COCKFIGHT ENDS WHEN OFFICERS ARRIVE ON SCENE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 1.—An international cockfight, with entrants from Tijuana, Mexico into Canada, and from a number of way points, was broken up at St. Paul, Oregon, yesterday afternoon when Prohibition Director Levens and 30 other officers, moved in on a hop house on the Ben Smith ranch, arrested a number of ring leaders and dispersed the crowd. One cock was dead and four others injured according to the casualty list up to the time of the arrest.

Glen Harmon, Ed Dermuth, Paul Borman, G. D. Hartman and Ralph Stone of Portland; Ben Smith of Champe, and J. Barry of Oregon City, were all placed under arrest. They appeared before the justice of the peace at Woodburn and released on \$25 bail, to appear Wednesday.

Officers stated over 200 high class fighting cocks were stored in and about the hop house ready for the fray. Over 100 men were said to have been in attendance at an admission fee of \$5 each. Officers state that plans had been laid for the fight for weeks, this being an annual tournament of leading fighting cocks from all up and down the coast.

Prohibition Director Levens said the raid was instigated by the State Humane Society, Field Officer Wade of that organization took the matter up with Governor Pierce, who gave orders for the raid and Levens took part on the supposition that liquor would be found.

In addition to the cock fighters, a gallon of moonshine and a pint flask of liquor were taken but no arrests were made on liquor charges. So far, according to District Attorney Carson of this county, no statute has been found directly making cock fighting an offense against the laws of the state.

LEVENS CASE IS DISMISSED TODAY

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Feb. 1.—Charges against W. S. Levens, state prohibition commissioner and W. H. McBride, state prohibition agent, arising out of two indictments returned by a Klamath county grand jury last summer, were dismissed this morning by Circuit Judge Percy R. Kelly, at the motion of E. A. Baker of Salem, representing the state attorney general's office in the cases. Lack of evidence was given as reason for dismissal.

Levens was charged with having unlawfully taken possession of a pistol in a raid conducted in Klamath Falls early last summer. McBride was charged with having failed to make a lawful return of a search warrant, the same search warrant which gave Levens and McBride authority to raid the house.

The case has been postponed, due to affidavits of prejudice filed against the Klamath circuit judge, A. L. Leavitt. Judge Percy R. Kelly of Salem was named to preside in the case.

His first visit to Klamath county resulted in little or nothing accomplished in the case against state officials. Sickness prevented a second visit the middle of last month.

Mr. Baker in his motion to the court emphasized the fact that to go through with the case, with the evidence available, would be a useless expenditure of money and with a subsequent verdict of not guilty, in both cases, a certainty.

navy, coast guard, customs service, reclamation, post office, treasury and other activities was reported today to the house.

The items include:

For refund of illegally collected taxes \$149,250,000; for increased postal salaries \$97,265,000; for forest roads and trails \$26,675,000 and for the veterans bureau \$78,000,000, of which \$5,000,000 is for hospital construction and the remainder to meet the cost of the bonus.

An appropriation of \$7,674,000 is carried for the coast guard, of which the committee report on the measure said:

"Practically all of this is due to the increased and onerous duties which have been placed upon the service in connection with the preventing of smuggling of liquor and combating the activities of the rum runner."

The bill would allot \$600,000 for reconditioning five 1,000-ton destroyers to be transferred to the coast guard from the navy; \$3,150,000 for acquisition of thirty-five 125-foot off shore patrol boats and \$150,000 for five seaplanes. The remainder would care for operating expenses and an increase in personnel by eighty warrant officers and 503 enlisted men.

Other appropriations provide for expenditures as follows:

For border patrol to prevent smuggling of aliens \$150,000.

For deportations of aliens \$450,000.

To start construction of the Kittitas reclamation project in Washington \$2,000,000.

New equipment and construction work at Dam No. 2, Muscle Shoals, Ala., \$2,000,000.

Purchase of airplanes to give flight training to naval academy graduates \$340,000, and for completion of a pier at the Puget Sound, Wash., navy yard \$540,000.

Hospital appropriations carried included:

A 300-bed hospital at Portland, Ore., \$1,350,000.
