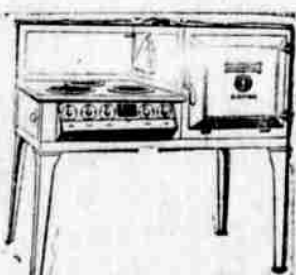

EUREKA, Cal., Feb. 16.—E. O. Heinrich, Berkeley criminalist, testified today at the trial of Jack Ryan, charged with the murder of Carmen Wagner, beauty parlor attendant, that he had found skin under the finger nails of the slain thrown from a horse.
