## FIVE SCHOOLS TO PARTICIPATE IN TOURNAMENT

County Basket Ball Meet to Be Held in Roseburg on March 5 and 6.

### SCHEDULE FORMED

Ten Teams to Take Part in Tourney—Roseburg to Enter Only Its Second Teams.

The first county-wide basketball tournament to be held in Douglas county, will take place on March 5 and 6, according to arrangements completed Saturday at a meeting of the athletic committee of the Douglas county teachers' association. Five schools have entered, each having boys and girls teams, so that there will be ten teams in the tournament. The schools are at Drain, Wilbur, Oakland, Sutherlin, and Roseburg. Roseburg enters only its second team, its first team being barred out of the tournament, in order to give a fair basis of competition for schools with smaller enrollment.

It was hoped to have many more schools entered, but several others which desired to come in could not meet the eligibility requirements. All schools represented will abide by the rules of the state athletic association, governing eligibility of players, so that no unfair advantages in the form of "ringers" can be employed.

Each player must be a qualified student of the school and must have made certain scholastic standings in order to be able to represent his or her school.

The games start on Friday afternoon. In the evening of that day the Roseburg first teams, boys and girls, play a double-header game with the Grants Pass team, so that there will be no tournament games in the evening.

The semi-finals will be played on Saturday afternoon and the finals Saturday evening. The tournament basketballs and suitable banners will be presented to the winning teams.

It is proposed to make this county tournament an annual event. In future years it will be divided up in separate classes upon enrollment, so that high school having enrollments of 25 or more will be in one class, while schools having an enrollment of less than 25 will be in another class. This will put all upon a fair basis for competition. Other schools will undoubtedly plan during the coming year to enter the tournament and will follow the state eligibility rules which will make it possible for them to participate in the county meet.

E. A. Britton has been chosen as referee for all of the boys games, but the officials for the girls games have not yet been selected. The tournament schedule is as follows:

## MURDER MYSTERY SHROUDS LIQUOR LADEN VEHICLE

PAWTUCKET, R. I., Feb. 15.—The body of a man who was shot and thrown from a liquor laden truck in the center of the city yesterday, presumably by hijackers, lay unidentified today and no clue has been found to his slayer or slayers.

Giovanni M. Di Silvestro has been re-elected commander of the Sons of Italy in America. Senator George E. Williams, Missouri, was a recent White House caller regarding pending legislation. ## PORTLAND JUDGE DEALS LENIENTLY WITH AUTO OWNERS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 15.—Municipal Judge Fred W. Stadler's court room was packed today with motorists arrested last week by three state police, on charges dealing with glaring or defective lights, and by city police on various traffic charges.

The grand total of arrests was 212. Judge Stadler said, as the cases were starting, that times would be the exception rather than the rule, and that his order would be simply that the lights be readjusted to comply with the state law.

In all, 88 motorists were arrested in three days by the state officers and the rest by local traffic men.

## ENGLISH GIRL SPENDS THREE YEARS TEACHING ESQUIMOS

LONDON, Feb. 14.—(A. P.)—Thirty little Esquimos up at Mahkovic, Labrador, are mourning the departure of their pretty English teacher and straining their ears trying to get news of London over their primitive wireless apparatus.

The teacher, Mary Rowe, 21, is back in England after three years of isolation near the Arctic Circle and is happy to be eating turkey instead of walrus.

Miss Rowe came back to England

on the little ship Harmony, which goes to Labrador once a year and is the only regular steamship communication Mahkovic has with the outside world.

"There are only five houses and two huts in Mahkovic, and the huts are no larger than a dining room table and each shelters one native family," said Miss Rowe. "My thirty pupils came from an area of several thousands of square miles. We were 300 miles from our nearest white neighbors, the settlement run by Dr. Grenfell."

"Mail came overland by dog-sledge three times a year, and I tell you it was an exciting time when that mail arrived and brought us news from home."

Mahkovic is a Moravian mission station and the good ship Harmony belongs to that religious organization, of which Miss Rowe is also a member. For a year Miss Rowe was alone in charge of her thirty little native wards.

"I had no time to get lonesome," she said. "With thirty children to feed, clothe and teach one does not have many idle moments and does not worry about recreation."

The Harmony sails for Mahkovic again next June and Miss Rowe will probably return for another three-year term of service.
