BULLETS ARE FOUND INSIDE OF MUSHROOMS

(Associated Press Licensed Wire.)
BOSTON, Jan. 30.—Copper bullets filled with a powerful explosive were found in the stems of mushrooms imported from Russia and received by a Worcester jobber, Major Francis Meredith, director of the state department of labor, announced today. An investigation has been begun by the United States food and drug division to which the cap was turned over.

The mushrooms, Major Meredith said, came from a New York importing firm which in turn had received them from Russia.

An inspector who investigated the case said the bullets were an inch and a half long and as big around as the average lead pencil. Each bullet, he said, contained sufficient explosive to cause considerable damage. Major Meredith said complaints had been received recently that dried mushrooms had

NEW FAST FREIGHT SERVICE TO HAVE ROSEBURG STATION

Acme Service Secured for Benefit of Roseburg Merchants—Local Firm to Deliver.

Through the efforts of the Roseburg Merchants Association a new freight service giving quicker and more direct deliveries from the Atlantic coast have been arranged for the benefit of the business firms of this city. Negotiations have been under way for several months with the Acme Fast Freight Service, for the establishment of a station in Roseburg, and this station has at last been secured.

The Acme service is between express and freight. It is slower than express, yet faster than freight, and the cost of transportation is between the rates of the two services.

The service operates only between producing centers in the east and middle west and the Pacific coast. Receiving stations are New York, Brooklyn, Newark, Philadelphia, Boston, Rochester, Chicago and St. Louis. Roseburg merchants ordering goods may have them sent from any of these receiving stations to Roseburg by the fast service, which provides receipt within 14 days from New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Brooklyn, Rochester and Newark, 11 days from Chicago and 10 days from St. Louis.

The Acme service is operating its own cars over the railroad routes to the west, and through arrangements with the railroad company the cars are handled at a faster rate of speed than freight, insuring prompt delivery of merchandise.

Urgent stations are located at Albany, Ashland, Astoria, Eugene, Medford, Portland and Roseburg. Arrangements have been made whereby the H. S. French Transfer company will cooperate with the Acme service and will unload the cars here and make local deliveries.
