He did not care to voice any opinions regarding the proposed invitation to head Oregon's state university, but he declared that expansion work is one of the greatest fields of endeavor for the majority of American colleges and universities.

"All I know about the University of Oregon is very favorable," he declared.

"President Campbell was very highly regarded everywhere as a man and as a builder."

Dr. Chase will remain at Eugene several days, then return to Portland for a short visit before going back to the Old North State. This morning he was shown about the University of Oregon medical school by Dean Richard B. Dillehunt, M. D., later going to the Lane county metropolis with Dr. E. S. Conklin, head of the department of psychology at Oregon.

Dr. Dillehunt gave a dinner at University Club last night in honor of the Eastern visitor.

Dr. Chase was born at Groveland, Mass., April 11, 1883. He received his B. and A. M. degrees at Dartmouth, and his Ph. D. at Clark University in 1910. He is a democrat in his conversation as "Red" Grange or Herbert Hoover.

TUG AND TANKER COLLIDE AT SEA; 18 MEN RESCUED
(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
NEW YORK, Feb. 8.—Eighteen men were rescued from the tug Wellington by the tanker Ardmore, following a collision between the two craft off the New Jersey coast Friday night, when the Wellington sank, it became known today.

The collision occurred during the storm that harried shipping in the Atlantic throughout last week. Towing the barges Southland and Tottenville, both empty, the Wellington was bound from New York for Eastport, Fla., when it collided with the Ardmore. Captain M. C. Partridge of the Wellington was injured.

The collision occurred about six miles northeast of the Brigantine Shoals.

ASBURY PARK, N. J., Feb. 8.—The body of Homer Miller, has been washed ashore at Barnegat Inlet. He was one of the crew of three aboard the barge Metropolitan No. 23, with which the Metropolitan No. 21 was in tow of the tug Georges Creek, when the storm of last week broke.

When No. 21 grounded coast guards rescued two of her crew and brought ashore the body of the third. A life preserver on the body of Miller gave rise to the belief that No. 23 had gone down.

The finding of Miller's body increased the storm fatalities in Jersey waters to three known dead and six missing.

WITNESS TELLS OF PLOT TO END LIFE OF WM. M. WHITNEY
(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 8.—A witness told a jury here today that he heard run runners plotting to end the life of William M. Whitney, assistant prohibition administrator of the Pacific northwest.

Ervin F. Carrothers, a dry agent, was under cross-examination in the trial of Roy Olmstead and 45 others as liquor conspirators. He said he had visited a card room to learn the voices of defendants so that he would recognize them on the telephone.

In the card room, said Carrothers, he saw four of the defendants sitting at a table. The plotters, he declared, were C. S. Green, William Smith, Edward Melnais and Harry Day.

Carrothers didn't sit at the table but he hovered about, and he told the jury that soon he heard Whitney mentioned. He continued:

"They were talking about how they could get around him, and how, if they couldn't do that they could do away with him. Melnais said 'you want to watch that guy,' meaning Whitney. 'He may jump up and kick you in the face any time.'"

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PIERCE APPROVES PORTLANDERS FOR TAX BILL'S DEFEAT
PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 8.—Governor Walter M. Pierce today chided Portland business men in an address before the chamber of commerce because they fought the income tax of 1924 and ultimately brought about its defeat; because they now oppose an income tax law which, he said, would bring about a more equitable distribution of the burdens of government, and because they are now opposing the proposed severance tax on timber.

The governor was unsparing in his criticism of the citizens who tried to dodge his duty to his government by avoiding just taxes commensurate to his financial ability.

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RIDERS IN TOWED CAR CUT BY FLYING GLASS
Eugene Palmer and Dave Isaacs of Astoria were cut and bruised yesterday in an auto accident at Hepper bridge, below Canyonville. A car belonging to Mr. Palmer of Astoria was being towed north on the Pacific highway, and upon reaching the bridge something went wrong causing the towed car, in which the two young men were riding, to be swung against the bridge railing. Both were thrown violently forward, and were cut by glass. They were brought to the office of Dr. Stewart in this city and their injuries treated.

SENATE COMMITTEE SPLITS IN THE ALUMINUM CASE
WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—The senate judiciary committee split today over two reports on the investigation into Department of Justice's action in the case of the Aluminum company of America, accused of violating a court decree as to certain trade practices.

Senator Walsh, Democrat, Montana, submitted a report, proposing a senate investigation of the company, in which Secretary Mellon has an interest. Senator Harrell, Republican, Oklahoma, in another document recommended there be no further action by the senate in view of investigations now in progress by the Department of Justice and the federal trade commission.

The committee will present both reports to the senate.

ECHO OF BANK FAILURE TO BE HEARD AFTER 2 YEARS
MEDFORD, Ore., Feb. 8.—The appeal of Chester C. Kubli, sentenced to three years in the state prison, in connection with the failure of the Bank of Jacksonville five years ago, will be argued this week before the supreme court, according to his attorneys. The appeal has been pending for over two years. Kubli was indicted on a charge based on alleged overdrawing his account. W. H. Johnson, president of the defunct institution, was sentenced to ten-year term and was pardoned last year by Governor Pierce. Kubli, who is a member of a pioneer Oregon family, is now living in Lane county.
