CHIEF WITNESS HAS DISAPPEARED

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 3.—Jim Stayton, chief witness for the government in the conspiracy charges being pressed against Bob and A. C. Smith and Arthur Christensen, state prohibition agents, has disappeared. Announcement was made in federal court today that Stayton vanished several days ago, and that an extended search by department of justice operatives and deputy United States marshals, has failed to locate him.

Judge Wolverton's court was crowded today. Men and women had flocked to hear Governor Pierce testify in behalf of the three prohibition agents. Owing to the long examinations to which the government's witnesses are subjected, the governor was not called. He may not appear until Thursday or Friday.

State prohibition commissioner Levens listened to the testimony today. There were sharp clashes between United States Deputy District Attorney Stearns and Elton Watkins, attorney for the defendants. Stearns accused Watkins of talking over the case with Claud R. Hart, one of the government's witnesses.

Hart has a grocery store in Portland. He visited a still on an island in the Willamette river near St. Paul with Tom Gibson, Stayton, Al Luark and others July 8, 1925. It is liquor secured in a raid on this still that deputy state prohibition agents are charged with having conspired to sell to Gibson, Luark and Stayton.

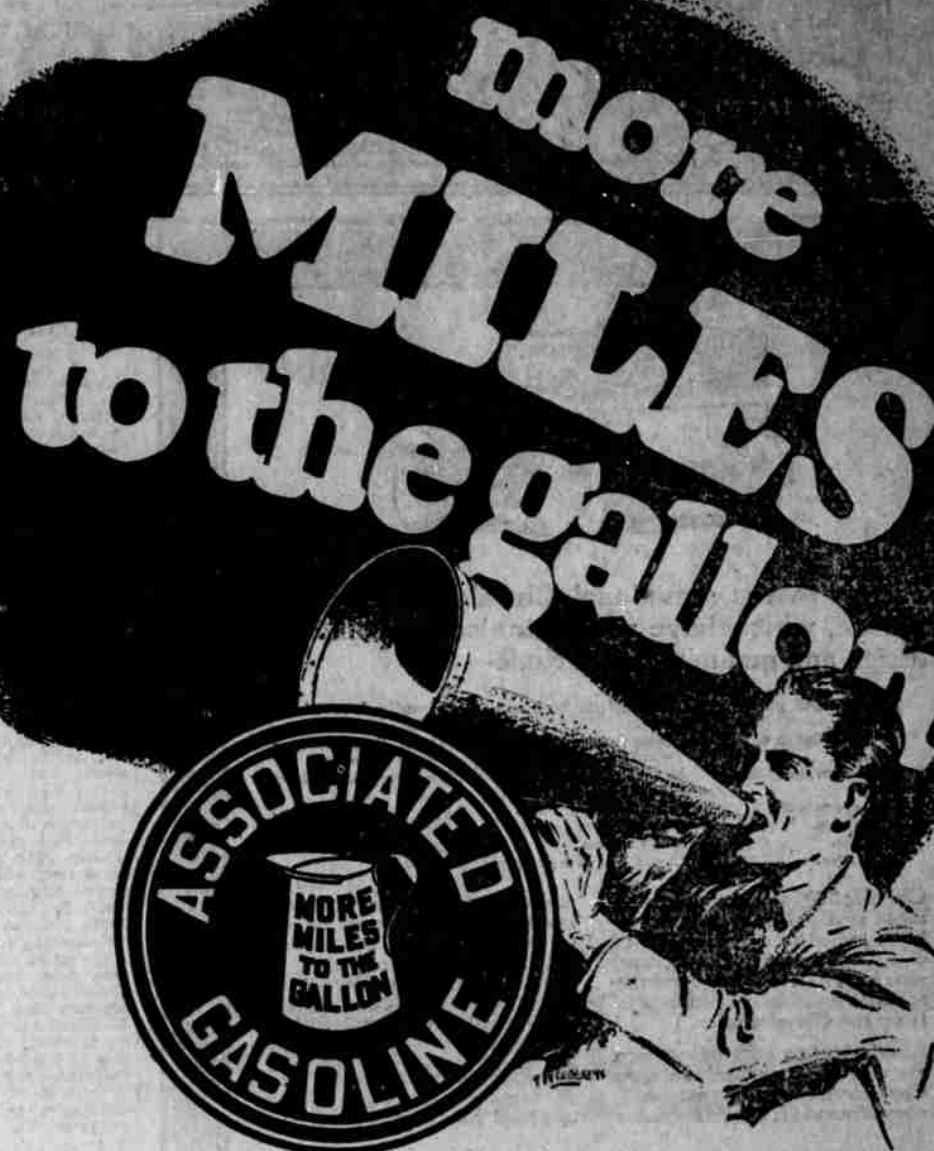
Asa Baker, local oyster opener, who admitted on the stand that he had been convicted of bootlegging, was the next government witness.
