RECLAIM BREEDING GROUNDS.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—The reclamation of breeding grounds of the water fowl that used to frequent the lower Klamath Lake on the boundary of California and Oregon will be the subject of a conference shortly to be held between Reclamation Commissioner Mead and E. W. Nelson, director of the biological survey of the department of agriculture.

A biological survey says the draining of the lakes along the Pacific coast threatens extinction of all water fowl which used to breed in them and asserts that a restoration of the lower Klamath Lake would partially avert this.

Birds along the edges of the old lake will be protected in any event, both Mead and Nelson declared, but it may be necessary to appeal to congress to appropriate funds for a dike to hold back the water from arable lands.

The flooding of the lake is said to be supported by sportsmen's associations on the coast and Mead has recently received many requests from such sources that prompt action be taken.

MEASURE AFFECTS COOPERATIVE ASSNS.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—A measure to declare illegal cooperative associations which do not sustain normal competition and which attempt fixing of uniform prices through dissemination of trade information was introduced today by Senator King, Democrat, Utah.

The measure would exempt products of agriculture and organizations in export trade. Declaring this was only one effort at combinations "for the control of necessities," Senator King said attention could be directed to "many conspiracies in restraint of trade, which in the end must destroy the economic system in the United States."

"I do not expect the department of justice to act," he said. "They are sleeping while these great trusts are being formed."

The federal trade commission is inept. I do not say that a majority are protecting the predatory interests but a majority take a view contrary to the spirit of the trade commission act. They are derelict in the discharge of their duties.

"There are bills here proposing to abolish the federal trade commission and some of us intend to press them, not that we do not think the commission has been useful in the past, but that it has outlived its usefulness as now directed."

"The present administration is wholly indifferent to the growth of monopolies and trusts. Indeed, the President of the United States in his speech recently in New York seemed to pronounce a benediction on these great organizations."

SENATE ASKED TO MAKE PROBE ALUMINUM CASE

Senator Walsh, Democrat, Urges Investigation of Mellon's Company.

OPINION REFUSED

Attorney General Sargent Refuses to Say Whether Trade Commission May Withhold Evidence.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—With the senate judiciary committee considering a proposal for congressional inquiry into the Aluminum Company of America in which Secretary Mellon is interested, Attorney General Sargent today refused to give the senate an opinion as to the right of the federal trade commission to withhold evidence in its possession. Having his refusal on a point which he said had been obtained "for more than a century," the attorney general advised the senate in a letter that he could find no authority for the rendering of formal opinions on points of law at the request of either house of congress. Mr. Sargent's letter added, however, that he had no objection to giving an informal expression of his views on the question.

He then said it was his unofficial opinion that the refusal of the federal trade commission to turn over to the justice department evidence it gathered "cannot, under existing law, be remedied if any proceedings brought by the attorney general."

The senate ordered the original inquiry be said, and it alone has the power to compel the commission to divulge the facts in the case.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—Senate investigation of the Aluminum Company of America in which Secretary Mellon is a large stockholder, is recommended in a report submitted to the judiciary committee by Secretary Walsh, Democrat, of Montana.

This proposal is made, the senator says, because of "doubts as to the vigor and good faith of the department of justice in the conduct of its inquiry to establish whether the Aluminum Company has violated a federal court consent decree entered against it in 1912."

Besides recommending what would be a third investigation of the Mellon company within four years, Senator Walsh asks that the senate direct the federal trade commission to turn over to it all the evidence furnished by the Aluminum company and which the commission withheld from the justice department on the ground that it is "confidential."

Describing this action of the commission as "senseless," Senator Walsh takes the position that since the senate ordered the commission to make the investigation in the first instance it can compel production of the evidence.

Attorney General Sargent and other officials of the justice department are sharply assailed by Senator Walsh for the manner in which the trade commission has since the senate ordered the investigation in the first instance it can compel production of the evidence.

Calling attention to evidence adduced at the judiciary committee hearing on the subject showed that months elapsed before any move made to make the senator declares that had the department moved with celerity it would have obtained the "confidential evidence" subsequently withheld from it.

The report emphasizes that while an agent of the department was finding from a field inquiry that the Aluminum industry was well satisfied with existing conditions, an investigator of the trade commission found a much complaint against the Aluminum Company of America and obtained evidence on which the commission issued a complaint last summer. This complaint is to be brought to trial February 15.

"It is sufficient to say," Senator Walsh continues, "that no business organization could tolerate such procrastination on the part of its legal bureau as has characterized the action of the department of justice in the matter under inquiry nor would it be regarded as exculpation on the part of the head of such bureau to say that he entrusted the work to subordinates in whom he had confidence. It is not expected that the attorney-general will be conversant with the details of all litigation before his department and he may be well entirely ignorant of some matters having or calling for his attention, but it is not too much to expect that he will at least be informed concerning a charge by his predecessor and another branch of the government in effect, that a fellow member of the cabinet at least a corporation of which he is the dominant factor, has been guilty of contemptuous disregard of an injunction of a federal court."

CLERGYMAN ACTED AS EAVESDROPPER TO NAB BOOTLEGGER

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
SEATTLE, Jan. 30.—A clergyman today entered a \$500,000 liquor conspiracy case here as a phone-tapper in one of Seattle's principal residential districts.

The Rev. Dr. James E. Milligan, pastor of the Queen Anne Methodist Episcopal Church, helped eavesdrop on a line into the home of Richard Elbro, indicted as bookkeeper for Roy Olmstead, the government disclosed.

Olmstead, former lieutenant of Seattle police, is chief defendant in a federal trial that opened January 19 and resumes Monday after adjournment yesterday.

Federal dry agents had their listening post in the clergymans garage just around the corner from where Elbro is alleged to have had liquor cache and received orders for its distribution to well known citizens.

Prosecutor Colvin let it be known today that he was watching for a chance to start something legal against Mayor Edwin J. Brown, whose name was mentioned Thursday by eavesdropper witnesses, but that he had not yet seen anything that would be court evidence against Brown.

HIJACKERS HELD ON BOOZE CHARGE

EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 1.—On charges growing out of a recent alleged hijacking party in Oakridge, five men including Dr. L. W. Peete, justice of peace, and Al Haynie, deputy sheriff and constable of the district, are under arrest in the Oakridge district after having knowledge of violation of the state prohibition law of the state of Oregon.

Jack Wright, barber, and Walter Wright, his 17-year-old son, a student in the Oakridge high school, and Harry Brown, pool hall proprietor, are held on charges of perjury.

The arrests were made yesterday following a thorough investigation of the alleged hijacking of a liquor runner on December 10, when 40 gallons of liquor were said to have been obtained. The state expects to prove that Haynie was an active participant in the taking of liquor from the rum runner, officers declare.

Malfeasance in office is the charge the officers are hoping to prove against both Haynie and Peete. It is said that the two Wrights and Brown are alleged to have given false testimony in regard to their supposed knowledge of the hijacking affair, at a hearing before the district attorney.

STORM KING IS HEADED FOR THE PACIFIC COAST

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 1.—The storm king is getting together another army of high winds and rain-furled thunder heads to head against the Pacific coast following the successful assaults of two such hosts in the past week. The storm was heading today off the Aleutian Islands and the United States weather bureau says that it will cover approximately the same territory as that covered by the two previous disturbances.

High winds, heavy rains and thick snows are expected. It was announced while the dripping heels of the last disturbance were still upon the coast tier of states that it will be as welcome as the other storm was, with their promise of salvation to parched crops and pitifully low water reservoirs.

In the present storm period, which began on January 23, Santa Rosa has had 8.18 inches of rain, while the fall at Red Bluff has been 6.02 inches. This has resulted in many creeks and small rivers approaching the flood stage, but no damage has been reported. Eleven inches of new snow fell in the high Sierras at Summit yesterday, making 32 inches on the ground at the last measurement. It was still snowing hard today.

No warnings have been put up as yet for the new disturbance, as it is not expected to strike the coast before tomorrow night.

LIVESTOCK CENSUS.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—Livestock on farms and ranges in the United States had a total value of \$5,001,297,000 on January 1, this year, compared with \$4,685,221,000 on that date a year ago, the department of agriculture announced today in its estimate.

Horses numbered 15,778,000 and were valued at \$1,026,905,000. Mules numbered 5,780,000 and were valued at \$469,887,000.

All cattle and calves numbered \$9,829,000 and were valued at \$2,297,510,000. Cows and heifers two years old and over kept for milk numbered 22,290,000 and were valued at \$1,278,877,000.

Heifers one to two years old being kept for milk, numbered 3,801,000, value not given. Sheep and lambs numbered 49,748,000 and were valued at \$427,647,000. Swine and pigs numbered 51,225,000 and were valued at \$779,345,000.

DISMISS INDICTMENT.

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Feb. 1.—Indictment against E. L. Elliott, Klamath county district attorney, charging malfeasance in public office, was dismissed this afternoon by Judge Percy Kelly, following a motion by Elissa A. Baker, representing the state attorney general's office. Mr. Baker stated that there was not sufficient evidence to warrant prosecution.

Mr. Elliott was indicted last summer by the Klamath county grand jury, which, in the charge, alleged that he had sold sugar confiscated by prohibition officers, for his own gain.
