COLD NIGHTS ARE SLOWING UP BROCCOLI

Fewer Cars Moved During
Past Few Days as Result
of Weather.

INSPECTION IS CLOSE

Many Government Inspectors on Job to Keep Up
High Standard of
Cars Shipped East.

Forty-eight cars of broccoli have been shipped from the Umpqua Valley up to the present time. The cold nights recently have slowed down the movement of a marked degree, causing the crop to ripen more slowly. Forty-two cars have been loaded in Roseburg, four at Riddle and one each at Myrtle Creek and Lillard. During the past week the nights have been much cooler than formerly and as a result carload shipments have almost been checked. The chill in the ground, during the night, is not dissipated during the day, while the luxuriant foliage serves to keep the plant cool during the short warm season during the day, and prevents the heads from maturing so rapidly.

A close inspection is being kept on the cars moved from all loading stations in the county, this work being done under the direction of E. A. Petty, chief government inspector for this district. He has appointed Raymond R. Fish inspector at the Myrtle Creek loading station, Guy W. Renshaw at Riddle, and will put V. E. Jackson in charge as inspector at Lillard and Green. When loading starts there. Two additional inspectors will be named for the Roseburg station, when the height of the season is reached.

Each car that is shipped under government inspection bears a certificate from the government inspector that the contents are exactly as stated upon the certificate. These certificates are accepted in any U. S. court as evidence of the condition of the car at the shipping point. The inspectors are very careful in the checking made on the cars and require strict observance of the grading standards. Practically every car shipped out of the county is shipped under government inspection, which insures the purchaser that he is receiving exactly what is specified by the shipper.

As the weather becomes warmer the shipping will increase greatly in volume and many cars will be sent out daily. Arrangements are being made to accelerate the trainload shipments, which will be made during the height of the season, by placarding the cars and having news reels movies taken when the train leaves.

LUTHERAN MISSION ATTACHE SLAIN BY CHINESE LOOTERS

HANKOW, China, Feb. 17.—John Bly of the Lutheran United Mission in Honan province has been made prisoner by the Kuomintang, or National Peoples' Army at Sinyangchow. He is charged with spying.

D. Nelson, also of the mission, who was reported yesterday to have been accidentally killed, was hit by stray bullet February 8 and died from his wounds. The property of the Lutheran mission outside Sinyangchow has been looted by soldiers. Selden Chapin, American vice consul at Hankow, is going to Sinyangchow to ascertain the condition of the American missionary community there. Marshal Wu Pei-fu, commanding Chinese troops who are invading Honan to the south, has promised Mr. Chapin transportation in a special military train with an escort.

Sinyangchow, in southern Honan, on the Peking-Hankow railway, about 125 miles north of Hankow, has been the scene of recent fighting between Marshal Wu's forces and those of the Kuomintang or National Peoples' army, which is in control at Peking.

ALUMNI OF FOUR COLLEGES TO BACK FLIGHT TO POLE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—Lieutenant Leigh Wade and H. H. Ogden, crack American fliers, who circled the globe for the army, now are to undertake a civilian trans-polar flight seeking new territory to claim for the United States.

The flight is to be known as the American University Alumni expedition and is backed by alumni of Harvard Yale, Princeton and the University of Pennsylvania.

One of its primary objects will be the location of land near the pole as a possible airplane base for the United States. To some extent, this object parallels that of another trans-polar expedition sponsored by the Detroit aviation society and now mobilizing in Alaska under the direction of Captain George Wilkins. Lieutenant Wade's plans, however, are concerned more with the acquisition and utilization of territory than the Detroit expedition which has been announced as chiefly for scientific exploration.

Lieutenant Wade has no doubt that land exists in the ice floes and that an aviation base can be established.

EAST RIVER COLLISION MAY HAVE COST 4 LIVES

NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—Four men were missing after a collision today between a New York marine company's tug and the Fall River line steamer New Hampshire in the East River near the Brooklyn bridge. Six others, three of whom were in serious condition, were taken to Brooklyn street hospital suffering from submersion and exposure.

All of the crew of the tug boat were thrown into the icy waters by the force of the collision. Nine men managed to cling to floating ice cakes until rescued.

The tug sank immediately after the crash.

COREY SEES GREAT INDUSTRIAL BOOM FOR KLAMATH ZONE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 17.—H. H. Corey, chairman of the public service commission, expects a decision of the Interstate Commerce Commission within 60 days on the Central Oregon railroad hearing. Although no assurance was given by the Interstate Commerce Commission that an early decision will be handed down, Mr. Corey believes the importance of the case will cause the commission to hurry it along.

"As sure as the Hill lines build from Bend into Klamath Falls, as they wish to do," said Mr. Corey, "the Weyerhaeuser interests will build a large lumber mill near Klamath Falls. We are also hoping that the Union Pacific will build west from Crane to connect with the line from Bend south and with the Natron cut-off."

"Charles Moran and associates will standardize the narrow gauge line from Nevada to Lakeview, that is already decided."

MERCHANT DUELS WITH BANDIT AND LOSES HIS LIFE

DENVER, Colo., Feb. 17.—With James Springfield, a Plattville, Colorado, storekeeper, dead after a pistol duel last night with a robber, and Wade L. Keltner, a youth from Fort Lupton, near Plattville, believed to be dying in a hospital here from a pistol shot wound, officials here today were trying to connect the two shootings.

Keltner, 20, shot through the chest, is under police guard, while surgeons are fighting for his life. Springfield, 35, was shot to death when a young bandit entered his store last night and demanded money. The two shot it out, with only six feet between them. Weld county officers admitted that the connection of Keltner with the pistol duel is as yet vague. He stumbled into the home of a girl friend a short time after it had taken place, saying that he had been shot from ambush.

GRAZING PLAN IS SENT TO SENATE BY WORK AND JARDINE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—The new measures, prepared jointly by the interior and agriculture departments and covering the whole field of grazing regulations, both in national forest and on the public domain, were submitted by Secretaries Work and Jardine today to the senate committee on public lands.

The measures are designed to give the secretaries of the two departments broad regulatory powers over grazing on public lands and would provide for the creation of local advisory boards to make recommendations to the departments. The joint letter transmitting the draft of the measures declared that "it is our mutual desire that the extended consideration given to this subject throughout the west and in congress during recent years may lead to some definite and constructive legislation. This, we believe, will not be accomplished if measures are attempted which would bestow unwarranted advantages upon the livestock producers who utilize the public ranges or remove such use of public lands from reasonable and necessary control by the executive department responsible for them."

BERGDOLL ASSERTS AMERICAN GRUDGE BACK OF CHARGES

MOSBACH, Germany, Feb. 18.—The German official in charge of the prosecution of Grover C. Bergdoll, accused of seduction, are proceeding with great care in sifting the material on which the case was based. This is because of the apparently unusual motives behind the case and the personal enmity between Bergdoll and the investigator of his arrest, Robert P. Sachs, the detective.

Sachs has denied that he is acting as an agent of the American Legion seeking to force Bergdoll's expulsion from Germany, and describes himself as a representative of the American newspapers. He also is credited with the statement that he is a deputy sheriff from Alameda county, California.

A search of Bergdoll revealed that he was carrying two revolvers and a dagger. Acquaintances say he has always gone heavily armed of late, growing suspicious over the frequent visits of Americans to the hotel where he was staying.

The daughter of the hotel proprietor is said to have gone to America and obtained \$6000 from Bergdoll's mother for the draft dodger.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—The radio crystal receiving set, which outlives reception mainly to the nearest broadcasting station, still is the predominant type used in the British Isles.

Of the 1,570,000 British receivers, commerce department figures show that about 75 per cent are crystal sets. The British government has shown some hesitancy in adding to its present number of broadcasting stations, because of the possible effect on these of the present indications are that the British Broadcasting company, which conducts all broadcasting in Great Britain under contracts from the government, probably will be bought by the government at the expiration of its contract next year.

HONOLULU DRIVING ORDINANCE PUZZLES MAINLAND TOURISTS

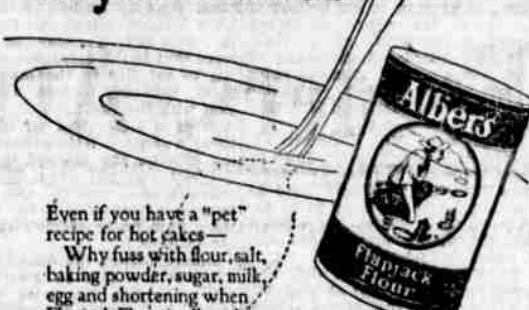
HONOLULU, Feb. 18.—Tourists from the mainland find themselves puzzled by a new traffic ordinance put into effect in this part of American territory.

In substance "motorists can go only manuka on Fort street and Makai on Nuuanu. Parking is permitted on the Waikiki side of Fort and the Ewa side of Nuuanu."

In explanation, the streets for the most part run northeast to southwest and southeast to northwest, with the result that four Hawaiian words are considered more descriptive of direction than American.

The perplexing terms are: Makai—toward the sea, about southwest. Manuka—toward the mountains about northeast. Waikiki—toward Waikiki beach, or about southeast. Ewa (pronounced "evva")—toward Ewa plantation, to the north-west.
