shortly before he and his family committed suicide with gas, has been received by F. W. Pendleton, vice-president of the Bank of Independence. The letter was written in pencil and did not indicate nervousness, the banker said. It follows:

"The undertaker here will communicate with you and have our bodies shipped home. Have my wife buried next to my son in Mount Washington cemetery. You will have to buy one grave lot, as there are only two unoccupied graves in my lot. Have my body buried next to my wife and the two girls next to my own. Thanks old man for the man courtesies extended. Luck to you."

"Yours very truly,"

"T. M. Petzet."

"P. S.—My daughter, Clyde, was sometimes known as Clyde Durand, her pen name. Her proper name is Clyde Petzet. T. M. P."

"P. S.—I am giving undertaker here \$70. You can wire him balance necessary. He will wire you. Petzet."

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Feb. 12.—The Mexican officials who are conducting the investigation on that side of the international boundary line into the attacks on Audrey and Clyde Petzet, American girls, presumed today to resume their inquiry. Meanwhile Coroner S. C. Kelly of San Diego county, on the American side of the line is preparing for an inquest as the result of the suicide of the girls and their father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas M. Petzet at their little home in this city last Saturday morning, after they had decided that death would be preferable to the dishonor which the father wrote had come upon them.

The main investigators have announced that nothing contained in the depositions made to them will be made public until the witnesses have been fully examined. The method being pursued is to take full depositions, all of which will be laid out in evidence, before a federal jury, the case having been taken out of the hands of the local authorities by order of Governor Rodriguez of the northern district of Lower California. Much interest was taken however today in a statement which was made to a friend by Zeno Llanos, deposed chief of Tia Juana, held in connection with the outrage. Llanos said:

"I accompanied the Petzet girls and their party to Tia Juana Hot Springs. I left them there. I had nothing to do with them. But I accept full responsibility for what happened to them because I was chief of police of Tia Juana and I should not have allowed myself to be influenced by the kind of people who were in the Oakland Bar."

With Luis Amador, proprietor of the Oakland Bar; Francisco Gonzalez, member of the Tia Juana police department, and four others, Llanos is held in the Tia Juana court or military barracks, as a federal prisoner.
