charge of sheep stealing, Claude and West Elder being taken into custody accused of passing worthless checks and Gale Hamilton and J. A. Kirby being arrested on a charge of possession of liquor.

Finley was arrested late Saturday at Elkton, accused of having stolen sheep belonging to R. C. Blackford of Elkton. He waived examination and was bound over to the grand jury, which will investigate his case.

Claude and West Elder were brought in from Glendale where they are accused of having passed several worthless checks. They also will be investigated by the grand jury.

Gale Hamilton and J. A. Kirby were arrested Saturday night at a late hour, when officers broke into Kirby's home on Stephens and Blakely streets and confiscated five pint bottles of moonshine.

The city officers made this arrest but the case was turned over to the county and will go before the grand jury.

The grand jury was delayed somewhat today by the failure of some of its members to arrive until late this afternoon and its actual inquiry into pending cases was not started until an afternoon hour.

The first to be considered will be the turkey thefts from Sutherland, P. S. Padelford and Jess and William Wiles are all held for investigation on charges of robbing turkey roasts.

Although a number of prisoners have succeeded in escaping from the county jail, where they were awaiting grand jury action, their cases will be investigated and indictments or not true bills returned.

ONE OF ESCAPED PRISONERS RETAKEN AT RIDDLE SATURDAY

Charles Shulke, one of the five prisoners, who escaped last Saturday morning from the county jail, was captured Saturday night at Riddle and brought to Roseburg by Deputy Sheriff George Brannan. Shulke was found on the streets of Riddle, apparently trying to obtain something to eat. He is wanted by the government on a charge of breaking seals on interstate shipments, and will be taken to Portland tonight by United States Deputy Marshal C. C. Wells. His companion, Tom Reed was taken to Portland Saturday.

Shulke confessed that he and Schaffer stole the Ford coupe in Edenbower Saturday morning and drove it to Myrtle Creek, where they abandoned it, when officers started in pursuit. He and Schaffer separated from Sacks, Holtsclaw and Moore at Edenbower, after they had secured the car, he told the officers. He denied any knowledge of the plans of the other three for escaping. Schaffer is believed to be in the neighborhood of Riddle, but has not yet been located. He will be starved into making an appearance, officers believe.
