SENATE REFUSES TO PUSH COOLIDGE INTO COAL STRIKE

(Associated Press London Wire)
WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—By a vote of 45 to 23, the senate refused today to consider the Coolidge resolution requesting President Coolidge to intervene in the anthracite suspension.

Twenty democrats, seven republicans and the one farmer-labor senator, voted to take up the resolution, while nine democrats and 39 republicans voted in the negative.

The senate's action was the first to be taken in congress in respect to the coal controversy and the vote was forced by opponents of President Coolidge's non-intervention policy after many previous attempts for a show down had been defeated in both senate and house.

Under the resolution, presented by Senator Copeland, democrat, New York, the president would have been requested to call representatives of the miners and operators to conference.

Before moving to take up the measure, Senator Copeland appealed to the senators from New England to stand with him, because their states were snow-bound and in need of fuel. But all New England senators voted against the motion.

When Senator Copeland announced that he would ask daily for consideration of his resolution, Senator Borah, Republican, Idaho, told him his resolution, "will have no effect whatever."

"It is time to do something besides passing resolutions," said Senator Borah. "If we are going into this let us enact legislation giving the president and the Interstate Commerce Commission power to act."

THE GIST OF THE BIBLE

ARTICLE 4

THE BOOK OF LEVITICUS

Every minister who believes in an orderly service for such official acts as baptisms, marriages, burials, and the like, has a little book containing orders of service for such occasions. The Book of Leviticus served this purpose for the priests and Levites of the Old Testament Church.

Its theme is "holiness," a term occurring oftener in this book than in any other book of the Bible. Its great problems are sin and redemption.

Its keynote is in 19:2, "Ye shall be holy, for I, the Lord your God, am holy."

Burnt offerings, meal offerings, peace offerings, sin offerings and trespass offerings all had their place in the worship God prescribed as a means of putting away sin.

The elaborate ritual prescribed in Leviticus reached its height in the impressive ceremonies of the great annual Day of Atonement when the high priest passed through the veil of the temple into the holy of holies to present to God the blood of sacrifice.

The best commentary on Leviticus ever printed is the Epistle to the Hebrews, which explains its elaborate system of sacrifices and offerings in brief by saying, "Without shedding of blood is no remission."

From Hebrews we learn that these sacrifices and feasts, and even the very priesthood of Leviticus were but "a shadow of good things to come" and "a figure for the time present."

Without Christ, our great High Priest, Leviticus is meaningless. His own blood on the real Day of Atonement, and the shedding of His blood on the cross the Levitical sacrifices were fulfilled and put away forever. The veil of the temple was torn to shreds with the blood of Jesus, and so, as St. John tells us, it was "rent in twain from the top to the bottom."

Clothed with His righteousness the holiness demanded in Leviticus is put within the reach of us all.

BUSINESS IN WOOL MARKET IS BETTER

BOSTON, Mass., Feb. 5.—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say:

There has been rather more business in wool during the past week although many dealers are refusing to consider the prices which the manufacturers are bidding for wool. The opening of heavyweight goods by the American Woolen company is considered auspicious, prices being decidedly reasonable in line with the cost of wool and labor. The situation in the country appears to be without material change.

Foreign markets are a bit irregular, especially as the selection of wools offered is poor or good. There has been little change abroad during the past week.

TWO PRISONERS AT ST. HELENS BREAK FROM COUNTY JAIL

200-lb. Man Crawls Thru Hole 10x6—Aid From Outside Given—Six Refuse to Go.

ST. HELENS, Ore., Feb. 5.—Two prisoners broke out of the Columbia county jail here this morning after two men on the outside had sawed the bars and invited all prisoners to escape.

The fugitives are William Cole, charged with burglary, and George Cabel, Filipino, charged with forgery.

Six other prisoners in the jail refused to leave, when invited to do so by the friends of Cole.

Two of the friends of Cole appeared at the window of the jail, which is in the basement of the court house, and sawed the bars while a third stood at the corner of the building as a lookout.

One of the intruders entered the corridor of the jail, unlocked the cells, approached the one in which Cole was confined and, after conversing with him, invited all prisoners to join in the escape.

Cole, who weighs more than 200 pounds, managed to crawl through the hole made by his friends, although it was only ten by six inches. Both men were to have had their hearings in court here today.

The remaining prisoners attracted the attention of deputies under Sheriff J. H. Wellington to report the jail delivery.

Cole was charged with robbing two stores here. He was captured by police in Portland and the stolen loot was recovered there also.
