APPEAL IN LAND CASES LOST BY O. & C. R. R. CO.

Booth-Kelly Co., and Other
Concerns Recover Sum
of \$163,000.

OLD GRANT INVOLVED

Failing to Get Title From
Road, Lumber Firms Buy
U. S. Patents and
Get Damages.

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 16.—The Booth-Kelly Lumber company recovers \$148,925.25 and Andrew B. Hammond and Charles J. Winton recover \$14,332.50 from the Oregon-California Railroad company as a result of two opinions of the supreme court today, both written by Justice Egan and both affirming Judge Robert Tucker of the lower court for Multnomah county. The Oregon-California Railroad company was appellant in both cases. The opinions are practically identical with the exception of the amounts involved, and certain dates.

On August 16, 1901, the Hammond company and the railroad company entered into a written contract by the terms of which the railroad company agreed to sell the plaintiff's 43,372.43 acres of land at \$7 an acre, aggregating \$303,607.01 in 10 equal installments with interest on deferred payments. The sum was paid by the lumber company, but when the payments were completed the railroad company was unable to give a merchantable title because the lands were granted by the United States by acts of congress in July, 1866, April, 1869 and May, 1870.

Railroad's Sales Illegal
The first of the grants was made in aid of the "west side line." The act of 1869 amended the act of 1866 by providing that the lands granted should be sold to actual settlers only, in quantities of not over a quarter section to one purchaser, and for not exceeding \$2.50 an acre. The other grant was in aid of the "east side line," by act of May 4, 1870, and provided that alternate sections be sold on the same terms as above. The railroad company became the beneficiary of all the lands involved in the case.

Subsequently the railroad company made sales of the land in violation of the congressional acts relative to quantity and price. In April, 1905, congress adopted a joint resolution authorizing the attorney general to institute suits to enforce forfeiture of the lands to the government. Pending the determination of these cases, congress in August, 1912, authorized the attorney general to enter into a compromise with any purchaser of the grant lands against whom suit had been brought upon the condition that the compromise should require the entry of a decree of forfeiture against the purchaser, and that within six months from the entry of the decree the purchaser should be entitled to receive a patent from the United States on payment by the purchaser of \$2.50 an acre.

Because of inability of the railroad company to convey a merchantable title, the lumber companies were compelled, in order to secure valid title, to pay the United States \$2.50 an acre. They then received patents.

This gave rise to the suits decided today, the lumber companies suing the railroad company for judgment at \$2.50 an acre.

Justice Egan dissented to the opinion.

AMUNDSEN PLANS ANOTHER DASH TO POLE NEXT APRIL

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 16.—Captain Roald Amundsen plans to make a preliminary flight in a dirigible to Paris, London, Pottam and Leningrad before starting from Spitzbergen to Alaska, he said today.

Captain Amundsen said he would begin his second attempt to fly over the North Pole in April if the dirigible is ready by that time.

The explorer wished well for the Detroit Arctic expedition, headed by Captain Wilkins, but feared that if this party depended upon the Arctic wastes to provide food it would be disappointed.

He said the members of the Detroit party would starve unless they carried their own food—or could live on newspapers.

He related the experience of Dr. Nansen's party, which found a stray polar bear in the Arctic. "They shot the bear to keep the animal from dying of starvation or homelessness. The bear was very lean and poor. What do you suppose they found in its stomach?" It was a newspaper that had blown from Nansen's ship.

DRURY, FREE VERSE POET.
SINGS WONDER OF CITY.

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

CHICAGO, Feb. 15.—Starvation in Greenwich village, bus boy at a Broadway cafe, mess boy on ships in the South American trade—these are a few chapter headings in the unwritten biography of John Drury, latest of Chicago poets to achieve recognition in the free verse forms.

Unlike his fellow craftsman, Low Sargent, who is deserting the "artificial civilization" of the metropolis for the forests and the plains, Drury, after searching for adventure and color in the outlands of the world, has come back to the great city that gave him birth, to sing with admiration and gusto the myriad wonders of metropolitan life.

"Dusk on the avenues . . . is an old blue garden . . . flowered by static chrysanthemums . . . of many street lamps," he sings in his new book of poems, "Arc-light Dunks." Through all the volume runs his feeling for the beauty of the city seen through the unconventional eyes of a vivid colorist.

The city is a place of romance and adventure, of colors and of overtones, of charm and quiet dreaming, a different fare than that offered by the earlier verse-artist such as Carl Sandberg, who spoke in Chicago as the "hog butcher of the world," and dwell on her gaunt shapes and her dirt and smoke. Thus Drury writes:

For all your blind brutality
I have been surprised
By sudden facets of beauty
In that soot and dust
Of our smothered streets."

A decade ago Sandberg, Edgar Lee Masters, and other Chicagoans leaped into public attention on the crest of a wave of interest in free verse forms to which they gave a rugged mid-western interpretation. Today, a new generation of poets is carrying on the tradition they established—new voices expressing themselves in a free verse structure that breathes the spirit of their predecessors and yet carries new notes to distinguish the movement as one in its own right. One of the voices is Drury's.

"Every man must have a way of expressing himself," he said, "and my way is through the free verse."

PALM BEACH, Fla., Feb. 15.—All was serene today in the rival camps in the house of Salm. An armistice was signed yesterday between the count and the countess whereby the former was to enjoy his two hours a day, four days a week, with his young son, unhampered by detectives and nurses.

As a consequence, the count and young Peter got acquainted yesterday, although the Von Hogenstraten action did not learn to refer to his titled paternity as "Daddy," however much he may have been impetuous to do so.

Milliecent, the child's mother, and her father, H. H. Rogers, have remained in the background and in the center of that portion of the populace who have "nothing to say."

Shortly before 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon the hour appointed by the New York court, little Peter, flanked by his nurse and detective, arrived at the count's hotel.

The count received his son enthusiastically and the attendants moved off while the two repaired to the Salm quarters.

Later the dowager countess reappeared with her grandson for a walk along the beach.

Efforts of photographers to record the scene of domestic satisfaction were nullified by the dowager countess, who in plain English, gave them the slip. The count resorted to tennis to rid himself of his surplus exuberance.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 15.—A golf links, which among other distinctions boasts of a floating tee costing \$30,000 and which names as well as numbers its holes, is providing entertainment for officers and men of Fort Baker, across the bay from San Francisco.
