IMPOSSIBLE TO
CONFIRM McCAMANT

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—President Coolidge was told today by Senators McNary and Stanford, Republicans, Oregon, that they believed it would be impossible to obtain senate confirmation of the nomination of Wallace McCamant of Portland, to be a circuit judge.

A poll of the senate judiciary committee which has the nomination under consideration, they said, indicated an adverse report would be given to the senate and in such an event they saw no possibility of favorable senate action.

McCamant, who nominated President Coolidge for the vice-presidency at the Republican national convention in Chicago in 1920, is serving on the circuit bench under a recess appointment. The fight against his confirmation is led by Senator Johnson, Republican, California, who contends McCamant disregarded his primary instructions in balancing or presidential candidates at 1920 convention.

The visit to the White House of Senators McNary and Stanford, the belief that President Coolidge might be urged to withdraw Judge McCamant's nomination. They said they had not recommended this course, but had left the question entirely to the President.

GENERAL PERSHING
IN WASHINGTON, D. C.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—General Pershing returned to Washington today for medical treatment after a five months absence in South America as head of the Tacna-Arica plebiscite commission.

He was met at the railway station by Secretary Kellogg, and other officials. After brief greetings he was taken to temporary quarters in an uptown club house.

The effect on the general's health of the voyage from Arica to Key West and the train journey from Florida to Washington, was described by members of his party as negligible.

As General Pershing stepped from his train he was met by Secretary Kellogg and the two walked arm in arm to the station plaza, where automobiles were in waiting.

"I am glad to be home," the general said, as he greeted the reception committee. "All I can say now," he added, turning to newspaper men is that I have an appointment with Secretary Kellogg. Until the announcement is filed, I must decline to discuss the Tacna-Arica situation."

General Pershing said he planned as soon as he had discharged his official business to enter Walter Reed General Hospital. He understands the army medical authorities intend to begin with a general physical overhauling.

It depends largely on the success of both medical and dental treatment, whether General Pershing will return to Arica. He has every confidence that Major-General William Sautter, who succeeded him as head of the plebiscite commission, will be able to carry on that work as well as he or any other American.

Soon after his arrival, General Pershing went to his office in the War Department, returning to his desk with a little fuss as though he had merely been away overnight. He settled down at once to consider a number of matters that awaited his attention.

Even should it be unnecessary for him to return to Arica, General Pershing faces the probability of further traveling as his regular duties as president of the Battle Monuments commission probably will call him to Europe as soon as he is physically ready and can spare the time. Such a trip also would give him an opportunity to see his son Warren who is in school abroad.

turned and surrendered himself. A plea was made in his behalf by Attorney Dexter Rice, who stated that he had taken a friendly interest in the young man. Sacks has twice been in the juvenile court, but the attorney stated that it was due to a weakness of character rather than a criminal nature. He pointed out the fact that the young man has been living a straight, clean life for a number of years and that his recent crimes were largely because of improper associations. In passing sentence Judge Hamilton gave the minimum penalty allowed under the law, that of one year, which was made the maximum term for Sacks' confinement.

Sam Stiger, arraigned for possession of a still, was given until Saturday morning to enter a plea, and Attorney Albert Abraham was appointed to represent him.

Henry Stowle, charged with unlawful possession of a still, entered a plea of not guilty, and will be tried Wednesday, following the Metzger case.

Fred and Oscar Warren were arraigned jointly on charges of sale of liquor. Fred pleading guilty, while Oscar was given until Saturday morning to enter his plea. He asked for the appointment of an attorney and Elbert Hermann was designated by the court for his defense.

The two were arraigned separately on a charge of possessing a still, and Fred again pled guilty, while Warren's plea was deferred until Saturday.

Sentence will be passed upon Fred Warren at 10 a. m. Saturday. B. J. McDougal, indicted for possession of liquor, took until Saturday at 10 a. m. to plead. Attorney Hermann was appointed to defend him.

Six secret indictments returned by the grand jury are presumed to be against the five fugitives who are now being sought following escapes from the county jail and the one who was later captured, George Holtzclaw, wanted for possession of a still and possibly for assault; Frank Moore, charged with larceny in a dwelling; Wm. Schulke, who was retaken and turned over to the government for a
