NUDE INDIAN IN QUEST OF WIND LOG BREAK UP DANCE

COLVILLE, Wash., Feb. 5.—A nude Indian seeking a "Chinook log" broke up a dance at Barnaby Creek on the Columbia river last Saturday, the sheriff's office learned last night.

Sheriff L. P. Johnson received a report that the nude man had invaded the dance and had finally been thrown out after several women had become hysterical and fled from the hall.

Investigation revealed that Colvilleans nearby had held a "Chinook" dance last Friday. A blindfolded medicine man selected a tribesman to go in search of a peculiarly marked log, which, if touched, would assure a chinook wind. The Indian was disrobed except for a pair of woolen mittens. Moccasins were painted on his feet and he was sent in search of the log.

He wandered in the woods all Friday night and until late Saturday when half dazed from exhaustion and lack of food, he staggered into the dance hall at Barnaby Creek. The Indians assert that he found the "Chinook log" and cite the chinook wind of the last few days as their proof.

Members of Kremlin Baku, Improved Order of Muscovites, which organization is the playground of Odd Fellowship in this jurisdiction will gather in Roseburg tomorrow. It is expected that many members and candidates from all parts of the state will be present, although it is feared that the inclement weather may have the effect of decreasing the number to some extent.

Although street stunts are expected to be put on in the afternoon by local and visiting Muscovites, the formal program will not begin until 5:30 when the banquet will be enjoyed at the Odd Fellows temple. At 7:30 the parade will

start through the main streets of the city, and immediately afterward the ceremonial will begin at the Odd Fellows temple.

Czar Simeral, of Salem, and other high officials of the Kremlin are expected to arrive in Roseburg on train No. 53, while C. O. Weber, local duke, has decided that the Southern Pacific can operate without his services for one day, which fact assures the success of the celebration.

beer and light wines by the church temperance society of the Episcopal church.

"Personally I did not believe in the 18th amendment," he said, "and I think the Volstead Act is a bad law. Prohibition cannot possibly be enforced. The law is resented by many persons, good and bad, who feel it is a serious infringement of personal liberty."

"The fact that every bootlegger would vote for continuance of the Volstead law is proof that it is not a good law. Understand me plainly, I do not believe in breaking any law. I believe in keeping the law, once it is passed, but I do believe that bad laws should be modified. But as long as the law remains in force it should be kept. I think it should be modified and light wines and pure beer permitted for public consumption."

STORM CAUSES DAMAGE IN TILLER VICINITY

J. I. Roach of Tiller was in Roseburg today attending to business matters. The storm which struck the Tiller country Tuesday and Wednesday created much havoc. Mr. Roach reports. The wind blew down hundreds of trees, piling them up like jackstraws. Between Tiller and Drew the telephone line was grounded by falling trees in 27 places. Seventeen trees were reported to be across the road above Tiller, seven being piled up in one heap. Between Tiller and Milo numerous trees have fallen across the road, but have been cut away.
